WIFE MAY GO TO CHURCH IF HUSBAND TARRIES AT TAVERNS

No man who frequents saloons has the right to dictate or attempt to regulate his wife's attendance at church.

This is the opinion of Municipal Court Judge Bennett given out this morning, and was occasioned by the case of James Whelan, 267 Arthur street, who was charged with disorderly conduct in abusing his wife.

Whelan admitted breaking up the dishes, upsetting the table and abusing his wife, who made the complaint. "Why did you set that way?" asked Judge Bennett.

"Well, judge, my wife has a habit of going to church," he said.

"Isn't that all right?" queried the court.

"I don't object so much if she goes once in a while, but she has no business going every night," explained Whelan. "She has been going every night for the past few weeks, and stays until 10 and 11 o'clock, and is so sleepy next morning she doesn't want to get up and get my own breakfast because she was to church so late the night before."

Whelan admitted that he frequently went to the saloons, and some times stayed as late as 11 o'clock.

"Any man who frequents saloons, and especially a man who has been doing," said Judge Bennett to Whelan, "has no business complaining about his wife going to church. She is doing a more laudable thing of the two, and is entitled to go to church whenever she wishes."

"Now, if you are brought in here again on any disturbance you cause at home, I'll send you to the rock pile for 30 days," said the court. This sentence was imposed, but suspended during good behavior. Whelan is about 50 years old.

4 FIREMEN BURNED IN FIRE AT COLFAX

Colfax, Wash., Oct. 12.—Fire originating in a laundry, and spreading to the Colfax building on Main street, occupied by the Grand Union Tea company, and the Colfax Dye Works, and was with difficulty prevented from spreading to the postoffice building and Daily's livery stable. The building was insured for \$750 and the loss is about \$300. The tea company was insured for \$1000, loss \$500. Four firemen—Virgil Laird, Carl Baker, Lewis Irwin and John Tinner of hose company No. 2—were badly burned about the hands and face by an exploding can of gasoline. Laird's eyes may be seriously injured.
