Still Searching for Bodies.—At noon today the coroner's office reported that the bodies of Samuel McAllister and Jesse C. Bates, both drowned Sunday, had not been recovered, though search is being continued. McAllister was drowned on Columbia slough, 14 miles from Portland, and Bates off a towboat near the North Bank bridge at St. Johns. Mystery surrounds the drowning of McAllister, whose friends had intended going in bathing, he left the others of the party. When the others returned a submergence to find him, he was found on the bank of the slough, but no trace of McAllister.

Passenger Suspects Porters.—W. H. Newlands and Jesse Cooper, arrested last night on a charge of stealing a purse containing \$400 and railroad tickets, were arraigned in municipal court today. Both men are porters on the Northern Pacific train which arrived in Portland from Seattle last night and were arrested at the union depot by Detectives Casey and Mallet. J. W. Rowley of Vallejo, Cal., complains against the man, alleging that he suspected him of stealing his purse while he was asleep on the train.

Would Have Premises.—Suit by which M. A. Gunst & Co. seek to eject Bertha Myers from the premises at 143 1/2 Third street, between Morrison and Alder streets, went to trial before a jury in Judge Gaten's court this morning. The defendant claims possession under a sublease for one year from February 12 from a man named Reid. The plaintiff obtained judgment in the lower court, this being an appeal by the defendant.

Suit Involves Hogs.—A jury for the trial of Augustus Walker, charged with larceny by bailment of 20 hogs, was secured just before noon in Judge Gaten's department of the circuit court. The defendant is alleged to have failed to account for the hogs as he should have done. The value of the porkers is placed at \$118, and the date of the alleged offense is last October. Taking of testimony was begun this afternoon.

Find Old Skeleton.—Workmen engaged in excavating on Mason street, near East Ninth, yesterday afternoon, found the bones of a human being. The bones were taken in charge by Deputy Coroner C. S. Dunning and taken to the morgue. Old timers say that that part of the city was once an Indian burial ground, and that the body had probably lain there for a century or more.

Robbers at Work.—Robbers entered the house of A. Roderick Grant, 551 Elm street, yesterday afternoon while the family was down town. Small articles of jewelry and clothing to the value of about \$25 was taken. The police have no clue.

Will Have a Hearing.—The civil service commission will hear the cases of S. Shrike, Peter Morgan and A. H. McCurtain Saturday morning. The men were formerly street and sidewalk inspectors under the regime of ex-City Engineer D. W. Taylor, who dismissed them for negligence.

TEACHERS WILL HAVE TRAINING

Persons Interested in Sunday School Work Hold Meeting.

That Sunday school teachers as well as do any other teachers need special training for their work is an idea gaining force here, and out of this idea sprang a meeting last night at the Taylor street M. E. church to which were invited the ministers, Sunday school teachers, and prospective ones, and Sunday school superintendents. There was a large attendance and the people listened intently to the plans set forth.

R. S. Steele, state superintendent of Sunday schools presided and explained the purpose of the meeting—to consider the advisability of organizing a teachers' training class and set forth the plans. Other speakers followed with unanimous endorsement. Dr. William Hiram Foulkes, of the First Presbyterian church, Dr. Luther R. Dyott of the First Congregational, Dr. Haeger of the First Christian, Rev. E. Nelson Allen of the Hawthorne Presbyterian, Rev. D. A. Mackenzie of the Fourth Presbyterian, and King Wilson, school superintendent of the Taylor M. E. church, Rev. Charles A. Phillips, general secretary of the state Sunday schools, and J. A. Albert, superintendent of the First Christian Sunday school, were the speakers.

Mr. Steele, who has had considerable experience in this line, will be the instructor of the class which was organized at the close of the meeting. Over 50 ladies were present and many expressed their intention of joining. An effort will be made to secure a class of 25 students, and the class will meet Monday night at the Taylor street church, and will be publicly assigned this week.

THE STRANGER WITHIN OUR GATES

John Grubb, Newcastle, Pa.: "The great strike at McKees Rocks has put a damper on most every kind of labor in the state. The trades unions are listless, and are anxiously waiting the outcome of the strike. In all probability the union will win out, but it is a desperate and long drawn out controversy, and it is feared that there will still be more bloodshed."

"In my opinion one of the wisest moves your municipal government could make would be to either close Chapman Square on Fourth street, or allow none but women and children and their escorts to enter there," said A. R. Penland, Dixon Wyo., at the Oregon. "It appears to me as if that place is a breeding place for crime. One can go down there at any time and hear curses and abuse against the United States government; one can hear anarchy on all sides there. It doesn't look good to me."

"I have just returned from a trip down the Rogue river in Curry county," said T. A. Birdsell, Hamlin, Ore., and "I want to say that some day there will be the garden spot of the Pacific. Hester has offered Nelson \$2500 for the go, win, lose or draw. Nelson, however, is holding out for \$10,000, and believes that if he can talk personally with the promoter he can bring Hester around to his way of thinking. En route to the coast Nelson will stop over at Denver and O Bar, N. M., where he owns a ranch.

MME. NORELLI SCORES TRIUMPH IN TITLE ROLE AT BUNGALOW

The grand opera company had found itself by last night and gave a production of "Lucia" which far surpassed the "Aida" of the night before in artistic ensemble. The Bungalow was filled to the doors with an enthusiastic crowd; the weather was more bearable; the chorus and orchestra had evidently adjusted themselves to circumstances and the soloists, as before, gave of their best.

Interest naturally centered about Madame Norelli, Portland's prima donna, who played the title role. Her appearance was greeted with prolonged applause and after the mad scene she was deluged with flowers. In the receipt of which her art as an actress was taken more strongly and responded more prettily than at any other moment.

After bowing a score of times she had to repeat the climax of the scene. This part of the opera showed Norelli's best work for it gave opportunity to display her coloratura work. Her acting was good with the single exception that her singing at the end of the scene was addressed to the audience and the va-

cant stars of madness was forgotten. Norelli made a beautiful, statuesque Lucia and dressed the part with taste. Bari, who made such a hit the night before as Radames, sang again as Edgardo and plied his honors higher. His beautiful, smooth tenor rose to dramatic heights of feeling that surpassed his work of the night before. His denunciation of Lucia when he finds her as he deems faithless, was the scene of art and his voice fairly vibrated with tense rage and injured love. The closing scene wherein he is stricken with remorse and grief was beautifully sung and his acting was all that could be required. Bari has easily won his way here.

The minor parts were well interpreted. Giuliano, tenor, has a pleasing quality of voice and sings with ease and grace. He doubled as Sir Arthur and Norman. Zara sang the part of Sir Ashton acceptably and Oteri had a small part as Bide-the-Bent. Miss Williams played Alice.

The chorus, too, came up to the standard set for them, and though still small in number because of the small stage, accounted for itself exceptionally well. The chorus in the wedding hall was given with fine swing. The men's chorus in the graveyard, too, was sung with confidence and a tenor voice stood out so boldly and well there as to deserve a soloist's praise.

The orchestration in "Lucia" is beautiful and is part of the opera. That is something that a good many fail to recognize, for the tuneful introductions to each act before the curtain arose were marred by the conversation which would continue till the singers appeared.

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
