

COOS BAY AWAITS VISITORS' ARRIVAL

Oregon-Idaho Development Congress Is to Convene at Marshfield August 20.

Breakwater's scheduled development congress at Marshfield, Wednesday evening, August 18, at 8 o'clock, the steamer Breakwater will sail from the Alsea dock on her special trip to the Oregon-Idaho Development congress meeting at Marshfield, Coos Bay. The steamer is scheduled to arrive at Marshfield Friday morning, turning, the Breakwater will leave Coos Bay Sunday morning, August 22, arriving at Portland Monday evening. The Breakwater's schedule will allow visitors to attend all sessions of the congress—August 20-21—and visit the various points of interest in the Coos Bay and Coquille River valley sections.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Aug. 17.—The Oregon-Idaho Development congress is to be held in Coos Bay August 20 and 21, attracting many visitors from different parts of the state will attend. Extensive preparations have been made for the visitors' entertainment. Most of them will arrive Thursday evening, August 19, Friday morning the delegation will be taken on the steamer Breakwater to the lower bay, where the life saving crew will give an exhibition, and the visitors will inspect the government jetty.

First business session will be held at 9 o'clock Friday afternoon at the Masonic opera house. Dr. J. T. McGowan, president of the Marshfield chamber of commerce, will give the address of welcome. Others will speak as follows:

"First Anniversary of Oregon-Idaho Development League," President E. H. Hester, Salem; "A Plea for Opening Central and Western Oregon," Hon. C. M. McArthur, speaker house of representatives; "Liberal Policies in the Development of a Commonwealth," George E. Farwell, Portland.

A feature of the program will be a detailed report by Chief Engineer F. Haines of the work which has been done toward making a survey out of Coos Bay for a railroad.

Friday evening a business session will be held at the opera house. The topics of the discussion will be as follows: "A Word from the Other End of the Line," R. L. Atkinson, secretary of the league; "Future Development of the Coos Bay Harbor," Hon. W. C. Hawley; "Oregon as Viewed by a Former Member of the Legislature," Hon. R. O. Smith.

A. Smith, Judge G. H. Schellenberger and C. A. Smith of Minneapolis.

The Saturday night session will be held in the opera house at Marshfield, and the following addresses given: "A Greater Oregon Means a Greater Portland," C. J. Jackson, The Oregon Daily Journal; "Legal Aspect of State Aid for Railroads," Attorney General A. M. Crawford; "The Development of a Great Water Harbor," Blinger Hermann, Roseburg; "A Pull-Together Talk," Dr. J. R. Wetherbee, president Portland Commercial club.

After the closing business session Saturday night an informal smoker will be given for the delegates at the opera house. Sunday a special excursion train will run to Coquille City and make connection with the boats to Bandon.

Richmond P. Hobson's Birthday.

Richmond Pearson Hobson, representative in congress from the Sixth Alabama district, was born in Greensboro, Ala., August 17, 1870. After a three years' course at the Southern university he entered the United States Naval academy and was graduated in 1889. In 1893 he was promoted to the grade of naval constructor, and as such was on active duty with the North Atlantic squadron at the beginning of the war with Spain. It was during this period that he rendered efficient service at the bombardment of Matanzas and in the expedition against San Juan, Porto Rico. Shortly afterward he gained wide fame by his heroic feat in sinking the collier Merrimac in the harbor off Santiago to stop the egress of the Spanish fleet commanded by Admiral Cervera. After the war Captain Hobson served for a period in the far east and upon his return to the United States in 1903 he resigned from the navy to go on the lecture platform. Shortly afterward he was nominated and elected to congress on the Democratic ticket.

EXPLOSION KILLS LABORER

Explosion Wrecks House and Bodies of Victims Torn to Fragments.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 17.—Word was received in this city today of an explosion which wrecked the dynamite house of the Western Explosives company, limited, at Tunnel Bay, Bowen Island, yesterday, and caused the death of five men.

News of the disaster was brought in by James Reid, who is employed at the works. He says William Sellars, an American, and four Chinamen were victims, their bodies being torn to fragments by the powerful explosives. The building in which the explosion occurred was a dynamite house, and the explosion is a mystery, as every precaution had been taken to prevent an occurrence of this kind.

The Western Explosives company is owned by eastern capitalists. Sellars was formerly employed at the powder mills at Placito, Cal.

LAY CORNERSTONE FOR NEW CHURCH

With the usual Methodist ritualistic services read by Bishop Charles W. Smith, the cornerstone of the new Mount Tabor church was laid before a large congregation last night. The Mount Tabor church has been on its present site since 1833 and the hill itself was named after the first church founded.

After the services, the big sandstone block, 3x24x16, was swung into place. It contained records of the church to be opened only on the destruction of the new church. Rev. E. H. Henderson, district superintendent, Bishop Smith and others delivered short talks. Rev. J. W. McCulloch, pastor of the church, also spoke, telling of the plans for the new church which, when completed, will be the largest in the city. Several of the oldest members of the church attended the cornerstone laying.

WILL HAVE CHANCE TO PLEAD TOMORROW

Ernest G. Hymans, accused of forgery of the death certificate of Golda W. Rowland in 1901, was among those arraigned before Judge Gensens in the circuit court yesterday afternoon. He was allowed until tomorrow to plead, this being the request of his counsel, Jeffrey Lennon. An effort was made to reduce his bail but Judge Gensens would not consent to make it less than \$200.

Anthony R. Conrad and Ernest Newton, two of the youths charged with a serious crime, are waiting for the trial, an Arista girl, in prosecuting witness, were also arraigned and allowed until tomorrow to enter their pleas.

President of American Association Says the Trade Needs Protection.

Los Angeles, Aug. 17.—"I believe the granting of high protection throughout the country is the only way to prevent the humiliation and degradation of the pharmaceutical business, and permit a drugist to maintain his standing in a community as an upright and honorable citizen," is the opinion of J. E. Remington, president of the American Pharmaceutical association.

In discussing the liquor question and its relation to the drug trade, Remington announced his belief that the present liquor laws could be improved with beneficial effects to the drug business and the men engaged in it. He said:

"The drugist is forced by the trade to carry liquor in stock, and anyone can get them by presenting a prescription. He is thus forced to assume the role of a saloonkeeper, and often it injures his standing in a community."

This question will be the subject of serious deliberation at the national convention of the pharmaceutical association.
