

DAIRIES WILL PROFIT BY CRUSADE

State Veterinarian Says Removal of Diseased Cows Will Save Balance of Herd—Animals Will Be Tested by Government.

Cows so emaciated they could scarcely stand, so far gone with consumption that their death might be expected at any time, have been found by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, in company with government experts he has been testing cows in Portland dairy herds for tuberculosis. In many instances the dairymen, he says, are so ignorant of the disease and its consequences that they do not know what is the trouble with their animals.

Finding 25 per cent or more of the cows in herds near Portland affected with consumption, the state veterinarian considers the situation so serious that he has called upon dairymen to conduct organized effort against the disease, the unsanitary, the uncleanliness and the lack of care, that is ruining their business and making the supply a menace of death to the young children of the city.

Eradicate dirt first, disease second, Dr. Lytle says, is the proper sequence in reform. Tuberculosis among dairy cows, highly dangerous if unchecked, is capable of elimination, he says, but only by cooperation on the part of the dairymen with state and government officers.

Will Aid Dairymen.

This is the conviction of the state veterinarian, and he is sending a message to every dairymen in the vicinity of Portland, assuring all that the fight for clean, healthy cows, sanitary barns and wholesome milk is in their interest, that second to the tremendous safeguard raised against high infant mortality by a clean milk supply, the dairymen will benefit as a result of the crusade.

Dr. Lytle contends that only those who are willfully ignorant of conditions and indifferent to the demands the people have a right to make, will suffer as a result of the campaign for good milk. With an intense personal desire

to help in any way that he can he is sending the following statement to dairymen, the directions contained therein to be posted in a prominent place in the barns:

"Tuberculosis in cattle is a preventable disease. A herd when once freed of disease will not become infected unless diseased animals are introduced.

"Tuberculosis is a disease of close domestication, and it cannot thrive in animals or spread so rapidly where the animals are out in the open, or where they are housed in buildings that closely simulate and embody the protective forces of nature, such as pure air, sunlight and freedom from dust and excessive moisture.

"Should White-wash Barns.

"Your barns should be regularly whitewashed, thus giving a greater surface, and encapsulating all dust and infective materials that may be on the inner surface of the building.

"You should provide sufficient window lighting space in your barns—four square feet for each animal—as sunlight or daylight is one of the enemies to tuberculosis and other diseases. By hanging the windows at the bottom and allowing them to open in at the top, and including the side of the windows with a V-shaped inclosure a cheap and effective form of ventilation may be had, especially if the barn is provided with a roof-ventilating cupola. Window frames covered with white muslin assist in ventilation and give sufficient light.

"Manure and litter should be cleaned out daily, as the same from tuberculous animals, if allowed to soil the food of other animals, may be the means of carrying the disease to them.

"Animals should also be confined to one particular stall or feed rack, as by change about they may expose other animals, should they chance to be diseased.

"Animals that are unthrifty and continuing poor in flesh and those with chronic coughs should be regarded with suspicion and should be tested for tuberculosis, or clinically examined for the same. However, many animals in good flesh and free from visible symptoms of tuberculosis will be found diseased if tested.

"Animals that die when in a state of emaciation (poor in flesh) should not be fed to hogs, as they may transmit the disease to them.

"Any person desiring his herd of cattle tested for tuberculosis may have the same done without cost to himself, by making application either to the state veterinarian or county veterinarian, or by making application to the United States Bureau of Animal Industry."

government score card, which is the standard regularly accepted. Dr. Mack finds the average grade of 51 dairies inspected to be 38.69 per cent, or about half what they should grade in order to give assurance of even a reasonably safe milk production.

Dr. Mack found that 1534 cows out of a total of 1567 in the dairy herds near Portland which were inspected during the month are being milked. These give a daily production of 3560 gallons. The highest score was 62 per cent and per cent below the government minimum. Two dairies during the month were ordered closed. These were the Kiser and M. Tanner dairies, the latter attention was called by the Journal.

Dr. Mack makes note of the fact that he has adopted the government score card and that he is leaving copies of it with the dairymen, so that they may help themselves to a better regulation of their places. He states that the dairymen are showing willingness to better themselves and that improvement among the dairies is becoming evident. Dr. Mack discourages the use of malt as feed, except where it is kept in cement bins, which may be quickly flushed, and at other times kept so that the malt will not be subject to fermentation.

The city milk inspector declared that he finds many of the dairies operated by more or less ignorant and poverty stricken tenants. In one case specifically stated in The Journal, a dairy operated by one Paulson, on Cornell road, with a barn forbidding sanitation, was found to be the property of Attorney T. N. Strong of Portland. Mr. Strong, again, after the matter was brought to his attention, to build for his tenant, a large and modern dairy barn. Other property owners, it is believed, will act in the same way when the matter is presented before them.
