

WOMEN GIVE MANY REASONS

Seek Freedom Through Courts From Undesirable Husbands.

"I will give you \$1 a day to leave me," is the offer said to have been made by Harry Lee to Ella M. Lee, on June 1. The latter is his wife, and from the divorce complaint she has filed in the circuit court it appears that she did not take kindly to the proffered royalty.

At another time, Mrs. Lee says, he doled out \$70 to her, telling her that would be her allowance for that month, and if she wanted more she should "take a spade and go out and dig it up."

The wife also told her that she was like a millstone around his neck, and informed her that she was so dumb it made him mad to talk to her.

At another date, according to the complaint, Lee threatened to knock her down because she wanted to give her daughter, Charlotte, small pieces of meat at the table. He also annoyed her, she says, by telling her daughter Maud, who is 13 years old, that she must get out and work, as she could not lay around the house without paying her board.

The Lees were married at Vancouver, Wash., in September, 1888. The wife asks for the custody of their two minor children, who are 11 and 9 years of age. Louis Emig is too pugilistic for Edith Emig, according to the complaint she has filed. She charges that in June he choked her, then threw her out doors and locked the door. On August 6, she alleges, he choked and beat her until she was unable to speak. The neighbors came to her assistance, and on August 8, when she went to pack up some of her belongings, he again choked her and kicked her down stairs.

Mrs. Emig asks for \$20 per month alimony. Their married career began in Portland in October, 1906.

Late hours kept by Clarence C. Matlock and his aversion to work are the chief grievances of Edith Matlock, who has joined the divorce procession. She says he scolded her when she asked for money for dresses and for a month, she alleges, he refused to work for \$100 a month, she alleges, in December, 1899.

Louis Le Bonta, who carries the alias of Louis Clement, has sued Edith Bonta, also known as Malvina Clement, on statutory grounds. He names John Harlan as co-defendant. They were married at St. Nor, Canada, in January, 1897.

COMPLAIN AGAINST O. R. & N. AT SHANIKO

Salem, Or., Aug. 24.—In reply to numerous complaints received from residents and citizens of Shaniko relative to the service supplied them by the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company on the branch line to Shaniko, the company has decided to make certain improvements which will be made as soon as possible.

Mr. Buckley says that the traffic will not warrant the running of separate passenger and freight trains. All are involved in the losing struggle to keep up appearances without the wherewithal.

MASHERS FACE MANY CHARGES
Harry Miles and Frank Pritchard to Be Tied Wednesday.

Arraigned in the municipal court three times today on two different charges, Harry Miles and Frank Pritchard, youthful masher, will be tried before Municipal Judge Frank S. Bennett Wednesday.

Both Miles and Pritchard were first brought up to face a charge of disorderly conduct, lodged against them by W. F. Lillis, special officer for the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. Knowing that the youngsters—Miles is 21 years old, Pritchard 20 years of age—had been in jail since Friday night, Assistant City Attorney Ray Sullivan asked a motion of the dismissal of the city charge. Judge Bennett granted the motion.

Miles and Pritchard were then arraigned on the charge of defrauding an inn keeper, the complainant being Mrs. S. E. Blair, who declares the boys owe her \$210. The case was carried over until Wednesday morning.

Later, W. F. Lillis swore out a complaint against the boys charging them with disorderly conduct. They were arraigned and pleaded not guilty, and the case was set for trial Wednesday.

Miles, who has been employed by the Honeyman Hardware company, and Pritchard, working for Ben Levy & Co., produce merchants, were picked up by the special officer on Washington street between Fifth and Sixth streets. Mr. Lillis and witnesses aver that the boys spoke promiscuously to women on the street and threw a sandwich, which they had picked off the free lunch counter of a nearby saloon, in the face of a passing girl.

JUDGE GEORGE LIEBE DIES AT THE DALLIES
George Liebe, a well known pioneer resident of The Dalles, died suddenly

of heart failure this morning at his home in The Dalles, according to word received in the city by friends this morning.

Mr. Liebe was one of the best known men of The Dalles. He came to that city more than 40 years ago, and for a number of years conducted a blacksmith and wagon manufacturing business there. He was also county judge and was always associated in the public life of the Columbia river town.

For the past 20 years Mr. Liebe had been retired from active business. He was about 75 years of age.
