

# WELL KNOWN TOGG AFFECTS THE DEAD IN LOS ANGELES WINE TRAFFIC

### Others Missing in Extension Mine with No Hope for Them—Well Known Ath- lete a Victim—Game Struggle of Giant Greek.

(United Press Special Wire.)

Extension, via Ladysmith, B. C., Oct. 4.—Thirty-four are now known to be dead in the terrible mine disaster here. Others are missing and little hope is held out for them. Owing to a cave-in in No. 2 slope for fully 60 yards, it may be a week before the bodies are reached.

Great sorrow is pouring in of the victims. The sister and brother-in-law of Latham, one of those dead in the mine, arrived last night from Kansas on a visit. Wessersch, single, also returned Sunday from a hunting trip and intended to work for two days and then resume their holiday.

Rescuers resumed work at daylight, but up to 3 o'clock no other bodies, in addition to the 34 already recovered, had been brought out.

List of the Known Dead.

The victims so far recovered are: Thomas O'Connell, single, Andrew Moffat, married, James Ewart, married, Robert Marshall, single, William Robertson, married, William Quinn, single, Edward Dunn, single, James Molynaux, single, Edward Taylor, single, William Davidson, single, Alexander Meios, single, a Montenegro.

Thomas Meios, single, Peter Nolan, single, William Kesserich, married, James Kesserich, single, Thomas Parkin, married, John Bullitch (colored), married, Charles Schuff, single, Unidentified man.

Football Star Among Victims.

Among men who lost their lives in this explosion there were none more popular or better known, not only in Vancouver Island, but also in sporting circles on the mainland, than Tom O'Connell, the star fullback of the Vancouver football team. From the position in which his body was found it is evident that he had taken alarm at the first sound of the explosion and made a desperate effort to escape. He was working some distance from the exact spot where the explosion originated, and a few men who escaped said O'Connell had called to him and then started to run to escape the deadly aftermath, which generally causes a greater loss of life than the explosion itself. He was found with his arms drawn up and his leg muscles still tense from the last desperate rush, more determined than any he had ever made on a football field, in which he was trying to reach fresh air. In his mad haste he had dashed off his shirt against a pillar in the darkness. The shock evidently stunned him and allowed the deadly gas to overcome him. His body was among the five found when the rescuers managed to penetrate past the two mile mark on No. 2 slope.

The body of Alexander Meios, a Greek, with the frame and muscles of a Hercules, was the last of the original quintet rescued. He had been terribly mangled and burned by the explosion, but his phenomenal physique enabled him to press on until exhausted nature finally gave way and the aftermath overtook him.

With the exception of one body, the head and torso of which were so badly mangled as to be still unidentified at a last hour last night, Meios' body was the most shockingly mangled of the lot. Stripped of the waist as he was at his work the flame of the explosion literally peeled the skin of his back until it was hanging in shreds over his hands like the fragments of a badly torn and blackened glove. The sole of one of his heavy shoes was torn off and the uppers of both hung in tatters with not the slightest sign of a lace in one shoe. The big collar was torn off and around the mines owing to his feats of strength, and strong men gathered around the tunnel mangled and slithered and shed tears when his body was brought out.

San Bernardino, Cal., Oct. 6.—After participating for five days in the man hunt for Billy Boy, the Piute Indian murderer of old Mike Bonifer and his daughter, Mary Nita, Deputy Sheriff Preciado started today with a fresh posse for the mountain section north of this city, known as the Cox ranch district.

Preciado and his Judo officers reached San Bernardino at dark yesterday from The Pipes, a desert station. Their search for the murderer resulted in nothing but the discovery of another clue, which the deputy sheriff hopes will result in the capture of the fugitive. At Pipes, Preciado was rescued by a messenger from Cox ranch, who stated that the Indian had been seen in the foothills in that vicinity. Preciado immediately returned to this city and reorganized his party.

Information comes from the desert today that Sheriff Ralphs and his posse have at last found Billy's trail and have hopes of capturing him.

Storekeepers at Victorville and other outlying villages have been warned by the officers to sell no \$2-\$5 ammunition to Indians. This step was taken to guard against the fugitive receiving aid through the desert tribes.

ONE KILLED AND THIRTY INJURED

Temple, Texas, Oct. 6.—Engineer Mc-Ginnis is known to have been killed, 28 persons are reported fatally hurt, and it is believed that four were burned to death when a passenger train on the Texas & Pacific was wrecked at a switch near here today.

The engine turned over and the coaches went into the ditch. The baggage and express cars were burned, and it is believed that at least four men were burned to death in them.

Five relief trains are on their way from Houston to the scene of the wreck. Every passenger on the train was more or less injured.

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# PROGRESSION ALONG LINES OF SANITY

Frederick Stratton, collector of the port of San Francisco, Oct. 6.—According to the collector of the port of San Francisco, the tug flying the president's flag passed the revenue cutter McCulloch, anchored midway between Goat Island and the city. Taft stood with bared head while the presidential salute of 21 guns was fired.

When Goat Island was passed, the naval apprentice on board the United States training ship Pensacola stood at attention and the ship's guns barked a salute. The band played the "Star Spangled Banner," and the flag was dipped.

The train bearing Taft and the party accompanying him to the Yosemite left Oakland at 9 o'clock.

The president shook hands with Mayor Taylor and said:

"Goodbye, Mr. Mayor. I want to express my gratitude, and I'll never forget the pleasant reception your city gave me."

He then grasped the hand of Chief of Police Cook and thanked him for the manner in which he was guarded by the police while in the city.

A moment after the train was under way. Until it had moved from the sheds the president stood on the rear platform and waved farewell to the officials and commuters who had gathered to catch a last sight of him before he left the city. Taft stood with bared head until the train was out of the city.

In addition to the regular party accompanying the president, those who will be with him during his trip through the park are Governor Gillet, United States Senator Flint, Congressman Needham, McKinley and Englebright.

John Muir, the geologist and explorer, who led Roosevelt through the Yosemite, also accompanied Taft and will guide him through the forests of the park.

Port Costa, Cal., Oct. 6.—President Taft's special train made its first stop after leaving Oakland today at Port Costa, at 9:40 o'clock. A big crowd had gathered and in response to cheers and calls the president appeared on the platform and made a short speech.

Immigration Station at Angel Island Favored by Taft

San Francisco, Oct. 6.—According to the collector of the port of San Francisco, the immigration station at Angel Island, which has been completed for a year but has never been opened, is in favor of the immediate opening of the immigration station on Angel Island.

En route to Oakland on the government tug Golden Gate today Stratton and the president held a long private conversation regarding the station.

After listening to the arguments put forward by the collector the president told Stratton that he had already sent a telegram to the secretary of the department of commerce and labor asking for a report on the immigration station and requesting the reason why it has not been put in use. He also declared himself to be heartily in favor of opening the station as soon as possible.

At present the immigrants from the Orient are housed in an abandoned warehouse on the Pacific Mail docks, which physicians have declared to be unhealthy.

The immigration station was built at a total cost of \$270,000, according to Stratton, and everything is in readiness for immediate occupancy as soon as the government officials give the order to open it.

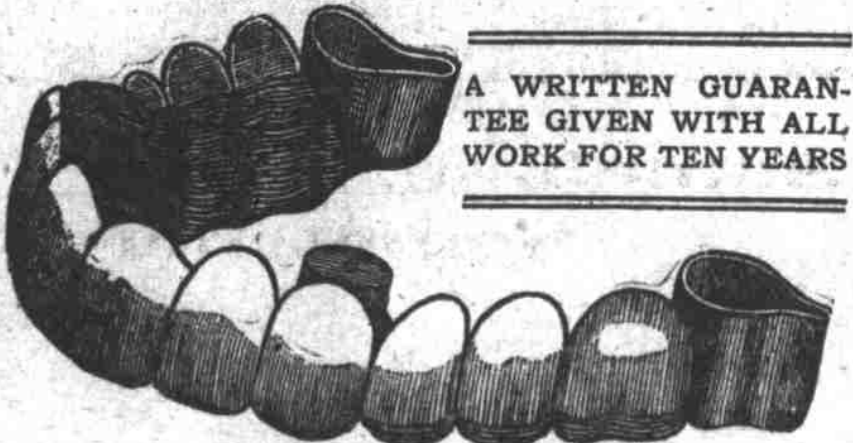

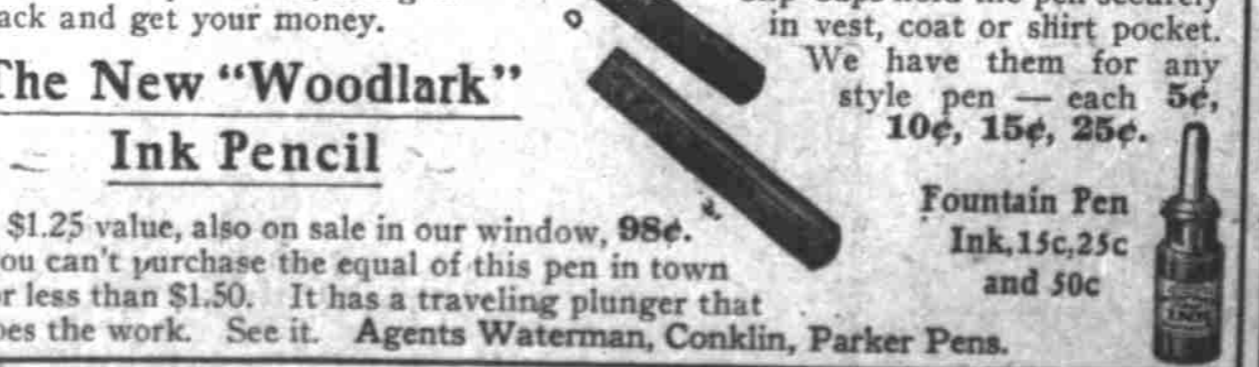
