Practically no business is shown in the hop market at this time; all interests are waiting for the crop to come out before operating.

Dressed meat trade remains very firm. Butter market is rather steady with no price change.

Apple domestic is increasing slowly; likewise supplies. Prices holding. Hide market is steady with local competition much keener than eastern.
