

EASY MONEY FOR SOME ONE

Advertising Scheme Works
Very Well, Says Man-
ager.

Intelligent ladies with \$200 in cash can have lucrative positions either in Seattle or San Francisco, they are given their choice, as the head of a branch advertising house. They ought to make somewhere between \$150 and \$200 a month. All they have to do is to show that they have an interest in the work and its welfare at heart by depositing \$200 in cash with head office.

This opportunity is offered ladies by H. Patterson, of the P. H. Patterson Advertising company, room 302 Commercial block. Those who are inexperienced need not hesitate to apply on that account. Mr. Patterson is not an experienced person in advertising work. He thinks that ladies with brains and business ability who do not know anything about the advertising business are more ready to be preferred because they follow his way of doing business and not their own.

Mr. Patterson says he is having some difficulty in getting ladies to take up his offer in spite of its attractiveness from a financial and business standpoint. He has been advertising in the "Female Help Wanted" column for more than a week, and has received more than a dozen replies. He has called, believing himself to be intelligent and possessed of brains and business ability, but they have not agreed to deposit with him in money, although his contract which he offers them, expressly states that he will pay the \$200 back at the end of a year (provided they have been "honest and industrious and all that sort of thing") or, if they give 30 days' notice, they can have the \$200 cash back at the expiration of 30 days, if they actually need the money.

It is not Mr. Patterson's way of doing business to accept either surety bonds or money placed in the bank in escrow. He says that better than he has taught him that it is not the way to do business—at least that it is not his way. He does not like surety bonds because that places a third party as an arbiter between himself and his assistant managers, he says, and he does not like that way of doing business.

He also objects to having the \$200 deposit called a bond. He says that he will give the lady with \$200 a personal promissory note for the amount. It is not a bond, but instead is an interest in his business for which he pays the lady with intelligence in money, 5 per cent annually, a salary of \$2 a day, 5 per cent of all the cash that she handles in her office and 10 per cent of all the new advertising business that she gets for him.

The business, according to Patterson, is a flourishing one. He took in hundreds of dollars last month from both Seattle and San Francisco without any agencies at all. His office is small but busy. Besides, Mr. Patterson, who is a man of about 40 with dark hair and eyes, smooth shaven and dressed in a suit, is a traveling auditor, and Mrs. Heppy, large and blonde, also traveling auditor. These taking charge of his out of town business. Mr. Patterson says he has one branch office, conducted by a Mr. Clarke, at Salem, who is paid a regular commission. Besides his office, which is a room in the rear of the office of a lawyer at 514 Commercial, he has opened two other offices in Portland—one of them just recently, but declined to say where they were.

This point is certain, however—that because some women are too afraid to place \$200 in the company, they are losing the chance of their lives to get a good paying position. Not only are they offered the position, but Mrs. Heppy, the traveling auditor, will purchase their tickets for them and take them personally, either by rail to San Francisco or by steamer to San Francisco and see that they are well started on their new duties.

St. Johns Liquor License
Committee Has Many
Applications.

The license committee of the St. Johns council is having a hard time to decide just how many saloon licenses to issue and to whom. The recent decision in the case of Sam Cochran by the supreme court gives him the right to run a saloon under the license granted him last spring by the council, although upon the advice and opinion of City Attorney H. E. Collier, who has been sustained in his opinion by the court decision. This license has about 10 months yet to run.

Applications are before the committee for licenses from Sam Cochran for a second saloon to be located in the St. Johns hotel building, from Kirohr for the room used as a dining room for the Central hotel, from T. H. Glover for a room in the Holbrook block, from August Jeansson for the premises at 209 West Burlington street, and from E. O. Magoon for license, no location being given.

The ordinance under which the license will be granted limits the number to one for each 1000 population, and the room for only four saloons at most and some of the applicants are deemed from the start.

The St. Johns license committee is investigating closely all the applicants. It is known that it does not favor granting a license to a third party as an arbiter between himself and his assistant managers, he says, and he does not like that way of doing business.

**MOB ATTACKS
RESCUED MEN**

Sentiment of Common Humanity Submerged in Hatred of "Scabs."

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 14.—Striking seamen are indignantly denying that they are in any way responsible for the attack made last night by a mob of scabs upon 12 survivors of the steamer George Stone, which was wrecked off Pease Point, Lake Erie.

Six men were drowned in the wreck of the George Stone, and 12 others were rescued. According to the police, the survivors had hardly set foot upon land when they were met by a howling mob, who called them "scabs."

John Dietrich, 18 years of age, one of the survivors, it is alleged, was twice knocked into the river and nearly drowned before he was rescued the second time.

Dr. J. J. Kenwell of this city has been appointed county veterinarian by the county court at session Oct. 12. Dr. Kenwell's duties include the inspection of milk cows and all stock.

Anxious Mothers Listen
Eagerly to Talk by Dr.
Yenny.

The vital question before the Oregon State Congress of Mothers yesterday was "The Problem of Pure Milk," presented by Dr. R. Yenny, executive officer of the state board of health. Dr. Yenny outlined the reasons why milk should be pure, the conditions which make it impure, and then answered questions asked by many of the mothers present.

Dr. Yenny stated that next to mother's milk, ordinary milk was the best and most natural food for babies and that anything whatsoever that was done to sterilize or purify it affected its food value and took from it much of its digestive qualities. He said that cows are as susceptible to bad air and filthy surroundings as are human beings and that impure condition of our present milk supply is due largely to the filthy stables of the cows and the dirty condition of the men who do the milking and handle the milk.

"Can you tell us where we can secure pure milk?" asked one mother. "I can not," replied the doctor. "There is no place that I know of."

"What are we going to feed our babies on until we secure pure milk?" asked another.

"Sterilized milk is better than infected milk, but the condensed milks are perfectly safe," was the reply.

"How are we going to know when the milk is pure?"

"As soon as the dairies can be inspected and made to comply with the state laws a list of those which are in compliance with the law will be published and it will then be imperative for the housewives to get with us and reduce to take milk of those dairies which do not comply with the law."

After the opening remarks by Mrs. R. Yenny, the retiring president, Superintendent of Schools Frank Rigler spoke on "Public Playgrounds."

He spoke of the importance of free play on publicly owned ground, but declared that it was not the province of the school board to provide the grounds. He suggested a playground commission. This address was followed by a duet by Miss Mildred Jones and Frederick Goodwin.

Judge W. D. Fenton's subject was "Citizenship for Our Boys and Girls."

He spoke of the national citizenship to which every boy and girl is born, and then spoke of the things which make for good citizenship, good home surroundings, patriotic training and a lively interest in public affairs.

Judge E. C. Bromough addressed the session on "Juvenile Court Work."

He indorsed Judge Fenton's remarks and said the juvenile court was made necessary because such a large number of the homes were not well ordered, because there was lack of home restraint and lack of proper education of children along moral lines.

Miss Anna Louise Strong made an announcement of the opening of the Civic Institute in November and outlined its work. Mrs. R. L. Donald, the new president, was then called to the platform. She made a few remarks and the meeting was adjourned.

One week from today Judge Wolverton of the United States court will open the first session of the United States court ever held in Medford. **ESCAPED CONVICT MAY
GET WORSE SENTENCE**

San Francisco, Oct. 14.—After living as a respected citizen for six years following his escape from the Whittier reform school, Rafael Varsi, an Italian, has been arrested on a bench warrant and may go to San Quentin penitentiary for a crime committed seven years ago.

At that time Varsi was a kid of 17 years. His father had an altercation with a fellow Italian, Louis Granasco, during which he was thrown to the ground and his leg was broken. The boy purchased a revolver and started out to avenge the injury done his father. Meeting Granasco he fired five shots, but missed his mark.

He was arrested for assault to murder, and when convicted was sent to Whittier reformatory, because of his youth.

He escaped after six months and returned to San Francisco. He was aided by friends, he opened a small fruit store in the Mission district. His store was burned by the confederate army in 1906 but he soon afterwards reopened his place of business.

The old charge of assault to commit murder will now come before the court.

**TO BE TRIED FOR
LOOTING ESTATE**

And It Will Be No Defense
That De Lancy Has "Put
It Back."

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 14.—When Attorney John De Lancy comes to trial Monday charged with embezzling \$100,000 from the estate of George Hite Cook, his principal line of defense probably will be the fact that he has just refunded \$35,000 of the money to accounts with the public administrator.

De Lancy was indicted two months ago, when it was discovered that the states under the charge of the public administrator of Alameda were being pilaged by attaches of the office under the guise of fees and open forgeries.

De Lancy, it is alleged, was one of those engaged in gaining illegal riches, and he with others was in possession of the stolen money.

Notwithstanding that De Lancy has made restitution, the district attorney declared the case Monday ready as planned, and that the young attorney would be prosecuted as vigorously as if the money was still unpaid.

**CONBOY HELD FOR
MURDER OF LAGAN**

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Oct. 14.—Former Police Captain Michael Conboy is locked in the city prison, following the verdict of the coroner's jury yesterday that the veteran policeman with the murder of Bernard Lagan, a young man whom Conboy shot in July while in an alleged intoxicated condition.

The bullet struck the victim in the spine and he died from paralysis a week ago.

The jury cast four ballots and the only question that arose was whether to charge Conboy with manslaughter or murder.

A number of witnesses swore that Conboy did not fire his revolver until Lagan had threatened to attack him, but the defense of justifiable homicide was not considered by the jurors. Since the coroner's jury was supposed to have removed preparatory to assaulting the policeman was perforated with the bullet which ended his life.

Conboy refused to discuss the verdict. It is probable that his attorney will plead justification for trial, as he did before the coroner's jury.
