

PREACHER TIRES OF "LIVING LIE"

Instead of Exhorting to Move Upward Now Yelling "Move Forward."

Lawrence, Kan., Oct. 1.—Declaring that the average minister lives a lie every day of his life to avoid offending the influential members of his congregation and that it is almost impossible for a minister of the gospel to live an honest life, Rev. D. H. Carlick has resigned the pastorate of the Christian church to become a street car conductor. Kansas ministers are furious at the Rev. Carlick's statements and are declaring his utterance are absurd. In a statement given out here today, the minister said:
"I do not believe a modern preacher can live an honest life. If he preaches the truth he will be condemning the lives of most of his congregation, and this will be sure to offend them. Instead of preaching his convictions the average minister avoids saying anything that will injure the feelings of his church members."

BANK GUARANTY LAW PROVES ITS MERITS

Oklahoma City, Okla., Oct. 1.—The bank guaranty law was given a severe test here yesterday when thousands of dollars were paid out to the depositors of the suspended Columbia bank from funds of the state banking board and financiers today are declaring that the measure has already proved its worth. Today the directors of the institution submitted a proposition to the state board looking toward reopening the bank.

Although considerably over \$150,000 was paid out by the banking board yesterday it was stated today that sufficient funds were still on hand to pay every demand that might be made against the Columbia bank.

WHITECAPS KILL COLORED MEN

Owners of Logging Camp Believed to Be Victims of White Competitors.

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 1.—Ollie Davis and Charles Duke, both colored, who were proprietors of logging camps, were shot to death by "whitecaps" according to information received by Governor Noyes today from Sarah, Miss., near where the murders occurred. It is believed the colored men were killed at the instigation of white loggers against whom they were pitted in business competition.

Recently Davis and Duke were warned to leave their properties, or death would be the penalty. Both refused to obey the mandate and decided to stand their ground.

The first warning was followed by several more, after which a band of horsemen, covered with sheets, rode in to their camp, pulled them from their cabins and shot them to death. The bodies were left on the ground riddled with bullets and the horsemen disappeared.

YOUNG MAN TRUE TO SWEETHEART IN JAIL
