This was the training which the artillery officers received, and which they received under the direction of Captain Leroy Lyons of the Fourth United States Artillery.

Practice on the beach in the morning was witnessed by a large crowd of summer visitors who were much interested to the spectators as the artillery practice was the drill of the hospital corps. After the firing, none but the hospital corps were seen on the ground behind the guns. A substitute was rushed into the disabled one's place and the operation was carried on as if nothing had happened.
