HORSE STOLEN IN FRONT OF HOME

Daring Thief Unhitches Animal and Drives Away.

A daring robbery was committed last night about 8 o'clock when a horse and buggy belonging to James H. Palmer of Woodmere were stolen with the owner not 30 feet away.

Mr. Palmer had driven over to Lent's and tied his horse in front of the home of his mother, Mrs. E. N. Chandler. They were sitting in the house talking.

Mrs. Chandler had been in the garden at 8 o'clock and the horse was standing quietly at the post and when Mr. Palmer went out at 8:15 there was not a sign of the animal. The horse was tied on a grass plot which probably deadened the sound of the wheels when the rig was taken out onto the main road.

The horse is a bay gelding, 13 years old, weighs 1150 and is in fair condition. It has long legs with a portion of the right hand foot white, which is the only white spot on its lower side. It is shaggy behind and smooth in front, branded with a large "L" on the right shoulder, black main and tail, foretop not cut high in the withers and has a wire out on the front foot between the hoof and ankle. The horse was hitched to a Studebaker buggy with no top, side

springs, black bed, red wheels and red shafts, which were wired across. The harness was collar style and old.

Mr. Palmer is the proprietor of the Woodmere Nursery and may be reached by telephone Tabor 1452. He will pay a reasonable reward for the return of his horse.

need clear weather and time to make the computations.

"The third way to tell position would be by transit. This would not be absolute, but it would be closely approximate. Whenever the transit showed the polar star to stand at 90 degrees, or in other words, whenever the transit instrument stood perpendicular to the earth and in line with the polar star, then the transit instrument would be located on the north pole. It seems to me, therefore, that this is the way Dr. Cook must have determined his position. The transit would have been the easiest instrument carried, and would have taken the least time in its use; and every second counted in the last leg of the journey."

WILL OBSERVE LABOR'S HOLIDAY

Governor Benson Issues a Proclamation Suspending Business on Monday.

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)

Salem, Or., Sept. 3.—The governor's labor day proclamation, declaring next Monday, September 6, a legal holiday, was issued today. The proclamation follows:

"State of Oregon, executive department, Salem, Or., September 3, 1926.

"Whereas the legislature of the state of Oregon has set apart and appointed the first Monday in September of each year as Labor Day and declared the same to be a public holiday, now—

"Therefore, I, F. W. Benson, governor of the state of Oregon, by the authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim Monday, September 6, 1926, as Labor Day, and recommend its observance throughout our state. I direct that all public offices be closed and I earnestly recommend that private business be suspended wherever possible and that the day be observed by all our citizens in such a way as to show an appreciation of labor's worth and the part it plays in our national life and achievement.
