Extend Summer Season.—Owing to the unusual amount of travel to and from the Clatsop beaches this season the officials of the Astoria-Columbia River railroad have decided to extend the summer excursion season until September 11 and 12. This gives the beach goers opportunity to go down for the last time on the summer schedule September 11 and to return September 12. School will open in the public schools September 13, and the plan of the railroad is to have the summer schedule in effect as long as the summer vacation lasts. The passenger department is figuring on running a special train on Labor day, one week from tomorrow. The train to leave Portland at 7:45 and reach the beach at 11 a. m., returning the same evening.

Cats are not always unkind. Sometimes they show the Samaritan spirit. Sometimes an old cat becomes a foster mother, and when she does she sometimes selects strange foster children. W. R. Morris, a carpenter, who gives his home at rural Route 2, the box 1, Boring, tells a strange story of the attachment of a mother cat for a little pine squirrel, and he comes through with the photographs to prove his story.

According to the tale told by Mr. Morris, he caught a little pine squirrel a couple of weeks ago. The squirrel was so young that it had no teeth and was in a fair way to starve to death. The carpenter carried it home and presented it to the old house cat, and her four kittens, expecting that it would furnish an unexpected and agreeable meal to the old mother cat.

Instead of satisfying her hunger, the old cat satisfied her curiosity by pawing the little stranger about for a few moments, after which she went peacefully to sleep. The squirrel immediately adopted of a childlike repast from the pail of the old cat, since which time they have been great friends.

Now, with two weeks passed, Mr. Morris has a strange but happy family. The four little kittens are living contentedly together, while the orphaned squirrel, with its mother's love and protection, is growing up with its new family. Mr. Morris has taken several pictures of the happy family and is very proud of his possession.

MOVING DAYS FOR Y. M. C. A.

Intention Is to Be Settled in New Home by Tuesday.

Wagons, drays, trucks and boys were hard at work yesterday moving the bags and baggage of the Young Men's Christian Association from its old quarters at Fourth and Yamhill streets to the new building at Sixth and Taylor streets. Work on the interior of the building is nearly finished and the old furniture is being placed in position.

In places where they can be most easily seen new furnishings will be placed in abundance while parts least used will be fitted up with old furniture. Much of the new furniture is being specially built for the Y. M. C. A., and will be harmoniously stained.
