

KANGAROO BOXES STEAMER'S CREW

Jack Mascot on Janita Expert at Art of Self Defense.

NEARLY ENDS CAREER BY JUMP INTO HOLD

British Steamer Which Arrived This Morning Will Take Out Large Cargo of Wheat for Kerr, Gifford & Company—Lining Commences.

Jack, the mascot of the British steamer Janita, Captain Dunbar, who arrived at Montmorency dock No. 2 this morning at 7:30 o'clock from San Francisco, is a kangaroo, which came over on the steamer from Australia, and he allows nobody to interfere with his rights, for he is a master at the gentle art of boxing, and he is said to have a terrific punch.

The kangaroo is the property of J. W. Holdcroft, first officer of the Janita, and Jack was presented to him in Newcastle, N. B. W., before the vessel left there with coal for San Francisco, July 27. He was taken aboard of the Janita by Mr. Holdcroft and given quarters in the crew which was in the hold. He is a special use, as he is a young kangaroo and therefore does not like to be too closely confined, he made it his business to break out of his cage just before the steamer left Newcastle, and after running playfully up and down the deck, decided to have a good idea to show the officers and crew what an expert he was at high diving, so he perched himself on the forward hatch, and after a short pause, without for effect or to gauge the distance is not known—it was certainly not to extend the attention of the crew which he had been the object of their interest for some time, as he dodged their many attempts to catch him—he suddenly dove into the hold, Jack made one of the mistakes of his life when he made that leap, as he went down about 10 feet before he stopped, nearly breaking his legs as he landed. He was stunned, and after that experience he evinced no further desire for daredevil leaps.

On the voyage over, Jack indulged in many boxing bouts with members of the crew which were an expert in that line. At any rate, for his age, which is about three years, he is considered a wonder, and his owners has received several very flattering offers for him from circus managers, but Jack will remain with the Janita until she arrives in Portland, where Mr. Holdcroft is taking him as a present to his family. New Contract to Be Ratified by the Unions Tomorrow Night.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chicago, Sept. 15.—A victory for the street car employes is announced. The contract will be officially closed Friday. The unions will meet Thursday night to ratify a new contract that will cost the traction company \$1,500,000 in increased wages in three years. Employes of over two years will get 30 cents. Third year men, who have worked at a maximum of 27 cents an hour, will receive 28 cents immediately and 29 cents next August.
