Defects in Poor Farm Title—Deputy District Attorney Fage has filed with the county court his report on examination of abstract of title of the poor farm, owned by the May Land company. He points out several defects in the title and makes no recommendation to cure most, possibly all of the defects, an affidavit has been filed by Sam R. Stott, who has personal knowledge of several things not appearing in the abstract. Until the title is made certain the county court will take no steps toward the clearing of buildings which must be erected on the new farm.

He now has no hope of qualifying for her affections, and says he is unable to pay alimony.

The company's jury held the company blameless, and for this reason Julius Knapp, administrator of the estate of the deceased, has brought suit for \$100, the company also offering to pay all the costs of administration.
