

WOULD HAVE SOLE SAY INTERFERE

Prince Johannes Menelik of Abyssinia Writes Sensa- tional Letter Urging This Country to Protect His Native Land.

Chicago, Aug. 28.—A local newspaper today prints what purports to be a personal letter from Prince Johannes Menelik of Abyssinia, in which he pleads for American interference in the affairs of Abyssinia to prevent the encroachments of England, Germany and France. The peroration is the pronouncement of a dramatic curse upon England, expressing the prince's hatred for that country.

Prince Johannes is said to be the leader of the movement among the younger Abyssinians against the policies of the old emperor, Menelik II. The letter was written in broken English and is oriental in its romantic wording.

The letter declares that "if Abyssinia is to have protection from any European power we must have it from America," expressing the wish that the United States government will take a hand in the affairs of Abyssinia. It declares the prince will soon come to the United States in an endeavor to interest the government in his project. It continues:

"I now call to the world wide attention to help me in this great work, because if we let it to our native peoples and Africa shall go to hell and not to heaven. It would be right and just that we should have a government as American people and that everyone can keep a free life hand and not to keep down worse than a dog."

Wants No German Interference.
Further on the letter adds:
"I do not know what in the name of God that the emperor wants to bring Germans in our politics for, because the German is only making more evil than anything. But if his majesty will not put them out, I shall await until after the death of the emperor. I will put them out, because we are not hostile, we are only thieves for thousands of years."

The letter expresses the following opinion of the emperor of Germany:

"The German Kaiser is making himself felt in far foreign affairs too much. It is his duty to mind his own business at home in his country."

"In my opinion England must not think that she is going to have the whole world."

Emperor Very Weak.
"I, therefore, wish that this question be considered well by the government of the United States of America. The emperor is getting very weak now. He, therefore, cannot help himself and it is my duty to help him with all the power that is within my soul."

The strange letter concludes as follows:

"We shall leave out the stray of England, for thou shalt hear me: If heaven have any grievous plague in store for my race exceeding those that I can wish upon thee, oh."

"Let them keep it till they stars be ripe and then let the whole world be ripe and the trouble of the whole world. No sleep close up that deadly eye of thine, unless it be whilst some tormenting demon affrights with a hell and not to heaven. Thou abortive, rooting hog; England, the son of Satan, thou do I detest."

Prince Johannes lays claim to the future possession of the throne by right of hereditary.

D. L. Leckenbill, instructor in Assyriology at the University of Chicago, tonight expressed an opinion that the letter was genuine.

MINISTER IMPRUDENT; WILL STILL PREACH

Butte, Mont., Aug. 28.—Found guilty this morning of high imprudence and unministerial conduct by a divided vote of the board of inquiry of the state Methodist Episcopal conference, Rev. John Hosking, one of the city's most prominent ministers, was reprimanded by the conference, and the state having been wiped clear, his character was passed and he will retain his pastorate. There were three counts in the indictment against him, but upon one of them he was found not guilty. The evidence against Mr. Hosking was given by lay witnesses. Specifically, the pastor was found guilty of imprudent conduct with a woman member of his congregation, though proof was sufficient to punish him. Indecent notes to the woman and had been somewhat more intimate with her than a pastor should be. There was no proof or evidence of immorality. The conference felt that the publicity and unpleasantness of the trial and the shame of report were sufficient punishment for Mr. Hosking, and on his promise to keep himself aloof from such indiscretions in the future, the matter was made a past record never to be mentioned in conference again.

CAPT. JAMES MAGEE SOON TO RETIRE

International Grand Opera Co. to Play at Bungalow



The International Grand Opera company, which opens at the Bungalow theatre September 5, will be the first of this season's offerings. Manager Helig presents this company to his patrons, knowing that the reputation that they bring from the principal cities of the east as well as San Francisco, where they have just finished an engagement of six weeks is a personal guarantee of their ability. The company is said to be composed of 100 principals, chorists, and a superb orchestra. On Sunday evening the opening opera will be Verdi's "Aida," with Mme. Bertossi in the title role. The part of Radames will introduce to us Louis Samoloff, a young American who has been at the Royal opera house, Rome, for a number of seasons. Signor Alessandro Arcangeli, who is favorably remembered by the Portland public, will renew his acquaintance in the magnificent role of Amonasso, King of Ethiopia, while Signor Oteri will have his opportunity as the King of Egypt. Monday evening will be given "L'Espresso," a grand opera in three acts, introducing Mme. Jennie Norrell, a former resident of Portland and a lady that has made a phenomenal success in London and New York, as they say, and great merit. Signor Earl will sing the role of Edgardo, Sir Ashton will be represented by Signor Zera. Tuesday night the management will introduce two artists of setting ability, Mme. Helene Therry, a French prima donna of the Opera Comique, and Ugo Columbini, in Giordano's great opera, "Fedora." Mme. Therry was chosen by the author to originate this character of "Fedora" in Paris. The opera is put on with full costumes of the Russian people, and the grand ball scene is one of magnificence. At the Wednesday matinee the favorite "Il Trovatore," with Bertossi as Leonora, Samoloff the Manrico, and Georgiana Strauss in her great characterization of the old egypt mother, "Aida." The rest of the cast will be well taken care of by Zera, Zera, Gravina, Frascona, Gialano, and others. Thursday evening the double bill of Cavalleria Rusticana and Il Pagliaccio will be given. This bill introduces two tenors and two sopranos, Bertossi and Columbini in Rusticana, Samoloff and Donner in Pagliaccio, and a complete cast of chorus and scenic productions. "Carmen" is Friday night opera, with Therry as "Carmen," the captivating cigarette roller; Columbini the "Don Jose," in which character he is said to excel; Zera will be the "Escamillo," Donner the "Micaela," Norrell as "Violetta" will be sung. Saturday night will be the farewell performance and a grand composite bill has been arranged which will present the one act opera Rusticana, second act of Pagliaccio, and Mascagni's new opera, "L'Amico Fritz."

The prices are the regular theatre ones, and the subscription sale for season tickets will open on Monday, August 30. The requirement of the season tickets is to reserve tickets for three or more operas during the engagement, and the seats are allotted before the opening of the regular sale, which is on Wednesday, September 1.

CONTROLS HEAT IN ANY OVEN GIVES CRITICAL

Portland Man Invents Ap- pliance Called the Thermochef.

Invented and owned by the Thermo-chef Sales Co., of Portland, the thermochef, the only appliance of its kind in the world for controlling the heat of an oven, is now being put on sale throughout the country.

The Thermochef was recently patented by the Thermo-chef Sales Co., of Portland, Or., an organization composed of a group of well known Portlanders headed by Walter Thurlow and C. O. Potts, and the plan is to market the appliance all over the United States and Canada with the main office in this city. Offices have been opened in the Hicks-Chattin building, 142 1/2 Second street.

The thermochef is an appliance which absolutely prevents the burning of food in the oven of cookstoves, in which it is installed. It is simple in the extreme, being composed of two strips of metal, one of graduated steel, the other of brass of a peculiar grade. The strips are riveted together by a novel process, to expand, the brass more rapidly than the steel. When the heat in the oven reaches a temperature of 275 degrees, approximate burning heat, the metals expand, and the strips bend, opening vents which allow cool air to flow in. When the temperature is lowered a few degrees the metals contract and close the air holes. A steady temperature is thus assured.

The thermochef itself is merely the two strips of metal about 12 inches in length and two inches in width. It weighs about five ounces. The appliance can be installed in the oven of any kind of stove, on gas or electric heat, and will last for years.

RECLAMATION WORK AS TRAVELING SHOW

Chicago, Aug. 28.—Among the thrilling, stupendous Uncle Sam's \$50,000 production, the greatest far west show in the world, is coming. You can't afford to miss it.
