Inspecting County Roads.—County Judge Webster, Commissioner Lightner, Road Superintendent and Superintendent Jackson of the county farm left this morning in Jackson's automobile for the eastern part of the county where they will remain for two days inspecting the main county roads. Tonight they will stop in Troutdale. Besides the county roads the bridge over the Sandy and the new county farm near Fairview will receive attention.

Criminal Docket Monday.—Next Monday Presiding Judge Bronson will call the civil and criminal docket in the circuit court for the setting of cases for the September and October terms of court. Thereafter the docket will not again be called until the opening of the September term. Beginning Monday, however, the court will be open for argument on motions for the two weeks intervening before the beginning of the fall term.

Lost Arm Under Oath.—Fifteen thousand dollars damages for the loss of his right arm are asked by James Pinder in a suit filed in the circuit court against the Portland Railway, Light &

Power company. He was injured on the night of May 29, he says, while alighting from a car at Archer Lodge, on the St. Johns line. He alleges that the conductor gave the starting signal too soon and he was thrown beneath the rear wheels. Charles W. Fulton, ex-United States senator, is attorney for the plaintiff.

Go to View Lions Fir Cemetery.—Mayor Simon, Councilman K. K. Kubli and Judge J. C. Moreland will visit Lions Fir cemetery this afternoon to look at the proposed location of a retaining wall to be built along East Stark street. The wall is necessary to prevent graves from tumbling into the street. Wilson Benfield, manager of the Lions Fir Cemetery association, says that his association does not own the greater part of the land upon which the wall will abut and that the Masonic cemetery should defray the greater portion of the cost. Judge Moreland represents the Masons and he will satisfy himself of the correctness of Benfield's statement. Mayor Simon will determine for himself how far the city is responsible.

Injured by Falling Beam.—Hurt by a falling beam at the Bunker Hill rock quarry near Stella, Wash., yesterday, P. Vincenzo and C. Boreo, Italian laborers, are resting easily at St. Vincent's hospital today. The men were brought to Portland on the steamer Hassalo yesterday, and taken to the hospital in the Red Cross ambulance. The men were hurt when the cable supporting the derelict beam broke and the pole crashed down upon them.

Loses His Pocketbook.—Fearing he had been robbed, Kenyon Butterfield of New York city, now stopping at the Hotel Portland, has reported the loss of his pocketbook containing two railroad tickets to New York and bank drafts for \$400. He believes his pocketbook was picked, or that he lost the purse somewhere between the corner of Third and Morrison streets and the hotel.

KEEPER BELIEVES CHIMP IS HUMAN

Big Ape in Circus Steals Liquor and Becomes Imaginative.



"Darwin," the Chimp.

"You see, it was like this," explained Frank Smith to Alf T. Ringling, one of the proprietors of the Ringling Bros., world's greatest show, "I didn't give the 'chimp' the booze, he just naturally stole it. The 'chimp' is not sick and he's not a very big ape. He's just got a little nose on."

The Smith of this story is the superintendent of the menagerie with the big show and the "chimp" is "Darwin," a mauling monkey that attracts more attention than any other single animal in the great collection.

One morning recently "Darwin" was found reeling in his cage; standing up only to fall to the floor, and emitting sounds indicative of either distress or elation. Mr. Ringling, hearing these fearful cries and fearing the worst, made a bee line rush for the glass house in which "Darwin" lives, forcing his way through a crowd of circus attendants surrounding the chimpanzee's cage.

Hard by stood Smith, holding his sides and laughing as he had never laughed before. A wooden upright had been placed in the cage and "Darwin" had brought up against it and encircled it with his arms, emulating the human being who sometimes finds a lamp post the one best bet on a dark and especially rainy night.

The laughter of the crowd told Mr. Ringling that all was well and Smith's explanation was satisfactory and sufficient. The night before "Darwin" keeper had given the animal a drink as

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a cough preventive. Then the keeper had carefully left the bottle in the cage. "Darwin" had discovered the contents and was feeling the effect. Still some folks think he's not human," says Smith.

And "Darwin" had a "morning after," also very much like a human being. As proof of the latter proposition the circus photographer offers a likeness of "Darwin" as pictured here and he has underlined it "Oh, such a headache!"

"Darwin" is a queer creature, presumably of the monkey family, but resembling more a human being than some men. He has been named in honor of the scientist who long ago interested himself in just such things as this animal.

"Darwin" lives in a miniature house with a fireplace, wax windows, electric lights and pictures on the wall. In a little backroom he has an iron bed and table. He sits at his table, drinks from a bottle, eats with a knife and fork and after his repast smokes a smoking pipe. His house has wheels and occupies the place of honor in the menagerie of the circus.
