Wife of Methodist Bishop to Japan and Korea Is Buried With Honor.

inent men of every religion, the body of Mrs. Merriam Colbert Harris, wife of the American Methodist bishop for Japan and Korea, was buried here today with impressive ceremonies. Among the state ministers and diplomats who attended her funeral were Count Okuma, Sir Kogoro Takahira, former ambassador to the United States, and Baron Komura. In addition there were many distinguished citizens and delegations of Shintoists and Buddhists. Her death is mourned in Japan as a national loss.

The tombstone was of Japanese design and the epitaph was written in Japanese characters.
Before her marriage Mrs. Harris was Flora Lydia Best and she lived at Meadville, Pa. There she was married to Bishop Harris in 1873.
She had been engaged in charitable and religious work by the side of her husband in all parts of the United States and in the Orient. With him she helped establish Japanese missions on the Pacific coast of the United States in the eighties. Shortly afterward the couple moved to Hawaii, where they lived until 1904, when they returned to Meadville. When Rev. Harris was made bishop of Japan and Korea in 1904, the Methodist general conference they moved to Japan, where Mrs. Harris won the high regard of all the Japanese with whom she came in contact.

HOO-HOOS BUSY AT HOT SPRINGS

Hot Springs, Ark., Sept. 10.—This was another busy day for the members of the Consecrated Order of Hoo Hoo. In the afternoon the members of the order held their annual convention here. Two sessions for the transaction of business relating to the affairs of the order were held during the day. A banquet at nine minutes past 9, is the feature of tonight's program. One of the chief events of the convention will be an "embalming" tomorrow of Platt D. Walker of Minneapolis, supreme snark of the universe, who, by virtue of the ceremony, will become a deified member of the ancient house. The election of a new snark, and of a scrivener, jabberwock, bolton and other officers of the order will also take place at the concluding session tomorrow. The gathering will wind up with an old fashioned barbecue at Whittling park.

OXYGEN ON MARS, SAYS DR. LOWELL

Sufficient Evidence to Prove Planet Is Habitable.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Boston, Sept. 10.—Oxygen in the atmosphere of Mars has been discovered by Professor Percival Lowell, according to an announcement made today. The discovery was made through spectroscopic observations.

With Dr. Lowell's proof that the atmosphere of the planet has in it life supporting elements and in sufficient quantity to support life, it is believed no further evidence will be necessary to prove that Mars is inhabited.

Dr. Lowell's announcement follows closely the confirmation of his declaration of last year to the effect that there was water vapor in the atmosphere of the planet. At that time considerable doubt of this was expressed. These doubts were proven to be groundless several days ago when Dr. W. W. Campbell of the Lick observatory took observations from the top of Mount Whitney and got indisputable evidence that there was water vapor in Mars' atmosphere.

Depot for West Salem.

Salem, Or., Sept. 10.—The contract for the terminal station in West Salem to be built for the Salem, Falls City & Western railroad was let yesterday to Fritz Allen & Co. of this city. Louis R. Hazeltine of Salem is supervising architect. The depot building is to be completed, according to the terms of the contract, by November 8. Today material for the structure is being unloaded on the site. The depot will be located at the west end of the steel bridge that crosses the Willamette river at Salem.

Chinese Victim of Thugs.

San Francisco, Sept. 10.—Ah Ring, a Chinese fisherman, was robbed and then shot through the head early today by thieves on the corner of Montgomery and Taylor streets. After fatally wounding their victim they escaped. Later the Chinese was found by the police and was taken to the emergency hospital. He will die. The thugs secured \$15.

DEDICATE EATON HALL SEPT. 19-21

Will Also Celebrate 65th Anniversary of Willamette University.

Willamette University, Salem, Or., Sept. 10.—Preparations are about completed for the dedication of Eaton Hall, which will take place from September 19 to 21, inclusive. The dates are just prior to the opening of the school for the fall term, which will take place on September 21. The celebration will also be an observance of the sixty-fifth year of the existence of Willamette university, commemorating the founding of the institution in 1844. Willamette is the oldest university in the state of Oregon.

Governor Frank W. Benson will be the presiding officer at the dedication ceremonies, Tuesday, September 21. The presentation address will be made by A. E. Eaton of Union, through whose generous auspices the new building was made possible and for whom it is named. The dedicatory address will be made by Bishop Charles W. Smith.

Sunday, September 19, the jubilee exercises will be held commemorating the founding of the university. There will be a sermon in the morning in the First Methodist church by Rev. D. L. Rader of Portland. In the evening there will be addresses by Congressman W. C. Hawley of this city and E. B. Piper of Portland.
It is planned to hold a reunion of the alumni the following day, Monday, September 20. There will be an address in the evening by Chief Justice J. P. Albion of the supreme court of the state of Idaho. Associate Justice Robert Eakin of the Oregon supreme court will preside.
Willamette university expects a big attendance this winter and it is thought that the splendid new administration building will add a spirit to the institution that has been lacking in the past few years.

Child Terribly Burned.
Los Angeles, Sept. 10.—Lying at the

receiving hospital, her face and body covered with terrible burns, Consuelo Gonzalez, 6 years of age, has little chance for her life, according to the hospital surgeons. Early today she was playing with a broken doll on the kitchen floor at her home, Mrs. Cesarea Telles, her foster mother, was in an adjoining room. Screams brought her to the kitchen. She found little Consuelo's clothes a mass of flames. Mrs. Telles was severely burned, stripping the blazing garments from the child's body. The little girl is supposed to have accidentally set fire to her clothes with matches left on a table in the kitchen.

SAYS HE EMBEZZLED; GIVES HIMSELF UP

Aberdeen, Wash., Sept. 10.—Declaring that he was wanted at Oakland on an embezzlement charge, A. J. Starkey gave

himself up to Deputy Sheriff Youngberg and is in jail here awaiting word from California. An examination of his papers leads to the belief that he is telling the truth. Starkey insists that he will be able to prove his innocence if given an opportunity.
