

CONFIDENT OF HIS ELECTION

Francis J. Heney Will Engage in an Active Campaign.

Francis J. Heney went to Seattle this morning after spending two days in Portland. Before leaving, Mr. Heney reiterated his conviction that he will win the district attorneyship of San Francisco. "It is the enlarged opportunity to press the great prosecution, not the honor, that I desire," he said. "That campaign will be the big thing in my plans after I have returned to San Francisco."

"I believe we are on the high road to success," he concluded, hurrying to catch the bus that was just ready to start to the depot.

Mr. Heney conferred with United States District Attorney John McCourt yesterday evening on matters relating to the prosecution of Oregon's land fraud cases. Mr. McCourt said this morning:

"The conference between Mr. Heney and myself led to no new developments or plans. He is thoroughly of the opinion that I gave expression to some time ago that the land fraud cases, where the evidence warrants conviction, should be prosecuted to the end, but that others, where the evidence is vague and uncertain, and where the purpose of justice would not be served by prosecution, should be finally dismissed, and the shadow of suspicion and guilt lifted from the men under indictment, whose only crime was an error in judgment."

By the frequent references made by both Mr. Heney and Mr. McCourt to the policy of the attorney general and their willingness to be governed by whatever plan he may formulate, it is evident that both put the prosecution of the remaining land fraud cases in the hands of the attorney general. It will be undertaken in real earnest, and the Herrmann case will head the list. But if an attorney general shows indifference or intimates that no particularly beneficial results will attend such a prosecution, it is very possible that the chapter of the crooked land deals in Oregon is far from being ready to write.

SALOONS MUST GO IN IDAHO COUNTY

Local Option Election Gives Drink Emporiums but 90 Days to Live.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Lewiston, Idaho, Aug. 26.—The first local option election in the six northern counties of Idaho was held in Idaho county yesterday, and the returns this morning from 26 out of the 44 precincts in the county give a 15 majority for the "drys," with indications that the figures will be increased to 500 or better.

The features of the election were the carrying of the four precincts in Grangeville for the "drys," with a majority of 175 votes, while 2 of the 10 saloons in the county are there. In one precinct, Woodland, there was only one "wet" voter against 18 "drys."

L. C. Chadwick, chairman of the Anti-Saloon league, attributes the success to the splendid organization all over the county, and to the energy and enthusiasm of women workers. The county commissioners will canvass the vote in 10 days and the saloons must close in 90 days.

RESULT OF WRECK IS TWELVE KILLED

(United Press Leased Wire.) Bakerfield, Cal., Aug. 26.—An official report issued by the county coroner today stated that 12 men were killed in the collision between a runaway Santa Fe freight train and a Southern Pacific switch engine near Mojave yesterday.

The list of dead, according to the coroner's report, is as follows:

L. W. Harris, Santa Fe fireman, Bakerfield; instantly killed.

R. R. Roth, Santa Fe brakeman, Bakerfield; instantly killed.

W. B. Mulloy, Santa Fe brakeman, Bakerfield; died at Santa Fe hospital.

Tommy Brown, Nevada miner, instantly killed.

P. Jones, a tramp.

W. F. Mager, engineer of Santa Fe runaway train, brought to Santa Fe hospital.

A. Sheldon, engineer of Southern Pacific switch engine, instantly killed.

Five unidentified men, supposed to be tramps.

GUESTS IN NIGHTIES FLEE FROM FIRE

Senate Committee on Irrigation Now Touring Pacific Northwest.

The committee has been inspecting the irrigation projects throughout Montana, Idaho and eastern Washington, and have arranged to leave Portland upon an inspection tour of this state Wednesday morning.

A number of the personal and political friends of Senator Chamberlain will meet him at the depot upon his arrival, probably Monday evening at 3:30 o'clock. Mrs. Chamberlain, accompanied by the senator's secretary, R. A. Caplan, leave tomorrow for Seattle to meet the party.

WILEY LOSES HIS BENZOATE FIGHT

Food and Dairy Congress Declare for the Remsen Theory.

Denver, Colo., Aug. 26.—The opponents of Dr. W. B. Wiley, the Roosevelt food poison fighter, were victorious today when the convention of the Association of State Food and Dairy Delegates this afternoon adopted a resolution by a vote of 17 to 4 endorsing the Remsen board's benzoate ruling.

The opposing forces, besides the members of the Remsen board, included a number of government chemical experts, who contended that benzoate was actually harmless.

Dr. Wiley's supporters took the stand that where there is any doubt as to the harmfulness of chemicals in food, the public should have the benefit of the doubt. They maintained that there was some doubt as to the harmfulness of benzoate of soda.

HORSES SUFFER ON STEEP HILL

Woman Calls Mayor's Attention to Existing Conditions.

Because she could not bear to see the struggles of horses trying to drag heavy loads up the slippery paved incline from Twentieth street to Washington to the top of the hill, a woman who had flat on the corner of Washington and King streets moved, and her friend, Mrs. Elizabeth P. Harrison of 21 North Twentieth street, wrote a letter to Mayor Simon asking him if he could not find some way of relieving the poor horses, which she says are constantly slipping to their knees and sometimes flat on their backs at times when the pavement is wet.

She says she hates to see the drivers cruelly lashing the dumb animals to their feet only to see them fall again and suggests that the pavements on all grades be sprinkled with gravel or sand as some other pavements in the city.

This letter informing the mayor of her friend's moving her residence (the name of the friend was not given), was written July 22.

Another letter, dated August 22, tells the mayor that the writer was pleased to receive his courteous reply to her former letter, but that nothing had been done toward remedying conditions on the slippery street. Mrs. Harrison in her second letter asked the mayor to use his influence toward having an ordinance passed limiting the loads which teams may draw.

She said she saw a team of the Star Sand company straining up the hill on Lovelock street to the corner road with a load which the driver told her weighed five tons.

She unbraided the driver, she said, for being so inhuman, but he told her that if he did not "take the job somebody else would." In her letter the writer congratulated the mayor on the way he is starting out on his administration, and hoped that he would have many remembrances.

Mayor Simon referred both communications to the street committee of the council.

WATER BONDS HELD AS VALID

Case of Haines Vs. City of Forest Grove Affirmed by Supreme Court.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 26.—Departing from its usual custom, the supreme court announced a decision today, Thursday, in the case of E. W. Haines vs. the city of Forest Grove, whereby a decree of Judge J. V. Campbell of the circuit court for Washington county, is affirmed and the city water bonds voted at recent special election are declared valid.

The proceedings involved the validity of the city charter and the regularity of the proceedings thereunder, and the sale of bonds for constructing a gravity water system. It was contended that there was a failure to comply with the initiative and referendum powers reserved to the people in the law of 1907, in regard to municipal legislation. The opinion handed down today was written by Associate Justice Will R. King.

The court finds that the irregularities referred to were not sufficient to abrogate the effect of the election and the bonds are held valid. The suit had interfered with the completion of the water system which had been started but the work can now go ahead without delay.

PLAN TO CHANGE WEIGHING SYSTEM

Representatives of Transcontinental Railroads Hold Conference.

Representatives of the transcontinental railroads from the North Pacific coast territory will meet in the office of General Freight Agent A. J. Miller of the Harriman lines this afternoon to consider the advisability of having transcontinental freight weighed by the Transcontinental Freight Bureau instead of by the railroads themselves.

At present, freight shipped from here to the east is weighed on the scales of the railroad here, is weighed again at the Minnesota transfer and possibly a third time at the point of destination. This frequent weighing creates a source of some trouble and expense to the railroads themselves as it irritates shippers because if there is a variation of a hundred pounds in the weights he naturally thinks he is being cheated one way or the other and can never be fully satisfied as to what the actual weight of his car is.

Another reason quoted in favor of the change is that railroad employees at present frequently cheat the railroads on weight. It is comparatively easy for the trainmen to fix the weight of a car of lumber, for instance, at a few thousand pounds less than it is in exchange for a box of cigars. This would be obviated by having all the weighing done by the Freight Bureau.

At present, the Transcontinental Freight Bureau attends to the publication of tariffs and to the inspection of all freight. The desire of some of the transcontinental roads is to increase their authority to the extent that they also be allowed to do the weighing and to have their weight accepted as the final statement.

Among the out of town men who are here for the conference are Archibald Gray, assistant general freight agent of the Great Northern and G. L. Selbert, assistant freight claim agent for the Great Northern at Seattle. W. D. Skinner and C. E. Conner of the Harriman lines and H. M. Adams and Ralph Jenkins of the North Bank will represent their lines at the conference.

HUSBAND TAKES LIFE WHEN WIFE DIES

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Aug. 26.—After addressing a note to his parents, George Ames Jr., son of a prominent mining engineer, clutched a prayer book to his breast and turned on the gas in a room in the Hotel May which he had rented this morning.

This afternoon his dead body was found lying on the bed. In the note he asked his parents to bury him where they buried Alice. Alice was his wife. Dependancy brought on by the death of his wife recently, is believed to be the cause of Ames' suicide.

RESOLUTIONS OF REGRET FOR PASTOR

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Aug. 26.—Resolutions of regret for Dr. Robert J. Burdette's resignation from the pastorate of the Temple Baptist church were forwarded to the preacher's family today by members of his congregation.

Dr. Burdette, who is confined to his villa at Clifton-by-the-Sea, suffering from a sciatic complaint, was able to stand today for the first time in many weeks. He is expected to return to Los Angeles in a few days.

A committee has been appointed by the Temple church to confer with Dr. J. Whitcomb Brough of Portland, Or., who may be Dr. Burdette's successor.

Despite this treatment, they say that Fletcher has great influence over her mind, and unless prevented he is likely to get all a portion of the \$330 legacy.

County Judge Webster has fixed September 10 as the date of the hearing, when it will be decided whether Mrs. Fletcher should be placed under guardianship. She is dependent and has been living with her daughters.
