

WILL NOT TRAIL OF MRS. COLLINS BEGINS

Indications Are That East Twenty-Eighth Street Bridge Will Not Be Accepted by City Executive Board.

It now seems probable that Mayor Simon's administration will uphold at least one important action of the regime of Dr. Lane. It is the report of W. L. Harrington, special engineer appointed to inspect the East Twenty-eighth street bridge, is adopted by the bridge committee of the executive board the rejection of that structure by Lane executive board will be ratified.

Although the meetings of the present board have been held in secret when the reinforced concrete viaduct were to be considered, it was learned today that Engineer Harrington had positively refused to recommend its acceptance in his official report and that he reiterated his opinions in a stormy interview with the representatives of the Northwest Bridge Works in the presence of the committee at a secret meeting some days ago.

DRIVEN AWAY BY MOTHER-IN-LAW

Scorned by his wife and mother-in-law, and smarting from an attack this morning by the latter, Samuel Richlan, a second-hand dealer of Tacoma, is returning to his home, leaving his three-month-old child in the care of his mother in Portland. Richlan claims the young mother deserted the child a few days ago and came to her home in this city.

The babe was left with another woman in Tacoma, and the father and mother returned to Portland in order to find Mrs. Richlan. He wanted to have her return to him, but upon meeting this morning she seized the child and told her husband to go. Richlan says they were married three months ago, and that he is not the father of the child. Mrs. Richlan says he is. To show his love for the young woman, Richlan offered to take her and the child back to Tacoma and make them a good home. Detective Hawley took Richlan, the woman who had been caring for the baby, and the child to 1144 Ivy street, this morning. When the mother-in-law saw Richlan she grasped his throat, and the intervention of the officers only saved him from a rough assault. She defied entrance to her home of Richlan, whom she charged as wronging her daughter.

COUNTY CLERK IS BACK FROM TRIAL

County Clerk Fields returned this morning from Spokane where he was called as a witness to produce records of the circuit court showing convictions of E. B. Howard, alias Henderson, alias McArdie, alias Quinn, alias Spencer, on trial in Spokane for burglary. PROSECUTION SAYS PENITENTIARY OR ASYLUM FOR WOMAN.

Mrs. Kate Collins when brought into court this afternoon appeared much improved. She was dressed in black and veiled as at her former appearances in court. She is now anxious to proceed with the trial and she is not insane now, but that her mind was so far as the shooting of her husband is concerned. Filing of the jury box began at 2 o'clock. Mrs. Collins was brought into the court room by Deputy Sheriff Hirt.

A war of expert testimony is in prospect in the case of Mrs. Kate M. Collins called for trial in the circuit court this afternoon on the charge of murdering her husband, Dr. Roy A. Milos. Collins, it is said, has been officially declared sane by physicians appointed by the county court, her attorneys have mustered a strong force of experts willing to testify that her mind is deranged.

Russell E. Sewall, who, with R. R. Gurnham, is the expert called to testify this morning that he believed Mrs. Collins would be able to go through the trial without a breakdown, despite her nervous condition. He said he does not wish any delay unless it becomes absolutely necessary. He denied a report that the defense has asked for a cot to be placed in the courtroom on which Mrs. Collins may recline during the trial, but said it might be desirable to have a cot in any room for emergency, if she collapses.

GAS BILLS MAY BECOME LIGHTER

TAX ROLLS WILL BE OPENED NEXT WEEK

City and County Assessor Sigler announced today that the tax rolls would be open for the inspection of the public every day next week, beginning Monday. A large force of assistants will be on hand to assist property owners in looking up their assessments and a cordial invitation is extended by the assessor to every taxpayer who cares to visit the office in the city hall. This week after next the books will be transferred to county courthouses, where they will be used for reference by the board of equalization. The public will thus have two whole weeks in which to inspect the records and file complaints.

SENATOR BOURNE SUGGESTS THAT PORTLAND ENGAGE EXPERT TO MAP OUT FOUNDATION FOR LARGE CITY WHICH WILL FOLLOW.

To take time by the forelock and lay out a broad and firm foundation for the future growth of the city is the scheme of Senator Bourne. In following out this plan he would engage H. B. Burnham of Chicago, to make a study of Portland conditions and map out a general scheme of street improvement, boulevard construction, and improvement generally, which would include no congestion or inconvenience when the city has grown to the dignity of a million inhabitants or more.

Impressed With Fair.

"During a recent visit to Seattle I was greatly impressed with the beauty and completeness of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition and the growth of the city during the past three years," said Senator Bourne this morning. "Quite naturally, my mind turned to the comparison between Seattle and Portland. For years I have firmly believed that in the course of the next few decades Portland is certain to be the leading city of the Pacific coast, for the reason that she enjoys the distinction and advantage of having over 200,000 people in the world. The development of this territory must inevitably result in the building up of a city far greater in magnitude and population than, in my opinion, the most sanguine mind can now realize.

CONGESTION OF TRAFFIC.

"With a population of 500,000, which I believe we shall have before five years more elapse, traffic must become a serious problem. The congestion of the city's business seriously affected. With a population of 2,500,000, which I believe we shall have in the next 50 years, business must seek new centers and new main arteries and laterals, or the present streets must be greatly widened and the city virtually laid out on an entirely different plan.

GET EXPERT ADVICE.

"I therefore take great pleasure in calling this thought to the attention of my fellow citizens in the conviction that the same good sense and sentiment will rapidly crystallize, and the city fathers will make provision for the employment of some man like H. B. Burnham of Chicago, who during the past three years, has been identified with and has cooperated with at least a dozen of the states in the process of studying out and preparing plans for that city so that the estimated expenditure of hundreds of millions of dollars in improvements during the next 50 years will be so applied as to make Chicago one of the best arranged and most beautiful cities in the world.
