

COOS BAY PLANS ENTERTAINMENT

Interest of Portland Business Men in Development Congress Is Gratifying.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Marshfield, Or., Aug. 14.—The interest shown by Portland business men in the forthcoming development congress on Coos bay is very gratifying to people here. They are pleased at the prospect of giving a midsummer entertainment to visitors with whom they have trade relations but have not had the pleasure of intermingling with socially. Arrangements are under way to give the visitors excursions to any part of southwestern Oregon their time on the bay will permit them to make. There will be no little formality connected with the congress as it is possible to have on such occasions, though there will be addresses by some of the able speakers of Oregon and they will handle some of the business questions before the people of the state. The list of speakers will be made public within a short time. It is likely that the big steam schooner Nana Smith will arrive in the bay while the congress is in session and the visitors will have the opportunity to witness how 3,000,000 feet of lumber may be loaded under modern methods in 11 hours. During the week beginning September 5, Italian opera will be given by this company, which sang at the Academy of Music in New York for a whole year. Parents Are Russian.
Samoloff, the robust tenor of the company, is an American boy, born in New York city of Russian parents. He went to the public schools there, where he sang baritone at the school exhibitions. He sang at Carnegie Hall under Walter Damrosch, and joined an Italian opera company as a basso singer, taking the part of Mephisto in "Faust," and other roles.

Signor Merola, the present musical director of the International Grand Opera company, discovered him as a tenor and arranged for him to study in Italy. He has been singing at the La Scala-Quirinale theatre, Rome, and his debut was made in the Comunale theatre of Venice as Radames in "Aida." His repertoire includes several operas among them "Ernani," "Il Trovatore," "Otello" and some 20 others.

Colombini, who returned from Europe this year, is a pupil of Strigilia, and has been admired for several seasons by the Venice and Belgium operagoers. His fine singing of such roles as Jose and Turidha has given him much prominence. His particular success this season has been as Louis Ipanoff in "Fedora." He was spoken of by the San Francisco press as "the surprise of the year"—"a tenor who can act." Another of his successes is as Don Jose in "Carmen." Colombini is the original Fritz in "L'Amico Fritz."

Bertosini Is Italian.
Lina Bertosini is the pure Italian singer, born in Italy and educated by the best Italian maestros, she made her debut and sang in all the large cities and opera houses of Italy. She is an Italian in every sense of the word. She has a powerful soprano voice of great range and power and sings equally well in dramatic or lyric work.

Her great parts are "Nedda," "Leonora," "Desdemona," and "Susel" in "L'Amico Fritz," of which latter character she is the originator in the United States.

Saved Her Great Range.
Zarad, a bright and pleasing singer of the company, is a native of Rome, Italy, and studied in Milan and Paris. She was engaged from prima donna roles in Nice. BODY AT FOOT OF STAIRCASE FALLS

Long Search for Horace Logan Ends With Disclosure of Tragedy.

Yosemite, Cal., Aug. 14.—The mangled and decomposed body of Horace Logan, the young St. Matthews school student, who disappeared from Glacier Point a week ago, was found this afternoon at the foot of Staircase falls, near Camp Curry.
The theory that the lad missed his footing while attempting to descend the trail along the dangerous ledge was corroborated.
The boy's uncle, Milton M. Rosekrans, of Alhambra, offered \$1000 reward for information leading to the recovery of Logan, living or dead. It is understood that he was heir to two large estates and his relatives had hoped that he might merely have been kidnapped. The descent attempted by Logan is one of the most perilous that can be made by the guides and all visitors are warned against it.

Berkeley, Cal., Aug. 14.—Horace Logan was a nephew and ward of Miss I. Rosekrans, of 2709 College avenue and when not at school resided with her in this city. He had an uncle at Merced, I. Rosekrans, and another at San Francisco, Newton Rosekrans, of the S. S. Crocker company. Logan was 17 years of age and an athlete. He walked into the valley from Merced.

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WISE OLD LADY STAYS IN CAVE

Knowing Rescuers Will Find Her—Lost Five Days in Burning Desert.

San Bernardino, Cal., Aug. 14.—Lost on the desert for more than a week, Mrs. Hattie McCormick, 18 years of age, was found today by a searching party in an abandoned tunnel of the Daley-Moore mine near Victorville. Though suffering from hunger, she was apparently none the worse for her experience.

Mrs. McCormick disappeared about a week ago while on her way to visit a dancer near Victorville. For the last five days searching parties have been scouring the desert in the hope of finding her body. It was not thought possible that she could live for more than two days without water under the burning sun.

According to the story she told her rescuers today, Mrs. McCormick stumbled into the tunnel when her strength was nearly spent. There she found water, which, with the parcel of groceries she was carrying to her daughter, kept her alive. She was afraid to leave her water supply to venture again on the desert, and waited in the tunnel secure in the knowledge that she would be sure to be sent would find her.

PRINT NEWSPAPER IN 12 LANGUAGES

Chicago, Aug. 14.—A polyglot newspaper, printed in a dozen languages, is to be established by the United Societies for Local Self-Government for the advancement of the "home rule" and "personal liberty" principles. The publication is to be issued weekly, and at the start is to be printed in English, German, Polish, Bohemian and Italian, the intention being to extend the editions until every nationality represented in the societies has an issue printed in its own language.
