

DAIRY LAW FOR CLEAN COWS

That all the passengers on the Ohio lost everything they possessed, all our baggage is gone, and it was a lucky thing that we would not have gotten off with what clothes we did.

"It is said that only seven persons lost their lives in the wreck, but I know of two men who were drowned besides the seven. When our boat, which was last off, began pushing away from the pier, I saw a man trying to swim toward it. I grabbed up a pike pole and reached for him. He saw it and tried to make a grab for it, but as he did so I saw that his mouth was full of water. He put out his arms and then sank. I never saw anything or any sign of him after that; he was drowned.

Lucky to Escape.

"I tell you we were lucky to escape with our lives as we did. It was only a miracle that there were so few drowned."

There were but 10 lifeboats and five lifeboats on the Ohio and these were only launched by the crew, with Chief Officer Cochran standing by calm and cool. The captain was killed, and his men say, to get him to leave the sinking steamer until the very last moment, when the captain was compelled to leap into the water over the vessel's side. The three men were crew who also leaped into the water were compelled to swim 300 yards in the blackness of the night to the beach.

The courage of the women stands out among other incidents of the wreck.

Purser Stephen had every chance to save his life, standing on the deck he was urged to put on a life preserver, but refused and finally went down into the saloon, saying that he guessed he would get his papers. He was never seen again.

None of the passengers, except Mrs. Moore, wife of Captain Moore, of the steamer Dora, now on the Alaska coast run, so far as reported, saved any of their effects from the wreck. The state dairy and food commissioner, J. W. Bailey, said that he was lucky to get two trunks afloat and these reached the shore safely.

The last man to leave the doomed vessel was the night watchman, Captain Johnson and his mate, T. Cochran.

DAIRY LAW FOR CLEAN COWS

Here is the law governing dairy commissioner, taken from the session laws of 1909:

Chapter 237, Section 2. Cows and Bares for Dairy Purposes—Manner of Keeping.—When cows are kept by any person or persons, for dairy, whether they be kept in a barn or on a farm, or in any other place where such cows are kept shall be thoroughly cleaned every day and kept in a sanitary condition. The cows shall be washed immediately before each milking and when the udder is soiled by mud or other filth, it must be thoroughly washed with water and wiped with a clean, dry cloth.

Sec. 3. Unwholesome Milk and Cream.—Whenever it is determined by the dairy and food commissioner, his deputy or inspectors, that any person is selling or furnishing to any skimming station, creamery, cheese factory, condensed milk depot, milk dealer, or any other person, any milk or cream of any impure or unwholesome milk or cream caused by the unsanitary or filthy care in the handling of the same, or the use of unclean utensils, unwholesome food, holding the cream too long before shipping, or from any other cause, the person offending shall be notified and warned by the commissioner, his deputy, or inspectors, not to sell or furnish such milk or cream, and any of the places mentioned. A failure to obey such notice and warning and the continued sale of such milk or cream shall be deemed a violation of this act.

Sec. 10. All fines collected under this act shall be transmitted by the person collecting the same to the state treasurer and by him deposited in the fund known as the pure food fund.

Government Inspector Writes.

S. W. McClure, government inspector of dairy herds, has written from Pendleton to Paul W. Marin, deputy dairy and food commissioner, saying:

"Cows that react to tuberculosis we require to be separated from the healthy members of the herd and their milk to be sterilized before being offered for sale or before being fed to calves. . . . It merely remains for us to separate the diseased from the healthy cattle and to raise the calves upon sterilized milk, and in a few years we have a herd free from tuberculosis. It is the duty of our department to take up this work of the state that the disease may be eradicated by this method without serious financial loss."

Dairy Commissioner Bailey has admitted that he knows of tuberculosis among cows whose milk is sold in Portland, but there are no records within or without his office to show that he ordered such milk sterilized in conformity with government regulation, nor has he in conformity with a later ruling caused affected animals to be slaughtered under the supervision of government inspectors.

These rulings he has not followed, he says, because through the influence of a theory of Dr. Koch pronounced 11 years ago, he does not believe tubercular milk is necessarily unwholesome.

Inspects Herd at Some.

Commissioner Bailey said to a Journal representative yesterday that his office is open to any investigation and readily answered a number of questions asked him. He made the following statements:

"I have inspected about 75 per cent of the dairies supplying milk to Portland consumers during the past year. I found the greater number of them in good condition. . . . I have notified all dairymen to place their premises in a sanitary condition, when such was the case, and have caused arrests to be made when my notice was not observed."

"My system of inspection has been this: I have ordered dairies to be whitewashed twice a year. While cows have been out in the pasture I have not enforced sanitary measures. . . . All dairy keepers to cleanse their premises daily while the cows are kept in stables."

"Whenever arrests have been made, convictions have followed."

Commissioner Bailey produced a memorandum book of entries made when fines were assessed. This constituted the sole records kept by him of cows evaded, arrests made, and fines assessed.

Admits Disregarding Law.

A record of 45 fines, three of \$50 and the remainder \$25 each, was found.

"The money collected under this law is used in keeping up office expenses," said Commissioner Bailey, seemingly unaware that the law reads: All fines collected shall be transmitted by the person collecting the same to the state treasurer and by him deposited in the fund known as "the pure food fund." Commissioner Bailey said in explanation:

"I am only allowed \$1900 a year expense money, and such is required for the same reason I have not complied with the law directing the publication of a monthly bulletin for the information of the people."

Commissioner Bailey added that he believed Oregon had the best milk supply in the country, and that he was ambitious to raise the herds to high efficiency without being stringent with dairymen.

summer have been frightfully frequent. Diseases of the digestive tract have been the cause in chief. Is the milk to blame? Milk is the commonest food. The deduction is simple, is it not?

Impure Milk Poison.

"But I will go farther. Impure milk is a poison. No well informed person would be so foolish as to say that milk from consumptive cows is wholesome or safe for children. Yet imagine the treat children's diseases have no defense. The best we can do is to advise the use of bottled milk. Yet imagine my dismay when, driving the other day, I saw two boys on a disgustingly dirty dairy wagon, at the side of the road, while the vehicle stirred up clouds of foul dust, calmly pouring milk into bottles from a dingy milk can."

"The only way we can have to make the sworn officers of the law protect the children against tubercular or dirty milk is to weed out diseased animals, by compelling dairymen to handle the milk in a sanitary way."

Adults Are Endangered.

Dr. James F. Bell, specialist in the treatment of children's diseases, and medical adviser for the baby home, made three positive statements. They were:

"Bovine tuberculosis is easily preventable."

"Adults are endangered by impure milk as well as infants."

"Contaminated milk of any kind is dangerous."

Dr. Bell, conservative and careful in every statement, laughed to scorn the platform of Dairy Commissioner Bailey, that the German, Dr. Koch's theory of "tubercle germs" that tubercular milk may not be dangerous to human beings.

"The greatest discoveries of science have been made during the past 10 years," said Dr. Bell, "and I, myself, would not reiterate that theory, nor allow the health of a whole city, or a whole state to hang upon such a thread. We do not know all about tubercular bacilli. That bovine and human tubercular bacilli are similar organisms, transmissible from man to animal, we know."

"That bovine bacilli may be transmitted from animals to man, I am almost sure, but because we do not feel justified in jeopardizing the life of the child, we are not altogether fixed in our conclusion. Yet every recent test points in that direction."

Need Competent Inspection.

"But the danger is not to infants alone. We are tracing the summer complaints of adults as well to the milk supply. We know that in Portland the milk supply is notoriously bad. We know that in Portland the laws compelling the cows to be sound and clean are not enforced. We know, consequently, that Portland, in this respect, is behind the times, and the conclusion is that the lives of the people, adults and infants, will be menaced until the inspections are made and the laws enforced by a competent official."

"Now I don't know how much milk I bought outside the baby home. I don't know that the mortality has been very great. Lots of the babies have died. I am sure bad milk was the cause, but worse of all we found diseased cows among those kept at home. Some way must be taken to prevent the cattle being shipped or sold. Until the laws are enforced, we will not be safe either in buying a cow or buying her milk."

What Do the People Think?

"But," concluded Dr. Bell, "do the people really care what kind of milk they get? Sometimes I have thought they wanted dirty milk because it cost less. They certainly have had it. They are willing to pay enough for milk to insure sanitary precautions, but they will be one way of cleaning the supply."

"Another way will be to allow only those who have a baby at home to quickly take a baby's life by braining quick soil bad milk to poison it, to conduct the dairy business. Now that the Journal has undertaken this crusade against the contaminated milk, we shall find out what the people, fully informed, think about the matter."
