

WHILISTS TO WAKE OFF THE NAME FOR MURDER

Petition for Edward H. Martin's Pardon Recites the Strange Story of Pawnbroker Wolff's Murder—Another Man Accused.

Tomorrow, if the governor has time to give the hearing, the petition for pardon of Edward H. Martin, convicted of the murder of John A. Jeffery, will be presented to the chief executive at Salem. John A. Jeffery, Martin's attorney, arranging today for the formal hearing.

The petition for pardon is signed by about 500 citizens of Portland, including many prominent substantial citizens. They ask for executive clemency on the ground that new evidence tends to show that Martin is not a man of criminal instincts, that he has been cured of the drug habit, that he is now in condition to make a useful citizen, and that he has been sufficiently punished for such indiscretions as he may have committed.

Six jurors, members of the jury that convicted Martin, are said to have signed the petition for pardon, and attorney Jeffery thinks he can add to that number, although the district attorney's office has made known its opposition, and wants to convicting jurors to stand by their guns.

Accompanying the petition is a certificate by the four doctors who examined Martin in the county jail after he had gone into the dungeon for the purpose of proving that he no longer uses cocaine or morphine. The certificate states that he does not use drugs in any form.

Still another card to be used in Martin's behalf is an affidavit by E. Weststrom of Washington county, who narrates a peculiar story as to the movements of Joe Botkin, a Russian peddler. This affidavit in the foundation stones of the theory that Wolff was murdered because of his connection with revolutionary societies.
