

SPICES FOR L. H. HARRIMAN

Magnates and Commoners
Meet at Short and Simple Ceremonial.

Arden, N. Y., Sept. 12.—With a few magnates of Wall street and many soldiers of the vicinage as attendants, the body of E. H. Harriman was yesterday afternoon consigned to earth in the Harriman burial plot. The more prominent part in the simple ceremonies was taken by Mrs. Harriman, daughter of the late John D. Rockefeller, who, as a country gentleman, rather than as the most powerful of the world's railway kings.

His general superintendent, his master carpenter, his master mason and the managers and assistant managers of his dairies, his farms and his trotting stables bore a coffin and the funeral cortege and only those who were personal friends of the family and had received invitations from Mrs. Harriman were admitted. About 200 of town party arrived at Arden at 2:15 p. m. on a special train.

Burial Services Strictly Private.
The burial services were all strictly private. Admission was by card. The regular funeral service was conducted by Dr. McGuinness, assisted by Rev. G. Nelson, archdeacon of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York. A male quartet and the choir of Grace church, New York, sang "Abide With Me" and "There is a Land of Pure Delight." Mr. Harriman's favorite hymns. The service lasted but 20 minutes. Then the bearers carried the casket to the burial plot, 100 yards up the hill. There was no room inside the burial ground for more than 15 or 20 beside the mourners and the two officiating clergymen. Others stood in the road outside and looked over the stone wall.

Several hundred Harriman employees and their families stood with bared heads outside the church during the service.

Eulogy by Harriman's Pastor.
Rev. J. Holmes McGuinness, Harriman's chaplain, at the funeral services over the body of the dead financier, spoke in part as follows:

"Private and comparatively small as this gathering is, I feel upon me a power, both of audience and of speaker, which seems to weigh me down. But I know you will bear with me while I simply endeavor to draw from the solemn occasion some thoughts which may serve to make us who are so sad in some ways better men. The lesson of morality read to us here is not to be alone, but to the whole company. For this is not a thing done in a corner; this is not a burial affecting a few relatives and friends; here we have the funeral of a man who has lived for the benefit of all the world struck down. There is not an American whom this event does not reach."

JAPANESE HISTORIAN IN HARRIMAN LOSES EXPECTANT PATRON

Tokio, Sept. 12.—The death of E. H. Harriman is the source of keen disappointment to Count Shige-Nobu Okuma, who, at Harriman's personal request, had been preparing a history of the development of the Japanese people, to be published in English.

When Harriman visited Japan he met Count Okuma and was greatly impressed with his leadership of the Progressive party. After talking with Okuma, Harriman announced his belief that the count's storehouse of information and knowledge of the history of the Japanese should be given to the world. He asked Okuma to undertake the work which is to cover the history of the last four centuries.

Through the death of Harriman removes the originator of the idea and will probably present obstacles that would have been overcome by the financial aid and influence of the railroad king. Count Okuma said today that he would continue the work. He expects to complete the history in 1911.

Count Okuma, the head of the Progressive party in Japan, has been minister of foreign affairs and minister of agriculture. He has been prominent mainly through his active leadership of the so-called opposition in the lower house. He is a renowned agriculturist and has been a close student of political affairs for many years. He was created a count in 1887.

District Attorney Cameron says that the Real case will have the right of way when the grand jury convenes this afternoon and that all of the phases of the case will be gone into by the grand jury, provided that body desires to take up their consideration. In other words the grand jury, if it desires, may investigate the case. Should the organization not desire it can pass the question up.

As the case now stands Mrs. Rudolph Becker has told reputable witnesses on different occasions that she knew who ran down Mrs. Real. District Attorney Cameron says she will be subpoenaed if the grand jury desires. If it does not, she will not be asked to tell her story under oath as she made it to others.

Mrs. Maddux, with the story of her many joy rides, is also available for a witness. Her many conflicting stories will be told, if District Attorney Cameron is asked by the grand jury to have her brought in.

Mrs. Blanner, mother of Mrs. Becker, also has her story of how Mrs. Maddux was made sick by the Real case.

Ethel Voss tells of having seen Mrs. Maddux in a car on the night of the tragedy. The bartender of the Cliff inn recognized Mrs. Maddux as the woman, George W. Joseph, C. E. Helium, Arthur Gore and several others are also possessed of salient features of the case.

TUG AND BARGE HERE TO DISCUSS TUG AND BARGE TUG AND BARGE

Arrangement has been made by the Schwartzchild & Sulzberger Packing company with P. Gillman whereby they will use his gasoline tug and barge for the transportation of stock from the new stockyards to their plant.

Since the occupation of the new stockyards, the packing company cannot get its stock to the plant as it would necessitate the driving of the stock over the bridges, and it was found necessary to transport them in some other manner. The method of taking them on the barges will be tried out and if it is found satisfactory, the company will continue to handle them in that manner from the stockyards, until the building of their new plant.

The new system of handling will probably go into operation Wednesday. All arrangements having been made with Mr. Gillman for the use of his boat and barge. By means of this they will be able to handle about two car loads of cattle at a time, and the S. & S. have great hopes of its success, as it will be necessary for them to have some mode of transportation pending the building of their new plant.

GIRLS FIGHT DUEL; ONE DIES OF WOUND

Naples, Sept. 13.—A duel to death between two Italian girls, both members of wealthy families, was fought on the outskirts of Mugnano, according to a dispatch received here today. The girls were Theresa Grasso and Carmela Sansone and the cause of the duel was a quarrel over the love of a young man, whom the young women had quarreled.

Finally Carmela challenged the other girl to a duel and the challenge was accepted. With their seconds they met in a wood and fought four rounds, when Theresa fell mortally wounded from a thrust through the left breast. Carmela besought forgiveness from the dying girl but Theresa refused and died swearing her love for the student.

The student has been dismissed from the seminary and the police are now investigating the affair.

HERE TO DISCUSS TUG AND BARGE TUG AND BARGE

Dr. Wallace Butterick, secretary of the general educational board of New York, is visiting in Portland at the invitation of the trustees of the Reed estate, who are preparing to begin plans soon for the new Reed institute for which a large sum was appropriated.

Dr. Butterick is one of the greatest authorities on educational matters because of his prolonged work with the educational board, which has the most complete collection of statistics and data on educational work of any organization in the world. It is to be his counsel and to profit by his extensive acquaintance, that the Reed trustees have requested his presence here.

The general educational board of New York was founded in 1902 on the basis of a gift of \$1,000,000 made by John D. Rockefeller. Its purpose was to study educational conditions throughout the country and wherever advisable to offer aid in establishing schools. The work at the beginning was confined to the southern states which seemed in especial need of aid, but when the board received its charter from the government it was made to include the entire country. A little later Mr. Rockefeller gave an additional \$1,000,000 and a year later \$2,000,000 more. With this huge endowment the board is practically unlimited in resources.

The board started first to collect data for its own use but as its information became extended and detailed it gained a reputation for its reliability in such matters and people and institutions in all parts of the country would apply to it for information. Accordingly it was decided to make the bureau public with its benefits open to everyone. In its office is now compiled the greatest collection of statistical facts about educational, economic and social conditions of all parts of the country.

It has an incomparable mass of information divided into territorial units, lists a high school, Ontario has a very excellent high school, well equipped, employing three instructors and covering the complete curriculum required by colleges and universities of the state for entrance credit with them. But it has never legally been constituted by vote of the people, and for various reasons attaching to the enforcement of school law in the state it is proposed to hold the necessary election on Saturday, September 18.
