

Two Candidates Seek Presidential Office at White Ribboners Convention.

Hood River, Or., Oct. 7.—The sessions of the state convention of the White Ribboners, which opened this morning, are being held at the county superintendent's office. It is said that more counties are represented at this convention than at any similar gathering. The county reports indicate a large growth in the temperance work during the year. The University Park union shows the largest increase of any local union, having enrolled 63 new members. The county reports an increase of 23; Yamhill county, 60; Multnomah county, 67; Douglas county, 70. These increases place these counties on the roll of honor. Mrs. Emma E. Cyrus of Astoria spoke on the work of the union among the foreigners. Mrs. Jennie Hosmer of Irving spoke on the Sunday schools. Mrs. Pearl L. Webber of Canby spoke on the labor question. The evening session opened with devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. N. B. Inman. The feature of the evening was the address by Mrs. L. L. Shepard, state president of the Utah W. C. T. U. "The Prohibition Problem."

Sargent, owner of the Montague farm. The apples will be packed in excelsior and the boxes covered with a canvas jacket. The fruit will leave Hood River in a few days.

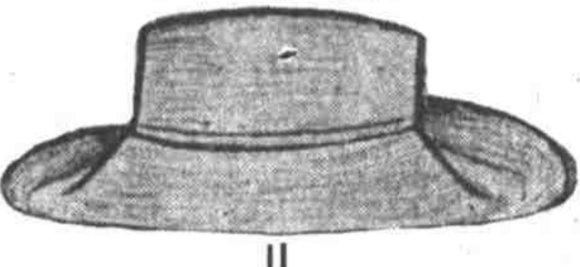
