

RETIREMENT OF NOTED PRELATE

State of Health Seems to
Have Closed Archbishop
Keane's Career.

Dubuque, Iowa, Aug. 18.—The irremovable priests of the Roman Catholic archdiocese of Dubuque met today to discuss the selection of a coadjutor to Archbishop Keane. They will make a list of three names, and this list will then be sent to a meeting of the irremovable priests of the dioceses of Lincoln, Sioux City, Dubuque, Omaha and Davenport, which together form the province of Dubuque. The bishop will pass upon the list, and it will then be forwarded to Rome, from whence the name of the new archbishop will be announced.

Despite the several denials that have been issued, it is generally understood that the appointment of a coadjutor will mean the permanent retirement of Archbishop Keane from all active duty. The venerable prelate, who will be 70 years old next month, has been in ill health for a long time, and his physicians have warned him that he must cease active work entirely. His retirement will be an almost irreparable loss to the Roman Catholic church in America.

Cardinalate Was Possible.
Intense in his Americanism, loyal in his friendship, boundless in his tolerance, and generous in his aid, Archbishop Keane stands as a splendid type of manhood. A man of profound learning, he has been recognized for years as one of the heads of the hierarchy of the United States, and has enjoyed a wide acquaintance throughout the country. His many admirers regret his forced retirement all the more for they had fondly anticipated his elevation to the sacred college or to some other eminent position, where his culture, his eloquence and his cheerful optimism might find full fruition.

Archbishop Keane was born in Ireland September 12, 1833. He came with his family to the United States in 1846, was educated at St. Charles college and at St. Mary's seminary, Baltimore, and in 1860 entered the Roman Catholic priesthood. After serving for a time as assistant pastor of St. Patrick's church, Washington, he was made bishop of Richmond.

Keane as Educator.
In 1884 Bishop Keane took part in the third plenary council of Baltimore, which time it was decided that there should be established a great national institution for post collegiate and highly specialized education to be called the Catholic University of America, and Bishop Keane was chosen one of the directors and was subsequently requested by the many admirers of his holiness, Leo XIII, to resign his diocese in order to devote himself entirely to the assistance of the university.

He continued as head of the university until 1897, when he resigned, and went to Rome to become closely attached to Leo XIII. By his erudition and broad culture he became one of the advisers to the American church near the person of the pope, and established for himself a name which is now known the Catholic world over.

MAN WANDERS FAR FROM HOME

Mentally Unbalanced, William Kennedy, Waukegan, Ill., Is Located.

Seattle, Aug. 18.—Missing from his home at Waukegan, Ill., for several weeks, William Kennedy, a prosperous business man, lies in a Seattle hospital in a comatose condition, but physicians believe he will be restored to his normal mental condition.

Unable to speak and apparently unable to hear or to have any idea of what he is doing, Kennedy was found on the water front several days ago and sent to the city jail. It was believed by the officer that he was intoxicated.

At police headquarters it was found that Kennedy was suffering from some mental disorder and he was sent to the city hospital. Yesterday his identity became known and his friends and relatives in Illinois were notified.

Kennedy has before suffered from mental lapses, during which he travels long distances without knowing where he is going or why. When he disappeared from Waukegan, Kennedy told his friends he was going to a sanatorium, having just recovered from an attack of typhoid fever.

Instead he was direct to Vancouver, B. C., where he remained for some time, later coming to Seattle.

GERMANS OWN A.-Y.-P. TODAY

Teutons From Over the
West Celebrating in Honor
of the Fatherland.

Seattle, Aug. 18.—The strains of "Die Wacht am Rhein" and other airs dear to the hearts of the German people echoed through the grounds of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition today when a large outpouring of Teutons did honor to the fatherland in celebration of the day set apart for them.

The program for the day is an elaborate one, starting with a big parade at 10 o'clock in the morning and ending with a fireworks display this evening.

There were exercises in the auditorium, athletic contests in the stadium, large delegations of Germans have arrived from Portland, Bellingham, Tacoma, North Yakima, Aberdeen and many other cities and towns to take part in the day's program.

COLORED BUSINESS MEN IN CONVENTION

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 18.—The tenth annual meeting of the National Negro Business league began in this city today and will continue until Saturday. The meeting is attended by more than 100 delegates from 25 states. The opening session was held in the Chestnut street church, and was devoted to routine business. The session tomorrow night, at which President Booker T. Washington will deliver his annual address, and at which Henry Watterson is also expected to speak, will be held in Macaulay's theatre.

The program for the three days' session is one of more than ordinary interest. On the list of speakers are colored bankers, cotton growers, town builders, farmers and gardeners, real estate dealers, contractors, lawyers, editors, druggists and merchants, who will tell the story of how they got their start and of the struggles that brought ultimate success.

The league was organized in Boston nine years ago, with Booker T. Washington as its president. The object of the organization is to inform the world of the progress the colored race is making and to stimulate local business enterprises and to encourage the organization of local business men for the purpose of furthering commercial growth. There are now about 500 local leagues, which are doing the work of the national league in different parts of the country.

CHINESE CONSCIENCE A PECULIAR THING

San Francisco, Aug. 18.—Kwang Lee, a Chinese who was naturalized in St. Louis in 1874, wants to have his citizenship papers cancelled. After having the right to vote for president, congressmen and every other candidate running for office for 35 years, he appeared yesterday before United States Attorney Devlin and declared that he got his citizenship papers by fraud and wanted to have them cancelled.

Kwang holds the unique position of being the first Chinese to relinquish his American franchise on his own volition. Devlin immediately complied with the applicant's request, and filed an application in the United States district court asking that his naturalization papers be cancelled for fraud. No reason for his action is advanced by the Chinese, except that his conscience troubled him.

LOW RISK LIFE FOR RESCUE BOY

Ralph Kasper Drowns in
Asylum Slough While
Playing.

While playing with a number of youngsters in an old boat in Asylum slough, just inside of Hawthorne park, Ralph Kasper, aged 9 years, of 223 East Thirtieth street, tumbled from the boat and drowned before help could reach him. His predicament was seen by a teamster and by his brother and two other youngsters who were playing with him, but none of them could render any aid.

Frank Williamson, the teamster, was passing down East Salmon street just after the boy fell into the water and heard the screams of his companions. He looked over there but thought the boys were playing and that the little fellow was swimming. Again he looked and this time the boy's head was below the surface, while his companions were running panic stricken up the bank. This time he realized the danger and with a number of other teamsters hurried to the scene.

Several minutes were lost in finding a way to get into the park, which is really private property owned by Mrs. Kasper. The boys were finally reached the pond no trace could be found of the little fellow's body. Rakes were secured and the spot thoroughly drained.

A hurry up call was sent to the police station and Officer Blackman was dispatched from Grand avenue and Morrison. After the body had been in the water for some 20 minutes he arrived and under his direction a systematic search was made for the body.

Diving repeatedly, Officer Blackman, John Ballou, a youngster only 11 years old, and another boy, failed at first to find any trace of the body.

Finally young Ballou came up after a dive, saying that he had been unable to grab it as he went by. After a number of futile dives into the water, dragging was again resorted to, and the body was finally located. It had then been in the water for fully an hour and too late to leave any hope for resuscitation.

The little fellow was the son of G. A. Kasper, a painter. The father was nearly heart broken as attempt after attempt was made to bring the body to the surface, and finally what the body was found, broke down altogether and had to be taken home. He had been guided to the pond by the other brother who had been playing with the boy when he fell in.

The mother, too, was present and directed the search in vain by pointing out to her husband the point where she was sure the body would be found.

Diving was made especially perilous owing to the fact that the bottom of the slough is full of sticks and debris of many kinds and the divers ran the risk of losing possibly their eye sight in hitting one of the submerged sticks.

FRIENDS APPEAR IN BEHALF OF YOUTHS

Three of the Arleta youths concerned in the affair with Veda Griffin, which resulted in their indictment by the grand jury on criminal charges, were given character helps by testimony in the circuit court yesterday afternoon. Leo La Tiesler and Ernest Newton, who were good boys up to the time of this affair, Judge Gatens was told. The court was asked to parole these boys and also William Perkins for their previous good conduct witnesses are ready to vouch.

All three of these boys are expected to plead guilty to a reduced charge Friday morning, when Judge Gatens will again take up the matter. Then they are likely to be given a chance to redeem themselves on probation. The fourth youth indicted by the grand jury for the same affair, Ernest Newton, is said to be determined to plead not guilty and fight the case through.

Those who act as the boys yesterday, principally for Leo Tiesler or Conrad, are all residents of Arleta. They were Rev. E. A. Smith, Postmaster E. A. Chambers, Peter Stahan and William Woodham.

The case of Harry Mitchell, who is accused of taking part in a holdup, was ordered transferred to the juvenile court. He is under 17 years of age.

Fire Apparatus Faulty.

North Yakima, Wash., Aug. 18.—Naches city, the upper terminus of the North Yakima & Valley railway, was very nearly wiped out by fire Sunday afternoon. The case hotel, the largest structure in the town, was burned to the ground, and it was only by the efforts of citizens, assisted by two ball teams that were playing a game of baseball near by, that the flames were kept from spreading to all the other structures in the village. There is a good supply of water in the town, but no hose could be found that would fit

the fire hydrants. A bucket brigade prevented the fire from spreading. The loss amounts to about \$10,000, partially insured.
