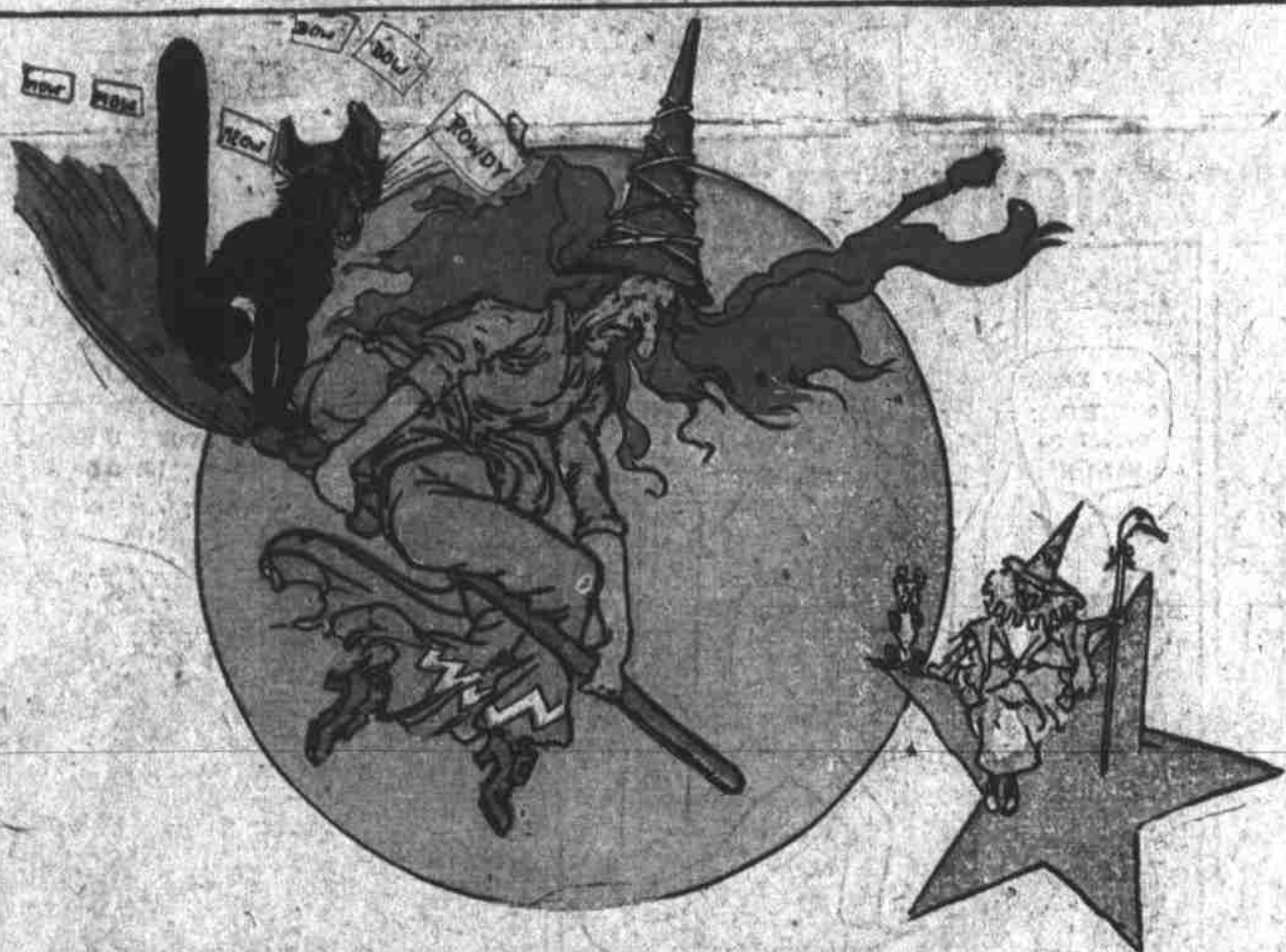

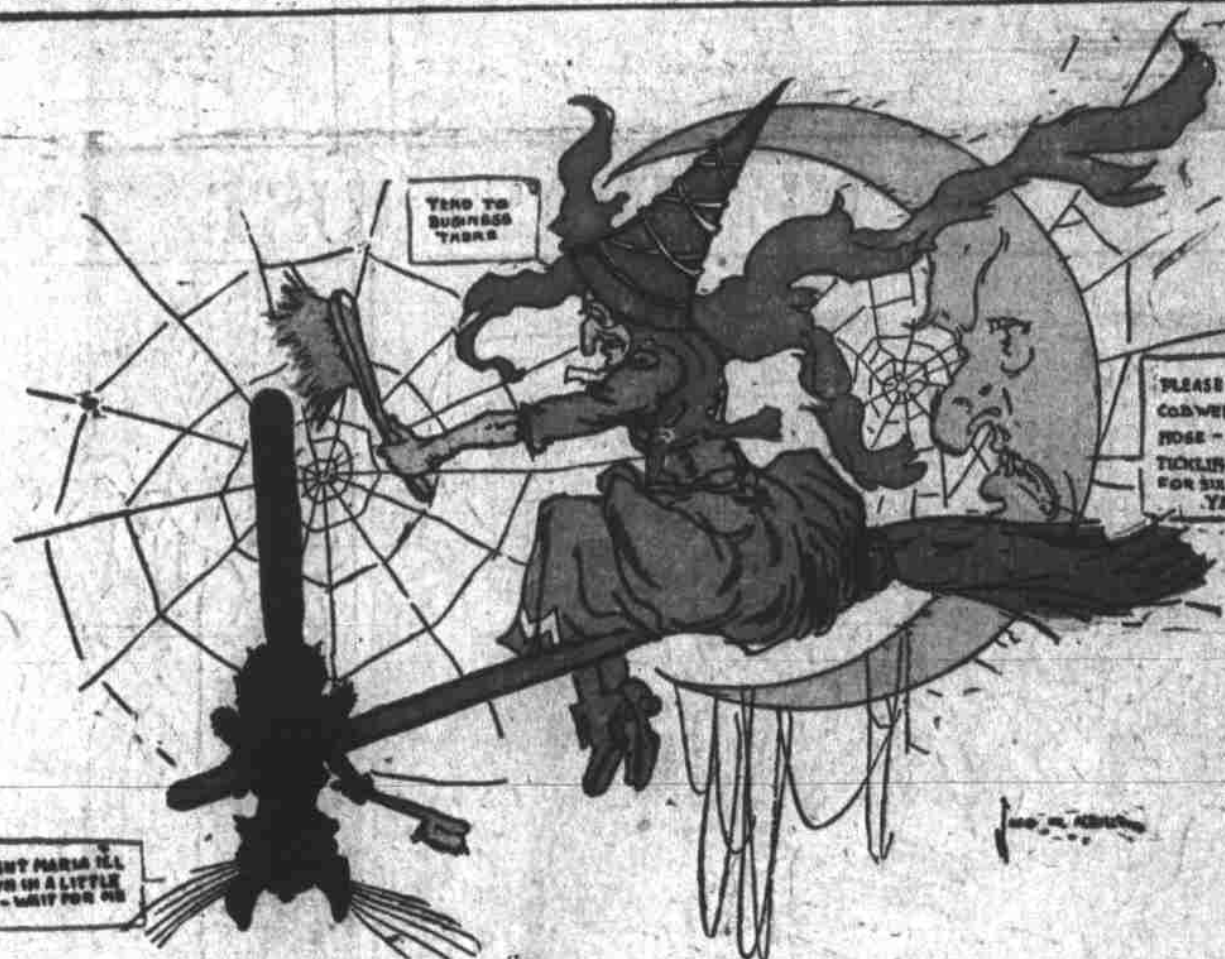
1. They saw an old woman who rode on a broom.

I will take you for a ride to the moon."



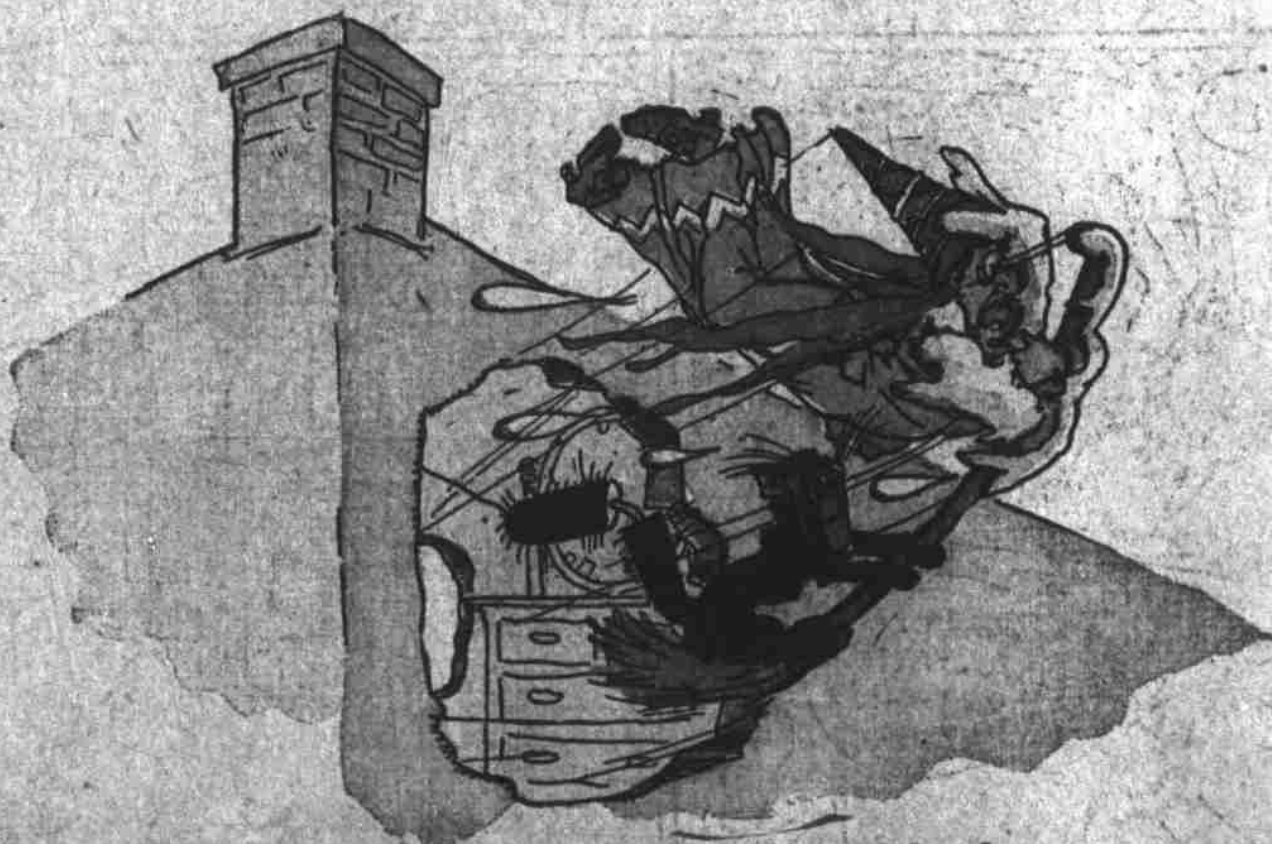
2. She wore an old gown and a high-peaked hat.
