OHIO'S POLITICAL POT SIMMERING**Up to Republicans to Defeat Governor Harmon—Taft Will Take Active Part.**

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 19.—The political pot in Ohio is already beginning to simmer in anticipation of the next contest for the governorship. The fight is still a year distant, but when it comes the buckeye state will undoubtedly be the focus of all eyes in the presidential world, for the result probably will have an important bearing on the next presidential contest.

Governor Harmon will be re-nominated by the Democrats without opposition, according to the present program. The Republican leaders recognize the necessity of defeating him for a second term in order that he may not become a formidable figure for the democratic presidential nomination in 1912. If he should be re-elected to the governorship, he undoubtedly would be a strong figure in the next Democratic presidential convention. If defeated, he would probably not be. The Ohio Republican leaders have no doubts as to the result of the campaign with William H. Taft of Ohio and Judson Harmon of Ohio leading the two tickets, especially if Harmon should be made governor twice. So they are already laying the wires to accomplish his political downfall.

Hard Task Before Republicans.

Nearly every prominent Republican in Ohio is being considered by the politicians to determine whether he is the right man to pit against Governor Harmon in the next race. Senator Burton was mentioned for a time as a possible nominee for the governorship, but his stand in regard to the tariff bill, his belief in the possibility of the governorship, and his position as secretary of the interior, James R. Garfield is also mentioned.

SISTERS MEET AS STRANGERS**Separated for 47 Years When They Married and Left Home.**

After being separated for 47 years, during 46 of which neither knew what had become of the other, Mrs. Kate Goodrich, aged 52, met her sister, Mrs. D. C. Mills yesterday at the home of Mrs. G. C. Morris, 294 East First street. Mrs. Mills is now 71 years old and has been a widow for 20 years. She lives in Heppner at present, but is visiting here for a few days.

The women are daughters of Leonard Bowker, who lived in Coldwater, Mich., and a brother, Milo Bowker, died in Portland about a year ago.

Mrs. Mills said yesterday: "My sister married and went to Grand Rapids 47 years ago and I lost track of her. We are half sisters. Some time ago I roomed in the same house in Spokane as a family named Bowker and found an inquiry that they were relatives of my missing sister. So I found her."

"Of course I did not recognize her and she did not know me. We were young when we became separated, but it didn't take long to become acquainted."

Both women have grown children. Mrs. Mills having a son, aged 47, and Mrs. Goodrich having one aged 25.

APPLE PACKERS TO ORGANIZE UNION

GAVEL MADE OF HISTORIC WOOD**Secretary Himes Presents to the Insurance Men's Society.**

Secretary George H. Himes of the Oregon Historical society has presented to the National Society of Mutual Insurance Men a gavel made of seven different pieces of wood selected by the maker on account of historical associations. A complete description of the gavel is contained in the following letter from Mr. Himes to Secretary Barry of the Oregon branch of the Mutuals:

"B. L. Barry, secretary Oregon Society of Mutual Insurance, Dayton, O. Dear Sir: Check your record as a result of my suggestions last Saturday, I hand you the gavel I have prepared, and the following is a history of the pieces of wood used in the making:

"1. Handle, made of ash grown in the Waldo hills, Marion county, taken from a rail split in the winter of 1847-48, by Ralph C. Geer, an uncle of Ex-Governor T. T. Geer. This rail was in actual use 60 years.

"2. The piece of wood where the handle enters is from a Royal Ann cherry tree, which was one of 1000 trees of different varieties which were used by the 'Traveling Nursery' that Henderson Luelling brought across the plains to Oregon from Salem, Henry county, Iowa, in 1847, and set out about half a mile south of Milwaukie, Or. That was the first grafted fruit stock west of the Rocky mountains, and was the beginning of the fruit industry of the Pacific coast.

"3. The black wood is a piece of Oregon oak which was found in a heavy ground in Marion county, Oregon, a few years ago, near the reform school, a few miles south of Salem. Some chemical property in the earth or water at the place where this wood was found is the cause of its being black."

"4. Above the black wood will be found a piece of Manzanita. This was secured on the banks of Rich gulch, Jackson county, Oregon, near the site of the first permanent mining camp in Oregon, established in 1851.

"5. Next after the Manzanita is a piece of red cedar from Wahwah mountain, New Jersey, about 20 miles from New York, upon which a small detachment of Jersey militia were posted to apprise General Washington, at Morristown, of the movements of the British fleet under Lord Howe, and of the British army under Sir Henry Clinton, in the campaign of 1778.

"6. Oregon grape wood—the state flower of Oregon. This wood was used by Lewis and Clark in their journals of 1804-45. The shrub was botanically classified as Oregon grape, or berberis aquifolium, or holly leaved barberry, by Mr. Pursh, an English botanist, about 1812.

"7. A specimen of manzanita from the Philippine islands brought to Oregon about eight years ago.

"Thus you see, Mr. Barry, this gavel is essentially a historical relic of your years."

WILL ASK TO HAVE SANDY ROAD PAVED

H. J. Blasing, member of the Rose City Improvement association will tomorrow afternoon appear before the city council with a petition signed by all but two or three of the property owners along the Sandy road asking that the road be widened to 80 feet and that it be paved throughout with hard surface pavement. He is a committee appointed by the Rose City club for the purpose. But little opposition has been given the project and practically every property owner is in favor of the movement. Electric lights are to be petitioned for too, as well as a school. It was reported last night at the meeting of the club that here are 110 children within the school age in the park and the school board is to be asked to rent two stores on the Sandy road for school buildings.

GENERAL EDWARDS LOST IN EUROPE.

Washington, Aug. 19.—General Edwards, chief of the bureau of insular affairs, is officially lost in Europe. He went abroad as soon as the Philippine tariff bill was signed, and left an itinerary outlining his trip. He has not been heard from since he landed at Plymouth and numerous cable messages sent to him have not been delivered. The cable companies report that they cannot find him.

GENERAL BOOTH MAY GO BLIND**Operation Upon Salvation Army Leader for Cataract Is Unsuccessful.**
