KINSELLA WINS 14TH SESSION

Armbuster Sends Out Sacrifice With Bases Full.

"Buster" Armbuster, late of the Coast league, uncorked a flying sacrifice in the fourteenth inning, bringing home one run and winning for Eddie Kinsella one of the greatest games that twirler ever pitched. The score was 3 to 1, and the St. Louis recruit held the "Tigers" to but two hits during the game. These were bunched in the sixth inning and resulted in the visitors' lopsided ace.

By four innings Kinsella prevented the Tiger from reaching first base. For a while it looked as if he would repeat his no-hit-no-run pitching feat against the Spokane Indians last May, but Conrad slugging a single over second base and took third when Muller erred in handling Coleman's grounder thrown from Green. Then Stovien singled cleanly to right and Conrad rushed across.

"BIZ" ROESCH GIVES OREGON MORE FAME

Herbert O. Roesch of Pendleton, the young Annapolis midshipman who won the rifle championship of America at the Camp Perry matches, which closed yesterday, is another young Oregonian who has made the world sit up and take notice from a sportsman standpoint. Young Roesch, who is familiarly known as "Blissmark," made the remarkable score of 184 out of a possible 200 at slow fire at the 300, 600, 900 and 1000 yard ranges. In winning the match he became the champion of last year's competitors with the great score of 330. Roesch's mark is 30 points above that of the champion of last year. He also won the governors' cup last week.

The splendid marksmanship of Roesch will probably surprise those who know him. He has done a good deal of hunting in the Blue mountains of eastern Oregon, but had never considered the rifle as more than an ordinary shot. When he was appointed to Annapolis four years ago, he took up rifle shooting and became so adept that he was chosen for this year's team that represented the naval academy at the Ohio national championship. Roesch was quite a baseball and football player in his school days and made the freshman team at Annapolis. With the athletic regulations established by Smithson, Gilbert and Kelly, and the marksmanship record of Roesch, the state has been given a prominent place in the eastern world of sport.

DUTCH PICNIC FOR AUTOISTS TOMORROW

A Dutch picnic, with music and good times galore, is planned for tomorrow afternoon by the Portland Automobile club. Every auto owner in the state is invited to attend, but it is warned that he must bring his own lunch and refreshments. The picnic is to be held at the new clubhouse on Sandy, and is to be the occasion of the formal opening of the house. RACE HORSES TO ENTER LABOR DAY

California Sprinters and Jockeys Will Give Event Professional Tinge.

The Riverside Driving club has arranged for a fine day's sport for Labor day, September 6, at the Country club. There will be three features, consisting of team racing, running races and a novel farmers' race. The race will consist of some of the best pairs in and around Portland. The following will probably enter their teams: C. W. Peabody, E. A. Baldwin, J. P. Porter, E. B. Meyer and several others.

The conditions of the race will be the best two in three mile heats for a handsome trophy donated by the Riverside Driving club. This will be the first race of the kind ever attempted in Portland and should be very hotly contested, as there is less rivalry, and less betting between various owners, who must drive.

These will be all professional races

and there are some of the best jockeys from the California tracks here with the horses. This will no doubt be very interesting as the Portland public have not enjoyed professional races in some time and this will be a revival of the good old days.

The farmers' race will consist of horses that have never before faced a starter. These horses may be driven to any kind of vehicle chosen by the owner. The race will be best two and three half mile heats for a substantial purse offered by the association. This race particularly is for horses in regular work in town or country.

WHITMAN HAS TWO CANDIDATES

Two Garfield Men Spoken of as Suitable for Governor's Chair.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pullman, Wash., Aug. 28.—A boom has been started here for the nomination of two Whitman county men for governor in 1913. Friends of Honorable J. C. Lawrence, member of the state railroad commission and for more than 30 years a citizen of Whitman county, have started a boom for him for the Republican nomination for governor. Mr. Lawrence still retains his home at Garfield and in that precinct, where he has lived for more than a quarter of a century.

Democratic friends of Honorable R. C. McCroskey, "wheat king" banker and capitalist of Garfield, are working quietly to create sentiment for him for the Democratic nomination. Mr. McCroskey has served as state senator from this county and was a prominent candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1904, but withdrew from the race when George Turner of Spokane consented to enter the race. Senator McCroskey owns 2500 acres of rich farming lands at Garfield, his farms practically surrounding that town. He is interested in merchandising and banking at Garfield and is president of the Pullman State bank of Pullman. He is regarded as one of the shrewdest politicians and strongest men of the Democratic ranks in eastern Washington.

Mr. Lawrence was one of the first school teachers in Whitman county when Washington was a territory, and has always been a leader in the Republican party. He was receiver of the Waterville land office under President Harrison and has always been one of the advisers of the Republican party in this section. It has been an open secret for years that Mr. Lawrence has an ambition to occupy the governor's chair and he has some loyal supporters who are working quietly to bring about his nomination as eastern Washington for him.

TALLYHO OVERTURNS; MANY ARE INJURED

(United Press Leased Wire.) Victoria, B. C., Aug. 28.—Seven members of the tallyho party who were injured in the overturning of the vessel yesterday afternoon are in St. Joseph's hospital here today and are reported to be making satisfactory progress toward recovery. The most seriously injured of the party is A. S. T. Ogilvie, a prominent resident of Rockford, Ill., whose left shoulder is dislocated, his face cut and left leg broken. Others hurt are: Miss M. A. Hall, also of Rockford, Ill., severe bruise and shock. Mrs. Hall of New York City, broken wrist. Miss Ethel Hall of New York, cut about face and head. Miss Valentine of Milwaukee, sprained ankle and bruise. Several other members of the party were severely bruised and shaken up.

STEAMER MAKES HER LAST TRIP TO NOME

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Aug. 28.—The steamer Victoria sailed late last night for Nome and St. Michael carrying the last freight to be shipped for up river points this year. The last river steamer is scheduled to leave St. Michael by September 5. The Victoria carried a heavy cargo of perishables: fresh meat, vegetables, delicacies of the season and miscellaneous supplies were piled high in the hold. This stuff is destined for various towns and camps along the Yukon, and will provide the last shipments of such dainties the residents of the interior of Alaska will receive for many months. The Victoria carried about 100 passengers including several parties of Nome operators who are going in for the winter. Until about October 19 Nome and St. Michael will be acceptable to steamships, although the river route will be closed to navigation until the following June.

Catholic Church for Shelburne.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Shelburne, Or., Aug. 28.—A Catholic church will be built in this city in the near future. Work is expected to begin by another month. Ground has already been broken for this purpose. A new parish may be established here, which will include all the towns on the C. & E. railroad between Albany and the Cascades.
