**Sale of East Side Realty.**—The block bounded by East First, East Second, East Third and Holiday avenue, has been purchased by C. W. Perry from Carl H. Bainbridge for \$60,000. This is at the rate of \$100 for each 50 foot lot and is a record price for property in that district, although prices have increased very rapidly in this section since the announcement that the east end of the new O. R. & N. bridge will be at the foot of Oregon street. Other recent sale of east side property was the purchase by S. D. Wright from the Ladd estate of lots 8 and 9 in block 121, East Portland, for which \$500 was paid.

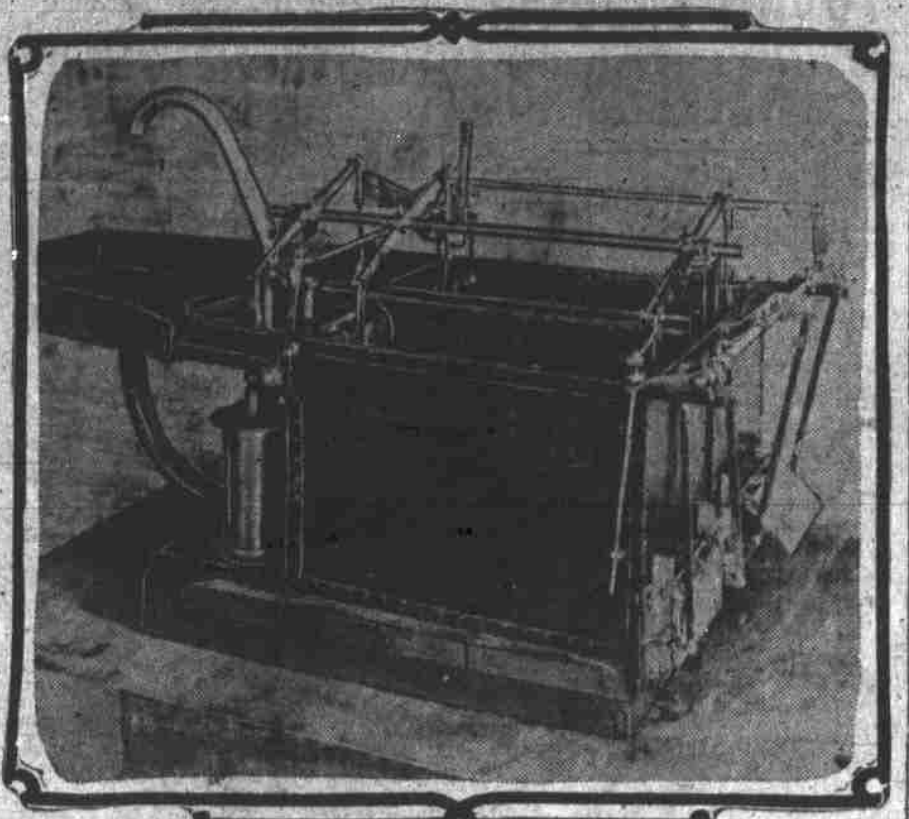

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## UTILIZES WATER POWER TO WORK PUMP IN ENDED FOR IRRIGATING



Irrigating Pump Invented by L. L. Osborne.

Using water power to pump water is the working theme of a new irrigating pump invented by L. L. Osborne, a Portland man, and being built in an East Portland machine shop. The working model of the pump has been shown to experts, and pronounced perfect so far as demonstrating the principle on which the invention operates. Those who are behind a company for the manufacture of the pump declare it will enable thousands of acres of land to be irrigated that are now dry, because it not only works more cheaply than gravity irrigation, but forces a large stream of water to a greater height than is possible in other ways.

The machine is comparatively simple and consists of two pumps operated by the rise and fall of two steel boxes in adjoining water chambers. The buoyancy of the water in one chamber forces up the steel box, which in turn lifts up one pump, while the adjoining box is depressed, and lowers the syphon of the other pump. The boxes work as rapidly as the water chambers are filled and emptied—which in the pump now being manufactured is guaranteed to make 22 strokes a minute.

In the pump which is being made in the shop of C. A. Benbow each box has a lifting capacity of 2200 pounds, making 4400 pounds lifting capacity for the pump. This will furnish over 9000 gallons an hour, at a height of 35 feet, according to the assertion of the manufacturer. While this amount is guaranteed, the manufacturers claim the pump will be found to actually double these figures, and that the pump will furnish at least 14,000 gallons an hour.

The pump is being built in the Lumbar Exchange building, has taken charge of the manufacture of the pumps. He says he expects to construct a factory in Portland that will be capable of turning out a large number of pumps annually.
