Many Prominent Citizens Take Stand in Order to Throw Light on Case of Mrs. Kate Collins, on Trial for Murder. Thirteen witnesses for the defense, many of them from the most prominent families in the city, had testified to their belief in the insanity of Mrs. Kate M. Collins when Judge Gatens adjourned his department of the circuit court for the noon recess today.

Three or four more witnesses to the same effect will be called this afternoon, when the case for the defense will close. The question of the defendant's responsibility for the death of her husband, Dr. Roy A. M. Collins, whom she is charged with killing with a revolver on July 24, will likely go to the jury tomorrow afternoon.

REPORTS REGARDING LOSS OF LIFE AT KEY WEST CONTRADICTORY (United Press Leased Wire.) New Orleans, Oct. 13.—According to a wireless message from Key West today at least 1000 men employed on the Florida East Coast railroad were drowned in the storm which wrecked the Key West. Many of those reported to have perished were living in houseboats made fast to the trawler work or anchored in the shallows surrounding the islands.

CRANE'S FRIENDS SAY RECALL DUE TO PLOT (United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Oct. 13.—Indignant at the action of Secretary of State Knox in demanding the resignation of Charles E. Crane as minister to China, friends of Crane are expressing the belief that it was due to a political plot. They are also pointing out that Crane's contribution of \$10,000 to the Russian relief fund was with Japan may have had some bearing on the case, as well as his declaration that Russia was forced into war by a treacherous enemy.

WOMEN TAKE INTEREST IN CRUSADE Housewives Bring Samples of Milk to State Bacteriologist for Test—Dairyman, Wishing to Know What He Sells, Submits Sample. (United Press Leased Wire.) Portland, Oct. 13.—The knowledge of whether the line is drawn between pure and impure food know that it is highly dangerous to the health, even of an adult, to drink milk containing such a great quantity of impurity as is shown by the first sample in the case of the second sample it is evident that a little more care in the handling of the milk to prevent its exposure to any contaminating influence would be sufficient to reduce to the hundred-thousand germ maximum which the government designates as good milk.

HURRICANE VICTIMS NEED INSTANT AID (United Press Leased Wire.) New Orleans, Oct. 13.—An appeal for aid for the citizens of Key West was issued today by Mayor Eganly. He said that practically every home in the city had been either demolished or greatly damaged by the hurricane and those who still had their homes were scarcely able to care for their families. Mayor said: Work is suspended and the chance of earning a livelihood for these dependents is being lost by getting on the factories which are wrecked and business is at a standstill.

COOK CHARGES SHARP PRACTICE ANSWERS ATTACK WITH MUCH VIGOR

(United Press Leased Wire.) Cleveland, Oct. 13.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the Brooklyn explorer, today made a hot retort to Commander Robert E. Peary's published charges to the effect that Dr. Cook did not reach the North Pole.

PEARS STATEMENT (United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Oct. 13.—The Peary club has issued what is purported to be a statement from Peary stating that he met the two Eskimos who were with Cook on this trip, and that they laughed at Cook's claims. Peary and his shipmates issued an elaborate statement concerning the Eskimos. The truth in the statement will not be known until the natives arrive in America and can be questioned by reliable authorities.

These I am subjecting to the bacteriological test immediately upon their arrival. I have just completed the test of two samples, in addition to those reported a few days ago. The first was furnished by Mrs. Trumbull, 563 1/2 Gilsen street, the milk coming from the Curry Sanitary Milk & Cream company. It contains the astounding number of 1,300,000 bacteria per germ to the cubic centimeter or to every 15.6 drops.
