ODD FELLOWS IN GRAND PARADE

Ten Thousand in the Line That Passes Through Seattle's Streets.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Seattle, Sept. 22.—Probably the largest fraternal turnout ever made in the northwest was witnessed today when members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows marched through the principal business thoroughfares in honor of the sovereign grand lodge, which is now holding its annual session in this city. It was estimated that not less than 10,000 members of the order participated.

The parade passed in review before Grand Sire W. L. Kuykendall, of the grand lodge; General M. A. Rainey, commanding the Patriarchs Militant, and Major General E. P. Edsen, commanding the department of Washington. Members of the fraternity to the number of 1500, accompanied by three bands, arrived from Tacoma in time to join the

parade. Excursion steamers and special trains arriving this morning brought many other lodge men to swell the column of the marchers.

The Patriarchs Militant, in full uniform, lent a military aspect to the parade. Another picturesque touch was given by several thousand members of the subordinate lodges who marched in uniform.

There are a number of special prizes in the shape of cash awards and cups, for efficiency and display.

More than 600 women of the Rebekah lodges took part in the parade, automobiles having been supplied for their use. Several elaborate floats representing the Rebekahs were in line and constituted one of the interesting features of the occasion.

Grand Sire's Report.
The annual report of Acting Grand Sire W. L. Kuykendall shows the membership of the order throughout the world at the close of 1908 to be as follows: Subordinate membership, 1,492,478; encampment membership, 216,226; Rebekah lodge membership, 603,581; Patriarchs Militant membership, 22,136; total membership, including subordinate lodge members and sisters only of Rebekah lodges, 1,888,276.

The total net increase for the year throughout the world was 93,475.

Total revenue for the year was \$16,370,937. The expenditures for relief were \$5,690,826. The total invested funds of the order are \$16,211,369.

The grand sire recommended the adoption of legislation that would prevent members from engaging in the creation and fostering of any society which bases its membership wholly or mainly on any branch of their order. This legislation is designed to prevent formation of other women's organizations like the Rebekah branch.

In the statistics of membership the quasi-independent grand lodges of Australia, Denmark, Germany, Sweden and Switzerland are included. They have no connection with the order.

Acting Grand Sire Kuykendall was elected deputy grand sire at the Denver sovereign grand lodge last September and became acting head of the order upon the death of Grand Sire John L. Nolan.

Cotton Manufacturers Meet.
Bretton Woods, N. H., Sept. 22.—The National Association of Cotton Manufacturers began its eighty-seventh meeting here today with a large attendance of members. The initial session was called to order by President Charles T. Plunkett and after some preliminary routine business the visitors were formally welcomed in an address delivered by Governor Henry P. Kimbly. The convention will remain in session over tomorrow. Many important papers have been prepared. Among the subjects to receive attention are the following: The labor problem in relation to the cotton production, mechanical cleaning of cotton machinery, the com-

mercial values of coal, steam generation for cotton mills, accidents to cotton mill operatives, reinforced concrete for mill construction, starches for mill use, and housing mill employes.
