

REAL ESTATE AGENT SUES FOR DISCOVERERS OF "FORSKEN" RETURN OF OPTION MONEY.

Three Here to Buy Machinery.

Mrs. Dorothy Dent Sues Barney Butler for \$15 Alleged to Be Due and Payable for Board and Entertainment.

After entertaining her alleged "soulmate," Barney Butler, and accepting his attentions as a guest, Dorothy Dent, 234 Mill street, now wants pay for food, attentions and necessities furnished him upon such visits to her home. Butler is a barber in the Portland hotel, and asserts in his answer filed today in the court of Justice of the Peace Olson that the entertainment justifies the debt of \$15.

Dorothy Dent was recently divorced and has been furnished home at the Mill street number. Through the Pacific States Adjustment company, she started suit two weeks ago to recover what she claims was expended in entertaining Butler.

In his answer he makes the following reply:

"That at all times mentioned in the complaint the defendant was very fond of and infatuated with the said Dorothy Dent, and the said Dorothy Dent was very fond of and infatuated with said Barney Butler, and during all of said time parties were what might be termed, and are commonly known as 'soulmates,' and that defendant herein was often invited to the house of home of said Dorothy Dent as her guest, and that any attentions which were shown him or food or necessities which were furnished him by said Dorothy Dent were furnished during the time or times defendant visited said Dorothy Dent as her invited guest, and such attentions were shown, and food and necessities furnished in the entertainment of the defendant herein by his hostess, Dorothy Dent, and without other charge or costs to the defendant who was present as such guest."

Butler, she declared in her original complaint, had visited her at her home a number of times. Soon, however, Butler's place in the attentions of the woman were supplanted by W. A. Parker, who, it developed, had given the woman several pieces of jewelry, among them a valuable diamond ring. Butler previously loaned the woman \$50, and to satisfy his claim, he states, she gave him a promissory note for that amount, and that a bill of sale for her household goods was made out to Parker. Butler secured an execution on the goods, which were levied upon, and the matter finally adjusted. The affair was thought to have been settled, when the suit was started by Dorothy Dent against Butler for \$15. He asks that the suit be dismissed.

Five hundred dollars posted by H. L. Suydam as an option on about 65 acres of land near the Linnton road is the subject of a suit on trial today before Judge Morrow in the circuit court. Suydam alleges that Labbe misrepresented the land, telling him it was close to the road and gave a fine view of the Linnton road. Labbe also represented the land and also represented Mr. and Mrs. Hochapfel, the chief owners of the property. Suydam was to pay for the land, but he thought he was buying over a mile nearer the Linnton road than the Labbe-Hochapfel tract. The land is reached by the Saitama road, which leaves Linnton road near the Cliff Inn.

MANY WILLING TO COOPERATE

Miss Strong Finds Deep Interest in Social Movement.

Interest in the "Know Your City" movement just inaugurated in Portland is growing rapidly. Miss Anna Louise Strong, who organized the similar plan in Seattle last May and who has been secured to assist in the work here, has been asked to address the Women's Auxiliary of St. David's and the Council of the Young Women's Christian Association this afternoon. The Young Women's Christian Association is also much interested and has requested Miss Strong to meet a special board meeting. Tonight Miss Strong will meet the Christian Union of the Methodist church, and tomorrow she will address the Women's club and the Women's Auxiliary of Trinity church. Other appointments have already been made for next week. The program is rapidly taking form, said Miss Strong, "although there are so many activities in Portland that it is impossible to do them even remotely in two weeks. The greatest task is that of an almost unbelievable condensation. It seems a crime for justice to compress the jangle, the confusion, the problem of vagrancy and the social evil into one short session, but it has to be done. The people of Portland have no idea of the vast extent of their city's activities and problems."

"I am meeting with a most gratifying response in Portland. I think the movement will be even more successful than it was in Seattle, for we were quite inexperienced then, and did not have the cooperation of as many organizations when we began. The 'Know Your City' idea is being commended upon as far east as Boston and Philadelphia."

"I want to help, not hinder, the officials," said Miss Strong. "We want to give the city engineer a chance to explain the difficulties he meets with in the morning and the city planner, and to tell us what ordinances or boards could overcome that difficulty. We want to give the police board a chance to outline its plans, so that we may know what we have and what we may look forward to. Knowledge will save much misunderstanding, and if there should be any matters that cannot bear the light, why, we want to know about them. But our chief object is not to muck raking."

\$20,000 CASH AUCTION SALE NEAR COLFAX

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Colfax, Wash., Oct. 7.—One of the largest sales of livestock and farm implements ever reported in the northwest was held last Saturday at the Dorman Bros. & Zaring farm near La Crosse, at which 75 head of horses and 45 head of mules, number of cattle and a large quantity of farm implements, aggregating in all \$20,000, were disposed of. The horses averaged \$250, one team of geldings bringing \$450. The mules averaged over \$200, one 4-year-old gelding bringing \$350, and a pair of mules for \$250. The farm implements went at proportionately high figures. The sale was attended by over 500 farmers and stockmen from nearly every county in eastern Washington, and all of the purchasers paid cash, only \$150.00 being retained by the Dorman Bros. as a truly remarkable indication of the prosperity of the country.

JURY EXONERATES STREETCAR CREW

H. E. Hawkins was denied any damages for injuries sustained in a collision between chemical engine No. 1 and a streetcar by a jury in the circuit court last evening. The jury found that the accident was the result of carelessness of the streetcar crew. The case followed the presentation of a motion picture by W. H. Green, driver of the chemical, who also lost a suit for damages. Green asked for \$100 and Hawkins \$125.

How the "Forsaken Three" discovered the lost gold mine of Mount Baker, a property containing untold wealth of free-milling ore that is producing wealth for them at the rate of \$500 a ton, was described by R. J. Snyder and A. F. Schnicke, two of the "Three" when they came to Portland yesterday. This is the mine first discovered by Amos White, a prospector, 17 years ago. Unable at the time to develop the mine he covered as best he could the traces of the mine, and went back to civilization for aid. The next spring he tried to get back with Judge Burkhardt of White Salmon, but forest fires that broke the party in the fall they tried again, but this time it was the snow and blizzard which prevented progress. Snyder and Schnicke, and Snyder of Big Kicketan joined with White in an effort to return to the rich deposit of gold. For a last time the fates intervened. White was taken with mortal illness. But before he died he drew up a rude diagram showing the mine's location and means of approach. Using the diagram Snyder searched faithfully for the mine 12 long years, but never found it, and the searcher gradually grew convinced that superhuman agencies were forbidding its discovery.

We were left on August 14 to guard the property of a party in the morning, said Schnicke, taking up the story of his experience. Then we were called out by the forest rangers to help fight fire in the timber. For 30 days we fought the flames, and our work brought us to a ledge of peculiar formation which we followed until we found Amos White's mine, with the marks of his work all about it and some rusty bits of tools near.

"We had been helped in our discovery by Bruce Locke, one of the men who had been fighting the fire. He shares with us the profits of our find."

"No, we didn't meet any particular hardships finding the mine. It took a week to furnish and fix our camp, then three days climbing to get to the mine itself. It is comparatively easy of access, and we will have no difficulty in removing the gold."

How the deposit seems so rich that we will install mills and other machinery so that we can proceed on a large scale. That is one of our reasons for coming to Portland at this time. A Peterson lives at 742 Savier street in Portland, Schnicke and Locke are at home near Trout Lake.

NOT WILLING TO GIVE TESTIMONY

Vada Griffin Called in Trial of William Parker.

William Parker, one of six youths indicted on a statutory charge, with Vada Griffin as the prosecuting witness, was placed on trial before a jury in Judge Gantenbein's department of the circuit court this morning. This is the case in which the story of a Salome dance at Arleta figured, but the testimony involving Parker was narrated by the girl, does not include the dance.

When placed on the stand to testify the Griffin girl was found to be an unwilling witness. She left questions unanswered until Deputy District Attorney Page had asked them many times, and then she spoke in such low tones that members of the jury could not hear all she said. Finally Judge Gantenbein cleared the courtroom and took the land in the examination of the girl, who was asked to answer the questions that were asked.

Max G. Cohen, conducting the defense, is proceeding on the theory that Parker is innocent of wrongdoing, and says Parker does not even know the girl, who was arrested last June, and who testified before the jury that she had been with Parker at the Arleta salome dance.

One of the accused has pleaded guilty and is on bail, with their cases not finally disposed of. It is expected that the young ladies will be allowed their freedom on parole. Three of the young men are church members and their pastor has been asked to intercede for them. Parker and one other of the men accused chose to stand trial.

One of the members of the jury trying the case is Rev. C. T. McPherson, pastor of the Epworth Methodist Episcopal church, both sides being willing to accept his judgment. The testimony of the girl occupied the morning session of court.

MAY BE LYNCHED FOR ASSAULT ON GIRL

SEATTLE BITTER AT NEWSPAPERS FOR LABORERS

Times Refers Editorially to Oregonian and Telegram.

Not Only to Hold Laborers' Coin But to Be Run by and for Labor.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Seattle, Oct. 7.—Much bitterness has been stirred up here recently by the statements published in the Portland Oregonian and its evening edition, the Telegram, concerning the proposed A.-Y.-P. exposition, compared with that of the Lewis and Clark exposition.

Several days ago the Times of this city published some statistics on the attendance of the exposition. The publication was followed by articles in the Oregonian and Telegram attacking the correctness of these figures, it being contended that the admissions had been padded in order to show a greater attendance than the facts warranted.

At the same time the Oregonian and Telegram printed the figures of the Lewis and Clark exposition's admissions, both stating that the paid admissions were 110,729. In reality, they were 1,588,858.

It is a fact that the paid admissions of the A.-Y.-P. exposition will practically double the attendance of the Lewis and Clark exposition, which total exceeds that of Portland's exposition by approximately 600,000.

Seattle is a city of the past four years has added thousands of people to the population of the northwestern section of the state, and has grown to vast proportions during the past few years. All credit is given to the advertising influence of the Lewis and Clark exposition for these results, but at the same time much soreness has been caused by the Oregonian and Telegram. In commenting on the attitude of the Oregonian and Telegram the Seattle Times concludes an editorial with the following paragraph:

"The decent people of Portland don't put dynamite under these miscreants and blow them into the Willamette river, but they would like to see a sheet, conducted in such a manner, in any other city on the coast, as that which is issued by the Oregonian company, in the name of the Portland Telegram, would land its proprietor in prison, and made entries in a junk house, or into the hands of a receiver, within a week."

CASE WHICH LED TO KILLING OF FISHER

MUST PAY DAMAGES FOR STRIKING MAN

A verdict for \$350 damages was returned in favor of Floyd P. Brown against Andy Powell by a jury in Judge Morrow's department of the circuit court yesterday afternoon. This was because of a blow struck by Powell resulting from a quarrel over a woman, having previously been struck by Brown's brother.

Judge Morrow instructed the jury that \$150 should be awarded to the plaintiff to pay his doctor's bill, and as much more up to \$200 as the jury thought he was entitled to because of suffering or in the way of "smart money." This was because Powell admitted the assault and acknowledged having struck the plaintiff in the face. Powell had previously been fined \$50 in the circuit court for the assault on Brown, pleading guilty to a grand jury indictment. Brown's eyes were broken by Powell's fist, and this verdict helped Brown to gain a verdict. Powell is an inspector in the city water department.
