

STRIKE AGAIN IMMINENT AT CHICAGO

West and North Side Unions Reject Wage Schedule Offered by President Quinlan of the Traction Company—10,000 Affected.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Aug. 20.—Chicago again faces a strike of streetcar men. The west and north side unions, 2500 strong, met last night and flatly rejected the wage schedule offered by President Quinlan. President Mahon, head of the national union, has been wired for.

The south side men will vote on the proposed wage schedule Saturday night, at which time Mahon will be here to reopen negotiations with the traction company officials.

The union and traction officials are astonished by the action of the men. Ten thousand will be affected if a strike is declared and traffic on the city's surface lines will be paralyzed.

Mountain Climbers Return From Mount Baker Outing.

The Mazama trip to Mount Baker was a fine outing and a great success in every way, according to J. W. Marsh, clerk of the federal court, who has returned home.

"Mount Baker," he said today, "is in the Selkirk system of mountains and that is saying enough as to the character of the region for ruggedness. There is nothing like it further south. The mountain itself is a snow covered dome about 10,000 feet high. It is surrounded everywhere by rocky crags, pinnacles and peaks, most attractive and interesting to the mountaineer."

"This approach to the mountain by way of the source of the middle fork of the Nuckack river is new. The trail having just been made by forest rangers through the forest reserve, so that the region was as completely new and wild as one could wish."

Mr. Marsh made the ascent of the mountain on August 8 in advance of the main party. There were 14 all told in the party, among the number being C. J. Sholes, Dr. O. H. Allen, J. W. Marsh, Miss David and Miss Hayek of Portland, Dr. Frisell of New York, and Dr. Hahn of Seattle. It took the party 6 hours and 20 minutes to reach the summit, a climb of about 5000 feet of it snow climbing. Mr. Sholes overtook the party at the crater and led it to the north crater wall to the summit peak, and returning made a round trip record from camp of less than 10 hours. All parties had experience in mountain climbing and made the climb easily and enjoyably.

Exploring the glaciers, snows and peaks in the vicinity, fishing trips, camp fires at night with "kangaroo" cooking, and a number of other pleasures of the trip, as well as the added greatly to the camp's stock of wit and humor. The trip was a most successful one. The party returned to the city on August 10.

SAYS KENTUCKY IS DRY STATE

Judge Robbins Believes Westerners Have Erroneous Impression.

"I find westerners convinced that the blue grass state flows with milk and honey, but with whiskey," Judge Joseph Ewing Robbins of Kentucky said today. "But as a matter of fact 100 of our counties are dry. The few counties remaining are going dry and until they do the liquor question will be the biggest one before our people."

PHILIPPINE IMPORTS MUST COME DIRECT

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Aug. 20.—To enter the United States, Philippine goods must come direct, according to the ruling of the treasury department at Washington.

The ruling was communicated to Collector of the Port, Frederick Stratton, and was made necessary because Stratton had seized and held for duty several packages of Philippine cigars which had been transhipped at Shanghai.

Stratton contended that the shipments to conform with the Payne tariff law, should remain in the same vessel en route from the islands to an American port. The shippers took an opposite stand and declared the packages should enter the country duty free, as they were shipped under one manifest. Stratton is upheld by the department.

OREGON MEN ENTHUSIASTIC

Insurance Men Can't Resist Investing Here in Portland.

Portland and Oregon opportunities have captured the delegates to the fourteenth annual convention of the insurance men now in session here. Al- though the Portland delegates have made investments in Portland real estate, while many others are planning to take up residence in the city.

One and all the delegates attending the convention have been charmed with the prospects here and are enthusiastic over the future of Portland as a city and Oregon as a state. The trip taken up the Columbia yesterday to Cascade Locks was a revelation to the visiting men from other sections of the United States and all are loud in their praises of the country, its scenery, its fertility, its development and the possibilities of its future.

The last session of the convention was called to order this morning at 10 o'clock at which time the reports of the officers for the past year were taken up for consideration.

The officers will be elected at the convention, the two important events of the day being the election of officers for the coming year and the selection of a convention city for 1940. It is conceded that the next convention will go to Peoria, Ill., the work of the delegation from that state having been successful in winning the delegates to the decision.

The old officers will be re-elected in the majority of cases. One new officer will be elected, that of corresponding secretary. In all probability Harry L. Keefe, present secretary of the association, will be given the new office.

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JOB WAITING FOR ARMY OF MEN

Hill Interests Anxious to Complete Deschutes Line Into Central Oregon With in Year's Time—Seeking Terminal.

"If I could get 5000 workmen today I would put them all into the Deschutes canyon to push the Oregon Trunk line into central Oregon," said John F. Stevens, chief engineer of J. J. Hill, and recent purchaser of the Oregon Trunk railroad, while at the Portland today.

He added: "I am ready to employ 15 or 20 times as many men as Porter Bros. have now at work. We are very anxious to complete the road and get it into operation. I should say that if legislation does not hinder our work too much that the Oregon Trunk railroad into central Oregon will be running its trains within a year."

"Of course, it is impossible for me just at this time to say how long the actual construction will require. But I am going over the whole line very soon, and then I will know better. One of the important objects of such a trip will be to find a terminus for the railroad. I know I am going to terminate somewhere in central Oregon, but I will not know just exactly where until I have looked over the situation for myself."

Stevens concluded, "we are not fooling, and we don't want any one to get such an impression. The railroad will be built as fast as possible. Unlimited money is backing this venture."

If Mr. Stevens could fulfill his desire and put to work in the Deschutes canyon 15 times as many men as are employed there now by Porter Bros., it would put 50,000 men to work in Deschutes canyon. But he says he will give every able bodied man who applies to him a good job, and one that will last a long time.

THREE YEARS FOR CHAS. LEE

Circuit Court Hears Pleas of Erring Youths—Boys on Parole.

Charles Lee this morning pleaded guilty to a statutory charge before Circuit Judge Gates and was sentenced to serve three years in the penitentiary. This is the shortest term permitted by the law. He has been working as an operator in a moving picture show.

The cases of Leo Le Tissier and Anthony E. Conrad, charged with a similar offense, in which two other Arieta youths are also involved, was continued until the district attorney discusses the question of parole with the presiding judge. William Parker, another defendant in the same case, pleaded not guilty with the understanding that this may be withdrawn if the boys are permitted to plead guilty and be paroled.

Simon Cohen pleaded not guilty to the charge of larceny, with the understanding that his plea may also be withdrawn later.

JURGES NAMED FOR STATE FAIR AT SALEM

Salem, Aug. 20.—Judges to make the awards at the state fair, which opens in Salem Monday, September 12, have been selected, and Secretary Frank Welch of the state board of agriculture has made partial announcement of the list.

N. H. Gentry of Sedalia, Mo., will judge the beef breeds. An effort is being made to secure Professor Konstantin Haecker, a noted authority, to judge the dairy breeds, but it is not certain that Professor Haecker will be able to come to the Pacific coast this fall.

Thomas Brunk of Polk county will judge the longhorn breeds. Dr. H. Shaw on the united department of agriculture will judge the middle wool and fine wool sheep. N. A. Gentry of Sedalia, Mo., will judge Angora goats, and E. D. King of Burlington, Kan., will judge the swine.

Henry Berrar of San Jose has been secured to judge the poultry, and William Sonchouse of Napa, Cal., has accepted the invitation of the board to judge the pigeons again.

Professor John A. Craig of the United States agricultural experiment station at Stillwater, Oklahoma, will judge the draft horses; George M. Rommell also of the United States department of agriculture, the carriage horses.

Uberto H. Strider of South Solon, Ohio, has been selected as starter for the pacing and trotting events at the state fair this fall.

Magoo Goes to St. Louis.

Seattle, Aug. 20.—Lee Magoo, the crack firstbaseman of the local Northwestern league baseball team will be seen in the uniform of the St. Louis National league club next season. The deal for his transfer was consummated by wire today. It is understood that President Dugdale will receive approximately \$2000 for Magoo.
