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BELIEVE REED WAS A LOGGER

No One Claims Body Found in River—Buried by County.

Unclaimed, the body of John Reed, found floating in the Willamette river yesterday morning and fished out by deputies from the office of the coroner, was buried yesterday afternoon at the poor farm.

Supposed to have been a logger and about whom nothing was known further than that he had \$18 on deposit at Erickson's saloon, Second and Burnside streets, no relatives or friends of the drowned man could be found yesterday by the coroner.

When the body of Reed, whose identity was ascertained from papers in his pockets, was picked up at the North Bank wharf, foot of Seventeenth street, a partly filled bottle of whiskey was found on him. That the man, while intoxicated, was accidentally drowned is the theory of the coroner.

Reed was about 45 years of age. As far as employees at Erickson's saloon remember, he told them he was a logger. When fished out he had been in the water about seven days.

Deckhands on the upper Albina ferry saw the body floating down the river yesterday morning about 7 o'clock. They notified the coroner, who sent out deputies to recover it. No inquest was held.

CHAUFFEUR'S LICENSE GONE

Automobile Board Says W. M. Tyler Must Lay Off Until October 1.

After an investigation of the collision between automobiles driven by W. M. Tyler and A. F. Brady, August 5, near Rockwood, on the Base Line road, the automobile regulatory board yesterday afternoon suspended Tyler until October 1.

Dr. C. B. Brown and George W. Kleiser, the only members of the board present, were of the opinion that Tyler's license should be revoked absolutely, but a strong plea for the chauffeur was made by Fred T. Merrill, who was the worst sufferer by reason of the collision. On Merrill's assurance that Tyler is sober, industrious and under ordinary circumstances a skillful and careful driver the board decided to let him off with a suspension.

The board announced that the following applicants for chauffeur's badges had successfully passed an examination held in the city hall yesterday: F. T. Bolton, W. H. Silvey, R. C. Forre, D. C. Reynolds, G. B. Hagaman, J. McDonald, Robert Lill, C. W. Paulson, Ira Smith.

Another examination will be held next Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the city hall. Hereafter the requirements for chauffeurs will be much more difficult. All applicants will be expected

to be well informed on the automobile legislation of Oregon and the city of Portland, to be able to bound the fire limits in this city to state the speed limit for automobiles inside and outside the fire district, the rules for traffic on crossings and all other information which a practical chauffeur should have at his command.

with that law, which requires all buildings used as theatres to be fireproof. So, whether or not the proposed theatre ordinance prohibiting the use of frame showhouses after April 1, 1911, is passed, the executive board can force theatre owners to comply with the present ordinance.

If the board should see fit to use its authority it could, therefore, close such places as the Baker, Bungalow and other well known theatres.

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Following is section 31 of ordinance No. 14148:

"Existing buildings—All existing buildings of the kind hereinbefore specified shall be made to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, under the direction and supervision of the executive board, to such extent as may be deemed necessary and practicable by said board."

"I'm not in favor," said City Building Inspector Dobson this morning, "of continuing the life of any of these frame theatres any longer than the law allows. I hate to see the Heilig theatre reopened but I think all theatre owners should be treated alike. Therefore, if this show house can be reopened it should be given the right to run. If the council passes the proposed frame theatre ordinance the United States will be discontinued in 15 months from now, anyway, and if the Heilig's owners believe they can reopen the building to their own advantage knowing how short

the life of the theatre may be it is their privilege to do so."

Following is the letter written by Mr. Dobson yesterday to Messrs. Bernstein & Cohen of the company which owns the Heilig:

"Second—The members or portions of the building which show indications of decay or deterioration must be replaced with sound timbers and any portion of the building which shows indications of weakness from loose joints or any other reason, shall be placed in good condition, so as to be perfectly safe and secure."

"Third—Concrete footings of adequate size must be provided for all posts and columns in the building."

"Fourth—Any timber which is built up of several pieces and all trusses must have the bolts and rods tightened up. Respectfully yours, E. DOBSON, Building Inspector."

POSTMASTER SHOT BY DRUNKEN MAN

Joseph Greuner of Forest, Wash., Murderously Assaulted in the Dark.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Chehalis, Wash., Aug. 20.—Last night about 8 o'clock John Bernier, a half-breed Indian living on the Newaukum river, 10 miles east of Chehalis, made a murderous assault on Postmaster Joseph Greuner of Forest, a country postoffice eight miles from Chehalis. Greuner is alive and has a good chance to recover. Robbery was apparently the motive.

Bernier and a companion, Tom Crowley, are in the Lewis county jail, having been captured in the latter's cabin by Sheriff Urquhart and Deputy Foster about midnight. They pretended ignorance of the whole affair, both being drunk.

Thursday Bernier and Crowley were at Napavine, where the former had words with a young man named Penny-packer. Bryantanders interfered and Bernier threatened to shoot, pulling a pistol. About 8 o'clock Bernier and Crowley passed Greuner's store and bought some groceries, going thence to Crowley's cabin, two miles up the river. About 7:30 they left Crowley's cabin for Bernier's place on Newaukum Prairie. They stopped at Greuner's store and

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HEAVY RAINS IN ARIZONA

Phoenix, Ariz., Aug. 20.—Terrific rains that have fallen almost continuously for the last week have caused damage in the Salt River valley and in the Wickhampton section north of this city that will reach thousands of dollars. The rains have been the heaviest here in 20 years, and the Salt River, jumps and other streams are swollen. The greater part of the damage has been done to ranches and orchards near Wickhampton.
