Death of Mrs. Herman Metzger—The death of Mrs. Herman Metzger came as a great shock this morning to her large circle of friends in Portland. Mrs. Metzger has not been strong for some time, but there had been no previous sickness, till she was taken acutely ill last night with some bronchial trouble. She died this morning at 9:45, with her husband and a few other relatives at her bedside. She was 51 years old, was very well known and a general favorite in her social set. She was a Jewish entertainer and held friends by her kindness and generosity. She is survived by her brother, Adolph Metzger, who lives in Portland, her husband, Herman Metzger, and her son, Henry Metzger. She was a niece of the late S. Lipman, who died a few months ago. Mrs. Metzger was born in Germany, but came to Portland in her early youth and has lived here ever since.

The search for the missing man now extends from ocean to ocean. He is described as being 38 years old, weighs 135, is dark complexion, and has dark mustache. When he left Omaha Bowman had considerable money and jewelry on his person. He is a thirty-second degree Mason.
