12 STORES TO BE ADDED TO HOTEL

Plans for a 12 story addition to the Hotel Portland are being prepared by Doyle & Patterson, architects. Building the addition will involve radical changes in the contour of the main building and a rearrangement of rooms, and possibly the lobby that will make the total cost of the project not less than \$250,000. The Portland hotel in form now is a double "U" so arranged that every room has windows outside. The plans as approved by Henry Ladd Corbett, president of the Portland Hotel company, involve the construction of a third wing facing Sixth street and built in the center of the present court, but so arranged as to leave a 55 foot court on each side as entrances.

This wing will be raised to an elevation of 15 stories, and ultimately the remainder of the building may be raised to the same height. The addition will be completed in time for next season's rush of tourist travel, it was reported today.

ASK TO SAVE THE NECK OF DALEY

Petitions in Circulation Asking Commutation of Death Sentence.

An effort is to be made to secure a commutation for Harry Daley, who is under sentence of death for the murder of Harry Kenney in a Sixth street saloon last December. The state supreme court last week decided that the judgment of the circuit court, deciding that Daley shall die.

Several petitions asking Governor Benson to commute the sentence to life imprisonment are being circulated, and a large number of signatures have been secured. It is expected that most of the jurymen who convicted Daley will ask the governor to commute the sentence. The defense in the case was conducted on the ground of temporary insanity, and the petition to the governor is on the same ground, the petitioners saying:

"We do not believe, owing to his mental condition at the time he committed the act, that he should be held responsible therefor to the extent of suffering the extreme penalty."

Daley's attorneys are now active in the effort to save him from the gallows, and the petitions will be ready to present to the governor in a few days.
