He was taken aboard of the Janets by Mr. Holdcroft and given quarters in a cage which was built on deck for his especial use. As he is a young kangaroo and therefore does not like to be too closely confined, he made it a point to break out of his cage just before the steamer left Newcastle, and after running playfully up and down the deck. decided it would be a good idea to show the officers and crew what an expert he was at high diving, so he perched himself on the forward hatch, and after a short pose, whether for effect or to gauge the distance is not known—it was certainly not to attract the attention of the crew for he had been the object of their interest for some time, as he dodged their many attempts to catch him—be suddenly dove into the hold. Jack made one of the mistakes of his life when he made that leap, as he went down about 27 feet before he stopped, nearly breaking his legs as he landed. The Janeta salled from Newcastle, July 27, with a full cargo of coal for the Pacific Mail Steamship company, which she delivered at San Francisco, after a 32 days passage from Newcastle. On the trip up here from San Francisco, good weather is reported, and although she encountered strong northerly winds, she did not get into any fog until she arrived at the mouth of the river, as she stayed pretty well off shore.

Lining of the steamer will begin today and it is expected to have her in readiness to begin loading tomorrow or next day. She will carry about 200,000 bushels of wheat, consigned by Kerr, Gifford & Co., to United Kingdom ports.


