Insanity to Be Defense—Portland attorneys now generally believe that the insanity plea will constitute the defense of Mrs. Kate Van Winkle Collins, charged with the slaying of her youthful husband, Dr. R. A. Miles Collins. Mrs. Collins is now confined at the Crystal Springs sanitarium, declared by physicians to be mentally and physically unfit to occupy a cell at the county jail. Attorney Russell E. Sewall, counsel for Mrs. Collins, insists that the woman is insane and is in a like mental condition when she is alleged to have shot her husband in the basement of their home. He asserted that the woman would be in a condition to be confined in jail for several months.

Laborer Throws From Car—Antone Parich, a laborer about 30 years of age, was thrown from a crowded Sunnyside fifth and East Belmont streets, about 7 o'clock this morning, and sustained a broken leg. Parich, who was employed on construction work by the Portland Railway Light & Power Co., was taken to St. Vincent's hospital in the Red Cross ambulance. Just how the accident occurred none of the men in the car seem to be able to testify. The car was crowded and Parich was hanging on the step. Suddenly he fell. It is supposed he was accidentally pushed off. He sustained no injuries further than the broken leg.

Coroner Undecided About Inquest—At noon today the coroner had not decided whether it would be necessary to hold an inquest over the body of William Kirkpatrick, 60-year-old resident of San Jose, Cal., run down by a Mt. Scott car August 10, and who died at the Good Samaritan hospital Saturday night. A number of witnesses have testified that the inside door of the car was left open and that at Sunnyside station, the old man, unfamiliar with the workings of Portland streetcars, alighted and was hurled down by a train passing on the next track. The body will be taken to San Jose for burial.

Dies From Kerosene Explosion—Killed by an explosion of kerosene at her home Saturday night, Mrs. W. P. Busey, of North Edson and Catlin streets, St. John, died Sunday at noon. Mrs. W. P. Busey, who was visiting at the home of Mrs. Busey at the time of the explosion and was severely burned, will recover. Palmita to Test Ordinance—To test the validity of the city ordinance regulating fortune telling, palmita and the occult "sciences," Marjorie Correll has appealed to the circuit court from the judgment of the police court, where a fine of \$75 was imposed because the defendant accepted 50 cents from Pearl Chandler and the latter was unable to figure out any benefit. The case will go on the docket for trial during the fall term.

Robert McLean, former pastor of the Third Presbyterian church of Portland, preached the sermon in that church yesterday. Rev. A. J. Death of Mrs. Plumey—Mrs. Plumey, widow of the late Captain George R. Plumey, died this morning at Good Samaritan hospital. Mrs. Plumey was 71 years old, being born in Winnetka, Ill., in 1838. Donald H. Smith, of Donald H. Smith & Co., is her son. Captain Plumey for many years was a well known steamboat master on this coast.

The regular dramatic stock season opened at the Lyric yesterday, when the Athon stock company, from Chicago, presented "Doris," the famous English pastoral play with a greater role than a sermon. The patrons of this popular theatre were greatly surprised to find that Manager Dan Flood engaged for the season a company of players far above the average. Seven curtain calls at the end of the third act and the matinee tells the story of the company.

She occupied the pulpit at the Sunnyside Methodist church in the morning.

Billboard Ordinance—Councilman J. T. Ellis has been studying billboard ordinances of various cities with a view to drafting one for Portland. He conferred with Mayor Simon this morning to consult with him as to the advisability of modeling a regulatory measure after the billboard law in effect at Los Angeles. That city is noted for its freedom from objectionable advertising signs and boards.

Committee Will Investigate—Logging camp operators and sawmill owners in the district will appoint a joint committee to look into the advisability of establishing a grading and clearing law. J. PRISON BIRDS PREPARE TO FLY

Sheriff of Marion County Prevents Jail Delivery by Quick Work.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Aug. 15.—A wholesale jail delivery from the Marion county jail was prevented yesterday afternoon only by the quickness of Sheriff Harry Minto.

Louis Arstelt, recently released from the state penitentiary, and in the county jail charged with the holding of J. McDonald, the Liberty store keeper, had removed all but the last layer of bricks that lay between him and freedom when the sheriff and his deputy, William Bach, detected the noise and discovered the prisoner working in a dark corner of the jail.

Arstelt is confined in the jail with six others awaiting trial. Arstelt alone was at work at the wall, but it is supposed the others had assisted him. All were in the corridor of the jail from where the break would have been made and could have escaped had Arstelt been permitted to complete the job.

Improvised Tools Used.
The prisoner had taken one of the legs from the stove and used it as a lever. He had also a broom handle and a piece of cast iron about two feet long which had been wrenched from a pipe where it had served as a support. With these tools he pried the padlock off a wooden door that leads into a corridor used for the storage of wood. The sheriff, who was in sight of the other prisoners, was digging his way through the solid brick wall to the open air.

Arstelt was released from the Oregon state penitentiary a few weeks ago. Shortly afterward he attempted to hold up Mr. McDonald on the road leading to Liberty at 6 o'clock in the evening. When McDonald swore at the highwayman and attempted to drive him away he was shot at by Arstelt. The sheriff captured him later at Independence, after an exciting chase. Arstelt was seated near a lively stable at the sheriff drove up. Asking who the stranger was, Arstelt ran when he was told. He has been in jail at Salem for about a month.

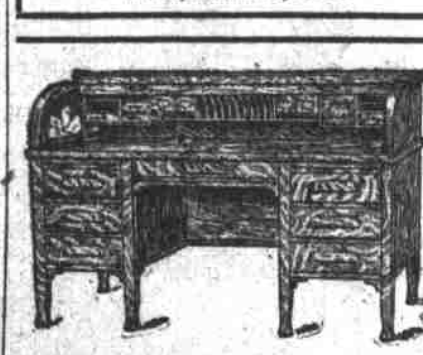

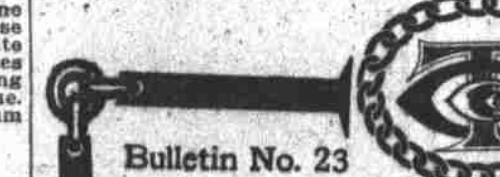

CHARGE PRESIDENT WITH UNFAIRNESS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
South Bend, Wash., Aug. 15.—Charging that the president of the Tokeland Oyster company has violated a trust imposed on him and asking the court to compel the president and one of the directors of the company to transfer to the company a valuable tract of oyster land containing 207 acres, three of the directors of the Tokeland Oyster company filed a complaint in the superior court late Saturday afternoon against Wallace Stuart, president, and Mrs. W. S. Kindred of Tokeland, director of the company.

The complaint alleges that at a recent special meeting of the directors, at which President Wallace Stuart presided, it was decided that the president inspect a certain tract of oyster ground owned by the Goss syndicate, and if in his judgment the tract was worth the price asked, \$8000, he was empowered to purchase it for the company. The tract adjoins the ground of the Tokeland Oyster company and has been planted with four cars of oysters. The complaint alleges that Stuart proceeded to inspect the grounds, but instead of purchasing for the company as instructed, he and Mrs. W. S. Kindred are alleged to have bought the tract and have since refused to transfer it to the company.
