Charging that her husband murdered his own daughter, and that she agreed to take the blame for the reason that the court would be more lenient with a woman, Mrs. Rae Krause, who is serving a life sentence for the murder of Crystal Krause, her stepchild, filed an answer and a cross-complaint to her husband's suit for divorce today.

According to the document, she agreed with Krause to take the blame for the murder on his promise to use his wealth and influence to secure her pardon from the penitentiary.

MUTINY ABOARD COAST STEAMER

Greeks Attempt to Take Ve- sel and Smuggle Chinese Aboard, Says Captain.

New Orleans, Oct. 7.—A mutiny en-
gling in a battle aboard the coast-
steamer St. John, in which six men were
wounded, was reported to the custom-
house here today by Captain Spi-
Casovich. According to the captain
four Greeks attempted to take posses-
sion of the vessel and smuggle Chinese
aboard.

**POOR WOMAN GIVEN
PERMISSION TO PRESS
SUIT FREE OF COSTS**

**OREGON TRUNK
TO KLAMATH?**

Because she is poor and has made showing that she was convinced of suit. Mrs. Louetta Jackson will be permitted to press her suit for damages against the Oregon Electric Railway Co. through the circuit court, without paying up the costs of an action on the same complaint in Clackamas county, where she was defeated by a non-suit.

This was the decision of Judge Morrow, who said that it was an interesting point of law. The court held that it is within the discretion of the court to allow a poor plaintiff to sue on the same two causes of action to go on without paying the costs of a former action, and he refused to make the rule in this case because he was satisfied by the plaintiffs' statement that their action is not governed by the desire to annoy and harass the corporation.

Mrs. Jackson first sued for damages against the corporation for the same two causes of action. She asked for \$500 because she was twice put off by the corporation in the past. She had come to pick hops and had been refused with a ticket from Portland to Clackamas, which she could not cash. After being once put off, a car, as the ticket was good. She took the car and was put off again. The first election was in Clackamas county and the second in Clackamas.

When she came to trial before Judge Campbell, the Clackamas district judge, her attorney dismissed one cause of action and the court allowed the defendant a non-suit on the Clackamas suit. A warrant was given against her for costs, but she did not appear and nothing could be obtained. She then brought her second suit on the same two causes of action in Clackamas county and the Oregon Electric action was dismissed. The suit was stayed until the costs in Clackamas were paid. Judge Morrow declines to do so, and the case is expected to be in due course.

Fourteen months or some time ago, she took the same case to the following court to proceed without payment of costs and she was again refused. She made another statement of the same facts, though under no oath, and the court, though under no oath, not long ago took the same case to the circuit court to permit a plaintiff to sue on the same two causes of action, which had twice been refused in Clackamas county. This time the court was once in the federal court to bring a fourth case on the same subject without paying up the costs of the first action.

Indications Point Strongly That Direction—Beef Contract Awarded.
