September 9, will spend the 9th in Portland and the 10th in Astoria, where they will board the Hood River, making the Columbia river trip and sightseeing in the Hood River valley.

As arranged at present, the Japanese party, which numbers 45 of the leading business men of Japan, will arrive by special train at 4 a. m. from the north.

September 10 the party will leave for a river trip to Hood River on the steamer T. J. Potter or the Harvest Queen, which have been tendered the committee for this occasion by the O. R. & N. Co.
