

SHIPWRECK

Aviator Fournier Hurled to Ground and Is Seriously Injured.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Rheims, Aug. 25.—Physicians issued a statement this afternoon that the injuries sustained by Henri Fournier, the aviator, when his machine fell from a great height into the air this afternoon, probably will prove fatal.

A corps of physicians are attending him.

Rheims, France, Aug. 25.—While the immense crowd at Betheny Plains gazed in horror, the aviator being driven by Henri Fournier suddenly buckled this afternoon, turned completely somersault in the air and dove from a great height directly to the ground, where it was shattered and Fournier was seriously injured.

No sooner had the aviator struck the earth than a hundred willing hands tore away the twisted steel and splintered wood and extricated the unfortunate aviator from the smashed machine.

He was immediately placed under the care of physicians who were on the ground.

The extent of his injuries is unknown yet, but his condition is given out by the doctors.

Fournier was dazed when taken from the wreckage and was unable to support one of the wings parted, which caused the machine to buckle and throw the pilot beyond his control.

This is the first accident that has thus far marked the progress of the aviation competition.

Yesterday Fournier offered to take Nat Goodwin, the actor, for an aerial trip, but Goodwin refused to accompany him.

COLLISION WILL BE INVESTIGATED

Argentine to Seek Cause of Sinking of Steamer Colombia.

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 25.—The Argentine government today ordered an investigation into the sinking of the steamer Colombia at the entrance to Montevideo harbor, when scores of excursionists lost their lives when the vessel collided with the North German Lloyd liner Schlesien. Today a number of vessels are searching the harbor for bodies.

The Colombia carried about 300 passengers and a crew of 45 men. Most of the passengers were asleep. Small boats were hurried to the sinking steamer, but rescue was rendered difficult by the high sea. About 70 persons were brought ashore. Most of the dead were women and children. A majority of the survivors are men.

The Colombia was carrying excursionists from Buenos Ayres to the festival at Montevideo.

The Schlesien was the only slightly damaged and has been detained here by the port authorities. Her commander attributed the collision to the wind and the high seas, which made both steamers almost unmanageable.

The channel is partially obstructed by the wreck of the Colombia.

Nampa Recovering from Fire Losses

Mayor E. H. Dewey is erecting a large brick building.

UNVEIL MONUMENT TO CONFEDERATES

Fredericksburg, Va., Aug. 25.—A monument to Confederate soldiers of Essex county was unveiled today at Tappanhook. The monument is 27 feet high and is surrounded by a figure of a Confederate soldier.

Inscribed about its base are the names of nearly 1000 dead and living veterans who fought for the south during the rebellion.

Governor Swanson, Senator Daniel, Colonel R. E. Lee and Governor Noel of Mississippi have addressed during the progress of the unveiling ceremonies.

SEARCHING FOR LOS COUNTS

Wealthy Poland Lady Comes to America, Changes Name and Disappears.

San Francisco, Aug. 25.—A search is going on in this city today for Countess Helen Lopka de Lubietowski, who was last heard of in March, 1906, when she left Los Angeles for San Francisco.

Yesterday J. D. Minister, of Cincinnati arrived in San Francisco after tracing the countess from New York to this city.

According to Minister, the countess had a disagreement with her father and left her home at Cracow, in the Austrian part of Poland, bound for America several years ago. She took with her \$30,000 of her own money and a quantity of jewelry.

Her aged father is spending thousands of dollars in the search for his daughter. He possesses a large fortune and she is his only heir. He traveled all over Europe before he found that she came to America. Since then the search has been going on continuously throughout the United States.

J. D. Minister was employed and traced the lost countess from Cincinnati to St. Louis, to St. Paul, and from there to Los Angeles, where it was found that Miss de Lubietowski had taken the name of May Loh.

The countess came to San Francisco shortly before the fire.

The countess is 27 years old.

MOTHER FORGOT BABE 8000 MILES

Kidnaped Child Recovered by Desperate Parent After Long Search.

Richmond, Va., Aug. 25.—Mrs. J. W. Weaver of Los Angeles, today is in possession of her daughter, whom her husband is alleged to have kidnaped after leaving Mrs. Weaver at Los Angeles and coming to Richmond, where he lived under the name of Williams.

Mrs. Weaver says she came here a week ago, upon learning that her husband was living here. Accompanied by her brother-in-law, W. O. Whistler of Los Angeles, and several officers of the Henrico county, they took an automobile and ran to the home of Williams, a short distance from the city limits.

The little girl was playing in a doorway and Mrs. Weaver says, upon recognizing her mother ran to her. Mrs. Weaver died to the automobile with the child and returned to the city.

Mrs. Weaver said today that she has traveled 8000 miles to recover her child, which is 4 years old. The couple, according to Mrs. Weaver's statement, were married in Los Angeles five years ago.

RUSSIAN GIANT IN PENITENTIARY WILL BE DEPORTED

Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 25.—A giant Kook, convict No. 5013, said to be the strongest man in the state of Washington, is about to be released from the state penitentiary here for deportation to Russia, from which country he came. His discharge is due to efforts of Immigration Inspector Wells, who on learning that Kook was not lawfully in the United States, took up the matter of his deportation.

Kook is marvelously strong. He does the work of three or four men all the time and for that reason is given two men's rations at the prison. When there is anything to be lifted, there is a cry to send for No. 5013. He takes a 400 pound steel car from the track easily and lifts it on or off the track as necessity may be. He can lift as much as any three men in the prison, it is said.

COOK LEAVES CONVICT CAMP

Salem, Or., Aug. 25.—James Adams, a convict serving a seven year term for larceny, escaped yesterday from the Peelle Mined Institute, two miles south of Salem. Adams was cook for the convicts and was seen by a guard at the cook house at 4 o'clock.

Adams was committed from Crook county and was received October 25, 1906. He was about 34 years of age, swarthy complexion and had dark brown hair. He was a horseman by occupation.

Many Foreigners in Penitentiary.

Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 25.—That perhaps 50 per cent of the inmates of the state penitentiary are foreigners, that at least 25 per cent of them are and that doubtless 40 per cent are, is the statement made by Immigration Inspector E. L. Wells yesterday at the weekly luncheon of the Commercial club. That 200 of these had been deported last few years was another statement.

Crime, said the speaker, is due to ignorance and drunkenness and much of this is found in the lower classes of immigrants. Many of the criminals in the state prison are being cared for at that place, at the expense of the state, whereas they should be in their own countries. This is a part of the work he said, that the Immigration bureau is trying to accomplish.

Reunion of Confederate Veterans.

Chickasha, Okla., Aug. 25.—Chickasha is in gala attire in honor of the Oklahoma Confederate veterans, whose annual state reunion opened today for three days session. The attendance is large and representative of the entire state. This, added to an attractive program of entertainment, gives promise of a highly successful reunion. An address by Governor Haskell was the principal feature of the opening day.

Wisconsin Fruit Growers.

La Crosse, Wis., Aug. 25.—A large and representative attendance marked the annual meeting of the Wisconsin Horticultural society. Two days will be spent in the discussion of horticultural problems, and members of the faculty of the State Agricultural college will give practical instruction in the cultivation and spraying of farm orchards and gardens.

Man Shot by Police May Die.

San Francisco, Aug. 25.—Bernard Lagan, who it is alleged was shot down several weeks ago by Police Captain Joseph Conboy, is coming from the other realm, and physicians fear that the young man will not recover, according to reports coming from the Lagan home.

Since the shooting Lagan has been a hopeless paralytic, and is at the home of his sister. Doctors state that the young man's health is such that he will never walk again.

ASSESSORS USE DETECTIVE TRICK

Valuation of Property Fixed on Price Made to Prospective Purchaser.

Hollywood, Cal., Aug. 25.—The use of Paul De Longpre, the peerless painter of flowers, and of his many fellow townsmen, is aroused today over what they believe was a crafty and unwarranted method of assessment adopted by the state board of equalization. About a week ago a man called at the beautiful home of the artist, stating that he represented an eastern friend who wished to purchase a home. After being conducted through the house and grounds, he asked De Longpre the price at which he would dispose of the property.

"Two hundred thousand dollars," was the artist's reply. A week after this visit De Longpre learned that his property had been valued at \$200,000 by the state board, whereas the county assessment is based on a valuation of half that figure. Other Hollywood homes were given corresponding increases in valuation by the state board and the owners are of the opinion that the agent who called upon De Longpre was a scout for the state assessors.

It was stated yesterday that when the board convenes in Los Angeles next week a concerted protest will be filed by local property owners against what they allege are unjust ratings and the extraordinary methods of determining valuation.

CHINA HAS POOR ARMY OFFICERS

Quality of Soldierly Not the Best—Japan Directly Opposite.

San Francisco, Aug. 25.—According to Major General R. G. Broadwood of the British army, who arrived in San Francisco from China yesterday, the greatest drawback to the efficiency of the new Chinese army is in the quality of the men who officer it.

He said today:

"The Chinese as a nation are educated to commercialism and in all times past the army has been held in contempt. For that reason the best quality of men have not gone into the military service."

"In Japan it is just the opposite. There every man considers it the highest honor to be a soldier, while commercialism is held in contempt."

As the result the Japanese officers are men of the highest stamp and the Japanese merchants, generally, have not been as fine as the officers."

Broadwood has been in command of the British forces in southern China where he has been stationed for two and a half years. He is the youngest officer of his rank in the British service.

MOORS LOSE 600, SPANIARDS 250

Desperate Fighting on Both Sides—Cholera Breaks Out Among Spaniards.

Lisbon, Portugal, Aug. 25.—Today's Seculo states that cholera has broken out among the Spanish troops at Melilla. The latest dispatches, 250 Spanish soldiers and 600 Moors were killed in battle when the Moors made an attempt to advance to the outposts. Despite the desperate fighting and the heavy loss sustained by the Moors, the attempt on the part of the Moors failed.

After the Moors had retired to the fortress the Moors shelled the Melilla hospital. The projectiles wrought havoc within the structures and a number of sick soldiers were killed.

It is reported that the Spanish troops will make another offensive movement today.

Marina's command now numbers 35,000 officers and men.

PROMINENT JAPS COME TO AMERICA

London, Aug. 25.—Prince and Princess Kuni of Japan, who have been touring Europe, sailed today for New York. The royal couple will participate in the Hudson-Fulton celebration next month at New York as the official representatives of Nippon.

Prince Kuni is the third son of the late Prince Asaka and is an officer in the Japanese army.

MINE WALLS CAVE; LABORER KILLED

Medford, Or., Aug. 25.—W. J. Leever, a laborer in the Opp mine at Jacksonville, was crushed to death Tuesday afternoon when the walls of the tunnel in which he was working suddenly caved in upon him. He was well known in Jacksonville, of which place he was a resident. He leaves a bride of six months.

North Carolina Veterans.

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 25.—The capital of North Carolina is alive with Confederate veterans. Sons of the Confederacy and other visitors from all quarters of the state. The occasion is the annual state reunion of the veterans, which began today and will continue over tomorrow.

The reunion got under way this morning with a program of exercises that included addresses of welcome by Mayor Hawkins and Colonel E. A. Osborne, a response by General Julian S. Carr, and addresses by Chief Justice Walter Clark, Ex-Governor T. J. Jarvis and other distinguished veterans. The annual reunion parade will take place tomorrow morning, with Captain S. H. Hilton as chief marshal.

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EXPLOSION KILLS 2 MEN, INJURES 2

Premature Blast at Rock Quarry Fatal—24 Narrowly Escape Death.

Oregon City, Or., Aug. 25.—Two employees of the Pacific Coast Construction company were killed by a premature blast of powder at the rock quarry on the big Milwaukee line of the Scaverton-Williams railroad yesterday afternoon. The names of the dead men are John Scullen and Joseph and Bob Thomas, an Austrian. Two men, John Subbo and Steve Bacovich, were injured, the former sustaining a compound fracture of one leg and a broken shoulder blade, while Bacovich was severely bruised.

The cause of the explosion is unexplainable. The men were not ready to set the blast off and there was no fuse and the powder is set off by electricity.

The blast was an unusually large one and was heard over the city. It was 24 men in close proximity to the powder. The body of Scullen was hurled over several thousand tons of rocks. Twenty-two men at the foot of the bluff escaped to a barge in the river and were unhurt.

Doctors Belt and Peel, the company's surgeons, arrived on the scene as soon as possible, as did P. W. Watson, president of the Pacific Coast construction company, and Dr. Tounley of Milwaukee. The two injured men were taken to a hospital in an ambulance.

An inquest will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at Oregon City.

as their right. He believes it should be saved for the people.

California in Bond.

"I know that down in California the water power, and nearly everything else, is turned over to the corporations. That is because the state is the great thumb of the corporations. In Oregon the people broke away from that dominion once. They ought to keep away. They ought not to give their water rights, or other franchises, to corporate control. They ought to control these things, and hang onto the ownership. If they do not do that they are making a great mistake, and one that can never be remedied."

"I do not know anything about the Ballinger controversy, but I do know that any policy which gives away public property to corporate control is pernicious and should not be tolerated."

Mr. Heney would not discuss his plans in San Francisco.

"I am going down there and try to be elected district attorney," he said. "I am trying to do something for the people of San Francisco and of California and I believe that the people will help me to accomplish the work by supporting me."

Ordinary Campaign.

"What kind of a campaign am I going to wage? Well, I am going to wage the same kind of a battle that any other man would wage. There is nothing original about me," and Mr. Heney smiled again.

"I am going to get out among the people of San Francisco and tell them the truth and in that way try to counteract the lies that will be told about me in the papers. It will be for the people to judge whether they want me, and what I will do for them, or their stations and what they will do to them."

Mr. Heney will return to Portland about 10 o'clock this evening and will leave tomorrow for Seattle.

McCOURT READY TO TAKE UP PROSECUTION OF LAND FRAUD CASES

"Every land fraud case on the docket, where the evidence seems to warrant conviction, will be tried—so far as I am concerned," said United States District Attorney J. W. McCourt, stating in reply to a question as to whether Francis J. Heney's failure to prosecute the Herman case would make any difference in the policy of the local office. Mr. McCourt continued:

"I am ready now to try any of the pending land fraud cases with the exception of the Herman case. I can get ready for it in six weeks. There will be no disposition on my part to relax the prosecution of any case, or to allow the culprits to feel that having transgressed the laws of the government, they need not hope to evade proper punishment."

Mr. McCourt did not enter into the merits of the Herman case, saying that those features received full discussion. "I am here to do my duty," he said. "Prosecution of these cases seems to me to be directly in the line of duty."

Mr. McCourt is strongly of the opinion that the case elected district attorney of San Francisco. "When a man is in the right and on the right side he usually wins out," he said in explanation of his opinion. "Heney is in the right. He is helping to show the people of San Francisco that graft and bribery are not the only ways to get things done, and they in return will show their appreciation of his services by putting him in line for bigger things."

But while the United States attorney has apparently been waiting for the opportunity to take up the prosecution of Mr. Heney, to decide who would prosecute the Herman case, it has nevertheless become apparent, that Mr. McCourt has been waiting for the famous prosecutor would take full charge, and in order to be ready in any emergency has been keeping the case in mind.
