GOOD SYSTEM OF FOREST SERVICE

Policy Not to "Tie Up" Forests but to Cut Ripe Trees for Lumber.

Washington, Aug. 25.—"Does the policy of forest conservation involve the prevention of the legitimate use of timber for the manufacture of lumber?" In view of the constant attacks which have been made on the general conservation policies—as evidenced by the refusal of the congress to supply \$1 to keep in existence the joint conservation commission—the real meaning of conservation as applied to the timber resources of the country becomes vitally important.

the uses of mankind, or place it out at interest, and thus derive legitimate return and at the same time give to the people its value as a circulating medium.

From long time familiarity with the ideas of the forest conservators, and after several years of studying of the forest service close at hand, and having talked personally, day by day, with the leaders of forest conservation here and those who come from other states, one must accept the statement of Mr. Price as comprehending the subject, and his suggestion of the right method of using timber properly will appeal to the common sense of most people.

Opponents of true conservation level at the proponents the unjust criticism that they would up the nation's forests and prevent their use for the supplying of lumber to do the nation's needed building.

Squandering Timber Resources.
First—As to squandering timber resources. The United States uses approximately 230 cubic feet per capita per annum of its timber supply. Germany uses about 35 cubic feet per annum per capita.

Again, in this country we have been cutting our timber according to exceedingly wasteful methods. This has been admitted by lumbermen, and is known by all.

We have permitted losses by forest fires, not providing anything like adequate means for fighting these fires. Clyde Leavitt, an expert of the forest service, gives succinctly the facts bearing on this phase:

More than 20,000 persons perished in forest fires in the nineteenth century in this country. During the past 37 years, there has been an average of 50 deaths annually.

"The market value of the standing timber destroyed by fire has varied from \$25,000,000 to \$100,000,000 a year; the direct loss has been on the average \$50,000,000.

"Not less than 20,000,000 acres are burned over annually of the young growth. At \$10 an acre, the cost to the nation is \$200,000,000.

protection of their property from fire losses.

As to locking up the forests from use—that has been the method of the timber speculator, who bought large tracts held them for future cutting, allowed as before the ripe timber to fall and decay, and did not cut the ripe trees, and thus permit the unripe trees to grow to larger dimensions.

Excellent System of Service.
The true policy, therefore, is to use the forests as the years pass, and that is the policy adopted by the forest service. It has already placed in operation modern timbering and sawing plants on all or most of the national forests, and is applying the sound principle of using all ripe timber just as a farmer does in handling his crops.

Not an acre of the national forests is designed to be locked up—like the wrapping up of money in a napkin. It is for use, and the forest conservators advocate use all the time of that portion of the forest which is ready for cutting, leaving the trees which have not attained full growth.

It is believed that when the people learn these, the true conservation principles, they will with virtual unanimity support the policy of forest conservation. It is believed, however, that already they are backing the movement with almost unanimity.

SIUSLAW RIVER WILL BE IMPROVED

Eugene, Or., Aug. 25.—Now that the supreme court has decided upon the validity of the port bill passed by the last legislature, the work of improving the harbor at the mouth of the Siuslaw river will go ahead, the life of the Port of Siuslaw hanging on the decision of the court.

The \$100,000 bonds for the improvement of the harbor, voted by the port at a special election in May, have been sold, and the money will be available as soon as the certificates of correct procedure are made up and the bonds are printed.

Morton L. Tower of San Francisco, who has been in the employ of the government for many years, has been secured as constructing and supervising engineer. Plans and specifications for building the south jetty at the mouth of the river have already been prepared, and the work will be started in the near future.

WOULD PREFER TO HAVE SPEECH

Committee Again Communicates With Chief of Nation.

If President Taft's reply to a telegram sent by the Taft reception committee last night is favorable, the people of Portland will have a chance to hear the chief of the nation deliver a public address in the Armory on the evening of Saturday, October 2. But if this address is given there will be no banquet at the Portland hotel.

The subcommittee on arrangements for the president's visit met yesterday afternoon and after considering the request of the committee to have the Armory in the afternoon, authorized the sending of a telegram asking the president to supplant the banquet speech by one at the Armory, where the people can hear and see him.

Senator Bourne and President Taft will play a game of golf on the Waverly links in the afternoon. In case the president wishes a banquet it will be held at the Portland hotel and will cost \$150 a plate. President Wetherbee of the Commercial club offered to provide the banquet for \$10 a plate, but the committee decided that the hotel would be more convenient for the president, inasmuch as he will stay there during his visit to Portland.

BAND PLAYED WHILE GEMS DISAPPEARED

Centralia, Wash., Aug. 25.—Nearly \$1500 worth of jewels was stolen here yesterday from the home of W. C. Eastman and Paul C. Uhlman. A daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eastman was the heaviest loser, over \$1000 in jewels having been taken. The thieves entered the houses while the families were attending Ringling's circus. The robberies were not discovered until this morning.

FAIR SECURES EXCURSION RATES

Centralia, Wash., Aug. 25.—F. B. Hubbard, president of the Southwest Washington fair commission, states that the Northern Pacific Railway company will give a rate of a fare and one third to the Southwest Washington fair from points between and including Tacoma and Kalama and all points on the Gray Harbor and South Bend lines during the week of the fair, September 5 to 11.

Japanese Visits Big Orchards.
Hood River, Or., Aug. 25.—George Nishizaki, a prominent Japanese of

Hood River valley, has just returned from an extensive trip through Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Idaho, Washington, California and Oregon, where he went to study the fruit industry. Mr. Nishizaki is largely interested in the development of fruit lands at Hood River and The Dalles.

Bohemian Turnfest Opens.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—What promises to be the most successful turnfest ever held by the Bohemian Turnbund of North America began in this city today and will continue until Monday. The Bohemian quarter of the city, radiating from Eighteenth and Halsted streets, is gaily decorated for the occasion. Twenty thousand or more visitors are expected to attend the tournament. Hundreds of active turners will participate in the different events and exhibitions. They come from all parts of the United States and several are here from Europe.

Schools Open Monday.

Hood River, Or., Aug. 25.—The Hood River schools will open Monday, August 30. Eighteen teachers have been employed for the year, and it is expected that two or three more will be required before the year is over, on account of large increase in attendance.
