

LOOK FOR BIG COLONIST RUSH WILL LOCATE CLACKAMAS

First Trainload Will Arrive in Portland Today—Roads Heavily Taxed. Portland Firm Buys Tract for Large Factory—Fine Location.

Today will see the first of the rush of colonists to Oregon under the new railroad rates. The fall rates of \$12 from Missouri river points and of extremely low amounts from other sections of the country, went into effect last Wednesday. Allowing time for starting from eastern points Portland officials of transcontinental roads estimate that the first of the homeseekers should reach Portland on today's train.

Owing to the approach of winter and the two excessively inclement seasons experienced by eastern people in the past year—the unusually cold winter and the very hot summer—it is believed that the migration to Oregon will be exceptionally large this fall. Railroad men who are keeping in touch with the situation through their agents in the east and the middle west estimate that the month between September 15 and October 15 will see fully 50,000 new citizens in Oregon.

Last spring's colonist rush was the greatest in the history of the transcontinental roads and for the 30 days the rates were in effect the lines were taxed to their capacity to handle the settlers bound for the west. The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition has brought many people to Oregon during the summer because of the very cheap round trip rates and this, it is thought, may prevent the colonist movement this fall from being quite so large as that of the spring.

When the colonists purchase tickets to Oregon they are given their choice of any point in the state, it costing no more to buy to any one of the outside towns than to Portland. Most of those who come have made up their minds where they are going to settle before they move out, the community booklets issued by various cities of the state having made them thoroughly familiar with the advantages of the various districts.

Gymnasium Opens Tomorrow With Complete Equipment.

With its large gymnasium in the new building completed for use, the Portland Young Men's Christian Association will tomorrow resume active work in the physical department. The apparatus has not all been installed, but both men's and boys' classes can begin their work, and practice for basketball, indoor baseball and handball can be taken up without delay.

The hard maple floor of the gymnasium has been highly polished and courts have been laid out for basketball and handball. In basketball especially the association expects to make a good showing this year. A league has been formed for this sport, including teams from Portland, Victoria and Vancouver, B. C., Seattle, Spokane, Tacoma, Hoquiam, Bellingham, Everett and North Yakima. Frequent games are to be played throughout the winter and the local association expects to make a strong bid for the championship.

Besides the gymnasium, the handball court is available for immediate use. This court is one of the best in the city and the association expects to develop some strong teams in this sport which is rapidly gaining in popularity. The smaller gymnasium will probably be used for handball part of the time as well as the regular court. A wrestling and boxing room, with padded walls, is also being fixed up, but will not be ready for use for some time.

The shower baths, with which the new building has been well equipped, will probably be ready for use tomorrow. Three sets of these baths have been provided, one for the general membership, one for boys and a third for the business men's division. The swimming tank, too, is being rapidly put into shape. Workmen have just completed lining the tank, as well as the room in which it is located, with tile, and only the electric wiring remains to be done before the water can be turned on.

To develop a power plant on the Clackamas river and establish a factory for the manufacture of bookkeeping machines and sanitary furniture, the Gibson Manufacturing company, of this city, has begun the construction of a dam 741 feet in length and 60 feet high across the Clackamas at about six miles east of Oregon City. To secure land for the reservoir in addition to that already owned by the company, the farm of Thomas R. Brown, consisting of 210 acres, has been bought for \$24,000. An effort is being made to purchase other land until the aggregate of 1,000 acres can be used as a reservoir site.

A force of men is engaged in preparing for the concrete foundations of the dam, and material is being gathered for the work during the winter season. It will take nearly two years to complete the dam, and the immense spillway, and the cost will be enormous. One advantage has been secured which promises to be of great value in large establishments, as indispensable as the cash register, when once put into use.

The Gibson Manufacturing company is operating a manufacturing plant on the east side, and is turning out considerable product. The concern has as a board of trustees: H. B. Adams, secretary; William Smith, vice president; J. S. McFarren, W. P. Andrews, Dr. G. A. Bradford and Daniel Leatherman. The company was organized in 1907.

DETECTIVE AND SHERIFF TAKE UP TRAIL LEADING INTO WOODS.

Ending a chase of five days on slender clues, Police Detective Tom Coleman Friday night captured Charles Sundstrom, accused of the theft of \$200 and a watch from John Peterson at a logging camp near Buxton, Or. The detective arrived in Portland with his prisoner Saturday evening.

Monday Peterson reported to the police that his intimate friend, Charles Sundstrom, with whom he had been living at Third and Flanders streets, had disappeared with the savings with which he had hoped to go to his home in Sweden.

Assigned to the case, Detective Coleman learned that Sundstrom had gone to a logging camp near Buxton, Or. Friday at noon started out in the police automobile with Patrolman Chaufour to make a quick capture. At Hillsboro Sheriff G. G. Hancock of Washington county was picked up, and the trio went out on the trail of the suspect, only to have the police auto break down 21 miles from Forest Grove, Or.

Friday night Detective Coleman and Sheriff Hancock walked 14 miles to the logging camp, captured the man, recovered the stolen goods and walked the prisoner 12 miles to the nearest railroad station. At 11 o'clock last night the police automobile was still lost in the wilds with a broken engine.

Sundstrom will be arraigned on a grand larceny charge in municipal court Monday.

LEMON SAYS HE WILL LEAVE CITY

Secures Release from Prison on Making Solemn Promise.

Frank Lemon, who figured in a sensational mixup with W. R. Haislip of Laurelvood in the office of Attorney T. J. McDevitt some time ago, obtained his liberty yesterday afternoon by order of Circuit Judge Bronaugh, with the understanding that he would leave on a night train for Los Angeles and would not again molest Haislip or trouble Portland with his presence.

To secure this result, Lemon pleaded guilty to the charges of assault and battery, on which he was sentenced to jail in the lower court, which had been appealed to the circuit court. John F. Logan and John H. Stevenson, his attorneys, pleaded long with Judge Bronaugh, who first demurred because no one was present from the district attorney's office to sanction the arrangement. Logan informed the court that the district attorney had authorized him to say that this plan was satisfactory to the district attorney's office.

"Why is the district attorney not here to speak for himself?" inquired the court.

"I believe he has gone duck hunting," Judge Bronaugh replied. Logan, Judge Bronaugh finally consented to receive the plea of guilty and to order the release of Lemon, for whom a ticket to Los Angeles had already been purchased. Lemon formerly was a member of the police force in the California city and he came here with the divorced wife of Haislip. The latter has the children born to his wife and himself in his custody, and he asserted that they tried to blackmail him and to compel him by force to give up the children.

BOYS WHO KILLED PLAYMATE CAPTURED

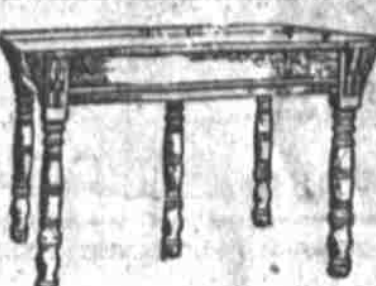

PLANT PINE BURRS ON MOUNTAINSIDE

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.) Boise, Idaho, Sept. 18.—For the first time in the history of the Boise national forest, the service will start in a few weeks the work of planting about 500 yellow pines on the exposed mountain sides.

These trees are three years old and are of the sturdy type which seem to thrive in the mountain fastnesses. The planting of the pines is merely an experiment, and if in the spring it is found that they have weathered the severe winter frosts, many thousands will be planted in the forest next fall.

The planting department of the forest service is considered to be one of the most important and those in charge have given careful study to the various trees found in this country. The yellow pine is considered one of the best of the pine species. Various experiments with it elsewhere have shown it to be one of the sturdiest kinds.
