George E. Chamberlain, United States senator from Oregon, reached the city yesterday afternoon and was greeted by a big crowd of friends and admirers at the Union depot. Today he is with the reclamation committee which is holding a hearing at the Commercial club. He will leave tomorrow morning for the committee to go to Malheur county. He will probably visit Idaho and Nevada points with the committee before returning to Portland for his summer vacation at home.

Senator Chamberlain is a tall, well-built man with a sunken nose and a friendly smile. He is glad to get back, however, and says that Oregon has on other places, which comment was agreed to by Senator Carter of Montana and Senator Varnum of Wyoming after they had stipulated in regard to their own states.

Senator Chamberlain discussed the work done by the last session of congress briefly and paid particular stress to his attitude on the tariff legislation which was enacted. He took issue with his critics who have claimed that he had been inconsistent on his tariff vote.

Voted Against Aldrich Bill.

"I voted for a revenue duty on western products, lower than the Dingley rates," he said. "I voted against the Aldrich bill as a whole. If the different schedules had been segregated in different bills, I would have supported those bills which contained the tariffs for which I voted in the first place. I could not vote for the bill as a whole, however, because it contained provisions which I considered to be unjust. In doing this I stood with Democrats and progressive Republicans alike, who also voted against the bill as a whole but for different sections of it."

Senator Chamberlain expects to return to Portland within a few days and will remain here until time for the next session of congress to convene.

SWORDSMEN IN FRENCH ARMY

The battle was fiercely fought, neither having an advantage until the seventh round, when Gerard started to close on his opponent. He rapidly wore down Ange, and soon had him bleeding freely from numerous cuts. Gerard sank his sword into Ange's chest and he fell exhausted to the ground. His wounds were dressed temporarily by a physician and the injured man was hurried to a hospital.

Ohio Male Chorus Appears
Before Portland
Audience.

The audience that greeted the Ohio Male Chorus at the Baker theatre last night was not as large as might have been expected, considering the fact that the aggregation of 40 has been heralded as peer of its kind in the United States. There was room for all who sought admission and some vacant seats in the gallery behind the stage.

A predominant feature of the concert was the absolute absence of anything that would give artistic appearance to the chorus. Dark trousers that might have been immaculate white and neatly creased, before the dusty ride from Seattle darkened and wrinkled and shoes of variegated colors, did not harmonize with one idea when the chorus sang. The chorus was expected at least to see the "prize songs" rendered without reference to books displayed from constant usage. But such was not the case. Even the soloists had to dig around for their music to some simple song, and one of them, Dr. Shaw of Cincinnati, had to diverge from the program because, as he blushing explained from the stage, the music had been mislaid. But this same Dr. Shaw was not without a voice. What he did sing was well rendered, especially when he was considered that he is yet a very young man. Another soloist, W. H. Winkelman, had to bring into play an old memorandum book for the words to a well deserved encore. This attracted not a little from the plaudits already earned.

Most appreciated perhaps of the entire program was the duet, "Martin Luther," by Messrs. Roberts and Jones, tenor and baritone, respectively, both having good musical and well trained voices. I. C. Humphreys, basso, showed considerable ability in solo work. Dr. O. Evans, baritone, was so nervous to make the audience feel comfortable, but sang acceptably. A quartet composed of Messrs. Walker, Jones, Hyder and Miles sang "The Star of Love" with such pleasing effect that they had to respond with an encore. Hayden Owens, accompanist, broke in on the program with Liszt's sixth rhapsody and received therefore a good round of applause. He responded with the short Greek number.

The chorus work indicated considerable constant training and good voices, particularly in the bass section, some of those in the chorus appearing to better advantage than those put forth as soloists. The program opened with "America" and the "Star of Love" by Protheroe, with "Old Black Joe" for encore. This number was rendered perhaps better than any of the others, and without piano accompaniment. Other members were "On the Sea" by Dudley Buck, "The Star of Love" by Protheroe, "The Pilgrim's Chorus" by Barry, and "The Soldier's Chorus" by Adams. The latter was given with vim and precision, and formed a good climax for the evening.

SEEK TO HAVE
CREDITORS
PROTECTEDJohn D. Deshler Files Appli-
cation for Receivership for
the Deschutes Irrigation
and Power Company—Al-
leges Fraud.

Receivership for the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company has been asked of the United States court by John D. Deshler. A suit was filed in the United States court this morning charging conspiracy, mismanagement, breach of trust and malfeasance in office against the directors of the company, and asking that the business of the corporation be placed in the hands of a receiver, so that it would be conducted in a manner conducive to the best interests of the stockholders and creditors and the general creditors of the company.

The Deschutes Irrigation & Power company, owned by Howard, Alfred Biles, Frederick S. Stanley and Merchants Savings & Trust company, is a corporation organized in the state of Oregon. It is stated that the amount involved exceeds \$2000, exclusive of costs and interest.

In his complaint Deshler asks that the contracts given to Mr. Howard be canceled, and that the assets of the company be sold, and the proceeds distributed to the general creditors of the company. It is also alleged that the Merchants Savings & Trust company be removed from the management of the company, and that the company be placed in the hands of a receiver, so that it would be conducted in a manner conducive to the best interests of the stockholders and creditors and the general creditors of the company.

In the general body of the bill of complaint Deshler alleges that he lent the Deschutes company \$20,000 in 1919 for use in reclaiming the lands of the corporation. He also, later, took up the claim of the Bowling Green Trust company, which was \$25,000, and the irrigation company not being able to meet the account when due, he was secured by notes given him by the company, which were secured by the company's assets. It is also alleged that Howard, Stanley, Alfred Biles and others conspired to defraud the creditors, stockholders and bondholders of the company by diverting it of its proceeds, gain through a contract entered into between Howard and the directors of the company. By this contract, it is alleged, Howard was to assume full charge of the completion of the work of the company. In return he was to advance \$15,000 within ten days of the contract, and \$50,000 within 30 days.
