question being in the national forest of Alaska. Shaw, going to the general land office to search the records, was refused access to them by H. W. Schwartz, chief of special agents. Schwartz said, "We don't propose to permit the forest bureau to run the interior department through one of our own men." Schwartz finally consented to show the records excepting those specifically referring to the official controversy between Glavis and his superiors, who charged him with insubordination. Schwartz says there has been collusion between Shaw and Glavis. He received the reply, "There has been cooperation between Shaw and Glavis, but collusion is not proved."

Additional Gravity is Added to these Rumors by the Intimation that Ballinger and National Chairman Hitchcock intend to make a campaign promise that these claims would be hastened to patent in return for support in the fight of what is known as the "Cunningham" case, having no knowledge thereof.

It is alleged that Glavis contends he has abundant evidence substantiating all his allegations.

Cunningham's Notebook

It is understood he has the notebook of Cunningham in which are full entries of all locations of coal claims involved, in a manner to indicate an engineering deal to get the claims in a group and include the bulk of the most valuable deposits of coal in Alaska, deposits on which the government has depended for its future supply for the navy in Pacific waters, as well as depended on by coast people for use in industrial enterprises when developed in the near future.

Glavis' Suspicious Beliefs

It is also alleged that the general land office Agent Sullivan to assume charge of these Cunningham cases, taking the matter from Glavis' hands, Sullivan being definitely instructed to see that the cases were hastened to such a stage that they could be heard here before Commissioner Denman, but that Sullivan, on going into the facts, concluded Glavis had been right in constraining the evidence as indicating unlawful intent by Cunningham.

Pinchot Men's Significant Hint

"The Ballinger-Pinchot controversy is not a question of whether or not there shall be a strict observance of law in working out the various conservation matters," said a Pinchot sympathizer today. "It is a question of honesty under the law."

Pressed to elucidate this startling assertion, he said he could not say any more.

But the seriousness of the situation is acknowledged in that statement. The country will be startled by the full amplification of the charges that have been preferred. The strain is too heavy and too long to permit the maintenance of the present conditions of a mere interdepartmental quarrel.

Two Cabinet Members Suspected

There is no question that the president is due to have presented to him crucial issues involving his official advisors. It is certain that two members of the cabinet are to be involved in a manner to raise the question of the faithful servant. Hints are given that campaign promises were made last year, without Taft's knowledge, of course, as at no time has anyone suggested that Taft had any knowledge of it.

Pinchot or Ballinger Must Go. When the storm breaks, as it must before long, either Pinchot or Ballinger will leave the government service. So bitter will the fight be that both can not remain in the administration, no matter what the outcome of the controversy. Official transactions affect-

ine Alaska seem to supersede in impending importance the waterpower site matters so energetically exploited at the irrigation congress at Spokane. Great alterations have been made in secret which are slowly coming out from tightly red taped official packages. Too many men are concerned in this impasse to permit the retention of all information by reticent officials.

What the Game Is Played For

Power for industrial enterprises, coal for fuel, water for electric energy—these are the kernel of this whole matter. Apparently the greed of certain New York interests seeking to monopolize this industrial potentiality caused the entire trouble, prompted the opposition to Pinchot and his fellow conservationists and moved the New Yorkers to seek to grab all in sight. They worked through western representatives. If the project is carried out, the production of electric energy could be controlled in the coast cities. If the control of the coal in Alaska could be grabbed, the future supply of fuel for the Pacific ocean, use of the navy, for coast transportation and for manufacturing would be monopolized. These two would deliver over to those New Yorkers the control of practically every essential of living in that region.

Negligence Ministering to Greed

It was a rich prize worthy of strenuous reaching for. Men would fawn and flatter in the schemes. "Let us loot Alaska and the coast states to do this thing," they said. How far they went will transpire when certain officials awake to the realization that at least by negligence and adherence to technicalities, they were liable to forward the plans of these greedy New Yorkers.

Vigorous Defense will be Offered if the charges become public, so that the precipitation of the charges is certain to convulse the nation, inevitably causing the breakup of the president's present staff of immediate subordinates.

STRIKERS IN RIOT; MANY ARE WOUNDED

(United Press Lesson Wire.)
Fort William, Ont., Aug. 13.—Two hundred regular troops stationed at Fort Osborne started for Fort William today because of the serious rioting which has been in progress here since the dock laborers employed by the Canadian Pacific railroad went on strike a week ago for higher wages.
The city is under martial law, for the first time in its history. Troops are attempting to quell the outbreaks of the thousand striking laborers, most of whom are Greeks, Hungarians and Italians. When 24 special police of the railroad force under Chief Bell arrived from Winnipeg yesterday to protect the company's property, the strikers began a riot during which a score were wounded, including Chief Bell, who is

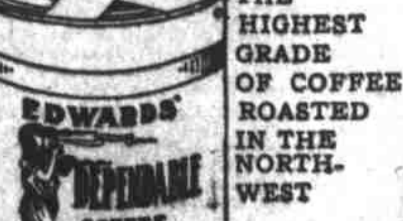

BAKING POWDER SODA EXTRACTS

Have, vice president and manager of the Union State Savings and Commercial bank which was closed by order of Superintendent of Banks Alden Anderson three weeks ago.
The warrant was sworn to yesterday by Anderson following his report of the bank's condition. Thus far Hays has not been arrested. The specific charge against the banker is that of overdrawing his account with the Union State bank to the extent of \$1250 on July 7, when Anderson alleges Hays had no money to his credit in the institution.
Under the new banking law of California, an officer of a bank is guilty of a felony should he overdraw his account with the bank at which he is employed.
Anderson reported that the closed bank will pay about 75 cents on the dollar, provided 40 cents is realized on each dollar represented by notes recovered.
The superintendent stated that the bank never was conducted properly and the bookkeeping methods were lax.
