

FIND NO TRACE OF MISSING MAN

Relatives of J. Addison Smith Continue Search Persistently.

The mystery surrounding the disappearance of J. Addison Smith from the Open Air Sanitarium at Milwaukee last Thursday remains as far from being solved today as at the start, after a close investigation of every plausible theory or clue.

Smith was a patient, having been sent to the sanitarium suffering from tuberculosis. He had charge of the bookkeeping department, and the fact that the sanitarium safe was robbed several weeks ago, seemed to give him cause for new worries.

The missing man is a son of Dr. T. C. Smith Sr., of Salem, and is well known both in Portland and Salem, where up till a short time ago he was employed in the freight department of the Southern Pacific. Dr. T. C. Smith Jr., of Salem, his brother, is managing the search which was instituted immediately after his disappearance.

The wife of the missing man has been staying with her mother at Puyallup, Wash., during the time Smith was being treated at the sanitarium, but is now here aiding in the search. Mrs. Smith can assign no reason for her husband leaving the sanitarium. He is said to have received two letters on the morning of his disappearance, but it is not known from whom. In a letter that he wrote to his wife Wednesday morning, he stated he would have to leave the sanitarium unless he felt better.

The physician in charge declares Smith was in good physical condition when he left, and that the attack of tuberculosis had been arrested. He was not a drinking man. Having an artificial leg, it is not thought he could have walked very far, but there is said to be a possibility of him having gone away on a train, as he was known to have had \$50.

Although the sanitarium is located near the river, it is not believed that he committed suicide, as in that event the body would probably have appeared by this time on account of the heavy blasting being done along the river bank. The woods in the surrounding country have been searched for Smith.

Smith is about 40 years old, with black hair tinged with gray, has dark eyes, is 5 feet 6 inches tall and weighs about 185 pounds. When last seen he wore a pair of light colored trousers and a brown coat. He walks with a cane.

WOMAN DRINKS VIAL OF POISON

Mrs. Clara Madden Kills Herself While Daughter Lies Ill in Next Room.

Killing herself and probably destroying what chance her sick daughter, lying in the next room, had for recovery, Mrs. Clara Edna Madden, 46 years old, wife of George Madden, teamster employed by the Young Milling company, and living at 663 Macadam road, drained down the contents of a vial of carbolic acid about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Friends who had come to call on 17-year-old Mary Madden, lying on a sick bed, found the dead body of the mother in an adjoining room, her lips and face rendered black from the effects of the deadly liquid. Told of the suicide, the girl swooned and today is in an extremely critical condition.

Removed to the Dunning morgue, the body is being held by the authorities until arrangements for the funeral can be made. Up to noon today nothing had been done about the burial.

Temporary mental derangement is assigned as reason for the suicide by the husband and friends of the woman. She had been morose for several days.

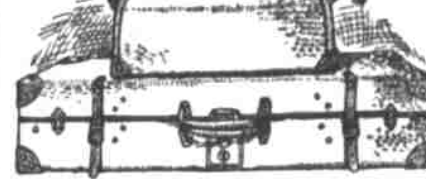
