

NOT GUILTY TO BE MEYERS' PLEA TO KILL ALEXANDRA

Indictment Charges Murder Portuguese Bishop Visiting in First Degree—Has Three Attorneys.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Oct. 12.—George Meyers appeared in court this morning at 9 o'clock and listened to the reading of the indictment charging him with murder in the first degree for killing Portuguese Bishop Tom Eckart returned by the grand jury last Saturday. While the district attorney McNary read the indictment, which contained a short account of the crime, Meyers stood watching him with apparent little concern. S. T. Richardson, attorney for George Meyers, is leading counsel for the prisoner. He will be assisted by Judge P. H. D'Arcy and Attorney John A. Carson, all attorneys of this city.
After the arraignment, Counsel Richardson informed the court that he would take the day allowed to plead. Meyers will plead not guilty to the charge of first degree murder tomorrow morning at the same time of the day as that in which he was arraigned today. It is thought Meyers' attorneys will ask to have the trial postponed until the next term of court.
The only member of the Meyers family who was in the court room at the time of the arraignment was Milton Meyers, one of the brothers of the firm of H. W. and M. L. Meyers, which succeeded Joseph Meyers & Sons, upon the marriage of Joseph Meyers to Mrs. Durette last year. The sons and the father broke their business relationship at that time, and since then Joseph Meyers has lived in Portland away from the sons. The Meyers establishment is the largest department store in Salem.

LIPTON SUBBED BY YACHT CLUBS

Blackballed by Two Organizations—British Snobs Resent His Rise.

London, Oct. 12.—A serious setback in the social career of Sir Thomas Lipton has just occurred. His application for membership in the Royal Thames Yacht club was rejected.
He was blackballed by the Royal Yacht Squadron club, too, though King Edward personally put up Lipton's name for election. The Royal Yacht Squadron club is the most exclusive in the world, and so particular are its members concerning the men with whom they associate that dozens of persons of unquestioned social position have been "pilled." It has happened so often that it is considered no longer even a matter of comment.
But to be blackballed by the Royal Yacht Squadron club and the Royal Thames Yacht club are two very different things. The Royal Thames Yacht club is distinctly second rate, and the rejection of Lipton's application there is considered a grave snub.
Sir Thomas Lipton is not, in fact, popular with the British aristocracy. The truth is they resent his rise. As long as he remained merely a millionaire there was no objection to him, but when a title was conferred upon him the "upper circles" immediately jumped to the conclusion that Sir Thomas was bent on a social climb and was trying to force himself into the coterie of the socially elect. Then he began to be disliked as an "upstart," and his position has been a difficult one ever since.

SELLS GOLD TEETH FOR RAILWAY FARE

Kansas City, Oct. 12.—Dr. George Severs, a young dentist of New York City, will arrive in Denver today, where it is probable he will have one gold bridge and two gold crowned teeth removed for the purpose of raising money to pay for his passage to San Francisco, where his mother lies at the point of death. He arrived here yesterday afternoon and departed last night for Denver, which is as far as his ticket carries him.
He had just left a sick bed in New York when he was informed that his mother was ill. He was without money, so he sold all his tools and three gold crowned teeth, which he had pulled for the actual gold in them.
With the funds thus raised Severs purchased a ticket as far as Denver. There the remaining gold crowned teeth will be removed, unless he succeeds in getting money from a friend whom he expects to meet there.

WOMAN LOST FROM STEAMER PRESIDENT

Seattle, Oct. 12.—R. O. Mournain of Bethany, Cal., who is in Seattle, reports that Miss Malvina Mournain, his main, 37 years of age, leaped or fell from the steamship President, from San Francisco, somewhere between the entrance of the straits and Seattle yesterday. Mournain and his sister were on their way to visit an aunt who resides here. When off the Umatilla lights, Mournain missed his sister and after searching the vessel opened her stateroom door. On the floor were several letters which she had just finished writing to friends at Bethany, but in none of these was there anything to indicate that she contemplated suicide.
No one aboard the steamer saw Miss Mournain on deck near the time she is supposed to have disappeared, and the manner in which she went to her death is a mystery.

DEJECTED MAN CUTS THROAT ON STREET

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—The police are investigating the incidents surrounding the unexplained death of a man found lying last night at the corner of Fifth and Folsom streets with his throat cut. From letters found in his pockets he has been identified as John Fredericks, whose mother lives at Raton, N. M.
The case is baffling, and it has not been decided whether Fredericks is the victim of a murderer or is dead by his own hand.
Following the discovery of the body the authorities searched the vicinity for a weapon which could inflict the terrible wounds about the man's throat, but without success. The letters indicate strongly that he committed suicide, after trying in vain to raise some money.
The man was dressed as a workingman.

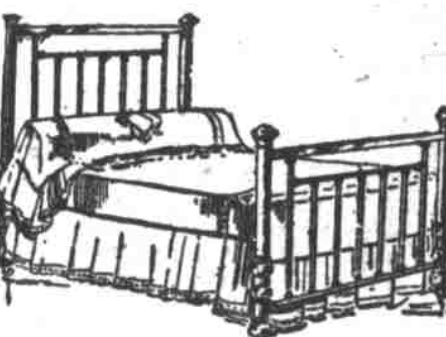

DEAD ENGINE CAUSES WRECK

Frank Burke, Three Colored Men, Six Fine Racers, Killed in Texas.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Greenville, Texas, Oct. 12.—A fatal wreck occurred north of Greenville at 4 o'clock this morning when two Missouri, Kansas & Texas freight trains collided head on, killing Frank Burke of Shreveport, La., and three negroes.
The trains were southbound and running a few minutes apart, when the engine of the first train died on account of having no water. The engine of the rear train plowed into the caboose of the first train and tore five cars to splinters.
Burke and the negroes were killed instantly.
Burke was en route from Sedalia, Mo., to the Dallas fair with a car of horses, which belonged to Walter of Shreveport, La. Three of the horses were killed and three others fatally injured. The horses killed and injured were worth several thousand dollars each. One of the horses killed was a Furtado.
A. P. Modlin, proprietor of the Modlin poultry yard at Mattoon, Ill., was seriously injured. He was caught in the debris and had to be released from heavy timbers that held him pinned under the wreck. He was en route to the Dallas fair with a car of fine chickens, several dollars worth of which were killed and injured.
A negro had his leg broken and was perhaps fatally injured.

BEND SHIPS DRY FARMING EXHIBIT

Bend, Or., Oct. 12.—Yesterday the Bend board of trade shipped an exhibit of dry farming products to Billings, Mont., where the dry farming congress meets the last week of October. Although the country in the vicinity of Bend is noted chiefly for its irrigation products, the samples sent for competition at the Billings exhibit depend entirely for their moisture upon the natural rainfall.
The majority of the specimens were secured from the Powell Butte country, directly east of Bend, a section where irrigationless farming is proving a wonderful success. A fact of particular interest in connection with the exhibit is that the 300,000 or 400,000 acres southeast of Bend, now being "settled up" under the enlarged homestead law, are in many respects the exact counter-part of the lands from which the samples are taken for the exhibit.
The exhibit was taken for officials of the Great Northern railroad, at the instance of Louis Hill, president of the Great Northern.
