Sends \$5 for Advertising.—When Portland commercial bodies send out advertising matter, that not only pleases the people of Oregon, but finds so responsive a chord in the hearts of people in the east that they send \$5 checks to show their appreciation, it would seem that the highwater mark of successful publicity work had been reached by Portland organizations. The Commercial club recently received a check of \$5 for advertising matter on Curry county and Oregon in general from Harry R. Keen, of Philadelphia. Yesterday it received a letter from Mr. Keen, with an enclosure of a \$5 check, saying, "I send my check for \$5 in appreciation of the work you are doing in Oregon. I have settled in Oregon or not, the knowledge I have acquired through your body and its correlative bodies is well worth the amount."

Walter Raymond Marx.—Walter Raymond, of Los Angeles, proprietor of the Raymond hotel at Pasadena, and one of the originators of the Raymond-Wilcomb tour which have attracted their founders large fortunes, is in Portland and will be here several days. He is accompanied by his wife and daughter. Mr. Raymond brought the California special train to the Alaska-Yukon exposition several weeks ago, and when he passed through Portland at that time was so well pleased with the attractions of Portland that he decided to bring his family here this month.

Sellwood Library to Move.—September 1 the Sellwood branch public library, 613 Umattila avenue, will close and will reopen Saturday, September 4, in its new and more commodious quarters on Tacoma avenue in the first building east of Thirteenth street. This new location within 100 feet of the car line will be much more convenient for the patrons of the library, and the larger, lighter and more cheerful room will add much to the usefulness and attractiveness of the library.

Wisdom Funeral Today.—M. D. Wisdom, prominent horseman and showman, who died Thursday, will be buried from Trinity Episcopal church today at 3:30. The casket will be in charge of the services, while Rev. W. R. Powell will officiate. Horsemen who have known him for years have come from many surrounding towns and will be in attendance. Mr. Wisdom was one of the best known and best liked men in the state and many mourn his death.

Y. M. C. A. to Move.—Y. M. C. A. headquarters at Fourth and Commercial streets will this week begin to resemble a barn rather than the comfortable quarters they have been for several years. By Wednesday is expected that the job of moving from the old building to the new at Sixth and Taylor streets will be started and the furnishings, carpets and settles will be torn out. It is hoped to be in the new building by September 1.

Teachers' Examinations.—The city examination of teachers will be held at the Ladd school assembly hall, commencing Wednesday, August 25, and continuing three days. Daily sessions will begin at 9 a. m. and 1 p. m. Following is the program: Wednesday morning, arithmetic, reading; afternoon, grammar; Thursday morning, geography, writing; Friday morning, spelling; Friday afternoon, U. S. history.

Crematory Bids Opened.—Competitive bids for the construction of the new city crematory were opened yesterday at a special session of the city health board. The bids were referred to a committee for tabulation and investigation. The board will announce the name of the successful bidder at its next meeting, September 1. The tenders vary from \$68,100 to \$127,000.

New Superintendent.—H. N. Napier was yesterday morning elected by the city health board to fill the position of superintendent of the garbage crematory to take the place of C. D. Daggett, who tendered his resignation. Mr. Napier is a well known engineer of Portland and he was highly recommended by City Health Officer C. H. Wheeler.

Inherits Stock Ranch.—Martin Mauritsen of La Center has returned from California, where he went about three weeks ago to take after the settlement of the estate of his cousin, Julius Mauritsen. He found that he had been left 500 acres of land in Mendocino county, Cal., near the Humboldt river, besides 50 head of cattle and other livestock.

Says Wife Left Him.—Suit for divorce on the grounds of desertion has been begun in the circuit court by Joseph Stoddard against Susie Stoddard. He alleges that she left him in June, 1907, without cause. They were married in Grand Rapids, Mich., in April, 1906.

OLD LANDMARK ABOUT TO GO BEFORE MARCH OF PROGRESS

One of Portland's old landmarks, the home of Governor Gibbs, this week gave way to the growth of the city and a four story apartment will take its place at Seventh and Taylor streets. It marks the passing of one more of the old houses which though rich in historic value have become a menace to surrounding property and to the growth of the city. Wednesday contractors started the work of demolishing or moving away the old houses which have stood for so many years in the northwest corner of Seventh and Taylor streets. The Gibbs home, which was one of them, has stood there since 1822, when it was built by Governor Gibbs, then the governor of Oregon. It was during the strenuous war times when labor and material were scarce. Governor Gibbs was known as the war governor of Oregon because of the time during which he held office. He had been a resident of Oregon for 12 years. He came to Oregon in 1820, settling first in Douglas county. He left there, however, about five years after and came to Portland, where he spent much of the rest of his life. Much of his life was spent in the little house just being moved from its old location to South Portland.
