NORWEGIANS HONOR DR. NAUR LARSEN

Members and friends of the Norwegian Lutheran church are much interested in the celebration held yesterday at Decorah, Iowa, in honor of Dr. Naur Larsen, who has been a professor at the head of the theological work of the denomination for 30 years today. Dr. Larsen is the dean of the Norwegian Lutheran Synod church of Luther college, Decorah, Iowa. He took charge of the work 30 years ago when he became the head of the Concordia Seminary at St. Louis. For several years he has been with Luther college but during all of the time has maintained charge of the head of the theological preparatory work of the Norwegian Lutheran denomination. Dr. Larsen was born August 19, 1822.

JAMES M. HAYS, OLD MAIL CLERK, DEAD

Port Townsend, Wash., Oct. 15.—After 35 years' continuous connection with the Pacific coast mail service, James M. Hays, past 70 years of age, died in his berth aboard the steamer Rosalie between Bellingham and this city last night. Hays' attachment to the postal service covered practically the entire existence of the railway mail service in this section. He was among the first clerks assigned to a car for handling mail when communication between Tacoma and Portland was established by the Northern Pacific railway in the early eighties. He was subsequently transferred to service on steamers plying between sound ports.

VEHICLE TAX STANDS TEST

Judge Bronaugh Decides in Favor of the City in Test Case.

Presiding Circuit Judge E. C. Bronaugh yesterday in a decision in the case of the city of Portland against H. J. Hanson, an expressman, upheld the validity of the new vehicle tax ordinance.

Discussing the point raised by Attorney McNary that it was not law to attempt to compel a man to do an act impossible for him to do, the court declared that the ordinance was valid.

The court cited several other decisions of the same character. Hanson is one of the 40 or more teamsters arrested some time ago by the police and with operating vehicles without licenses. Hanson was fined \$25, and appealed the case.

The cases of the other teamsters come up for trial in municipal court tomorrow.

JAPANESE BANK OF SACRAMENTO CLOSED

(United Press Leased Wire.) Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 15.—The Japanese Bank of Sacramento closed its doors at 5 o'clock this morning on orders from State Bank Examiner Alden Anderson, who came up from San Francisco last night.

Mr. Anderson had notified the bank several weeks ago to get its affairs into better shape and to make a showing in securities, but the bank failed to respond. Doubtful loans is the cause of the trouble.

SECTION MAN DIES; OVERDOSE LAUDANUM

R. & N. at Haron, is a corpse at the Haron undertaking parlor, as a result of taking an overdose of laudanum in an effort to stop a toothache. He died at the Haron section house yesterday afternoon at 1:30. A doctor was summoned from La Grande, but arrived too late.

LOSES LIFE BUT SAVES CHILDREN

F. F. Fletcher, Bookkeeper in Logging Camp, Caught by Runaway Car.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Oct. 15.—Overtaken while riding on a gasoline railway speeder with his two children, by a runaway flat car, F. F. Fletcher, bookkeeper at a logging camp of the St. Paul & Tacoma Lumber company near Orting, saved the lives of both his boys by sacrificing his own. Some laborers were pushing the car along the tracks of the logging road when it got away from them and started down a grade. Fletcher did not see the rapidly approaching freight car until it was within a few feet of him. He then hurled the two children clear of the track and attempted to leap just as the flat car struck the speeder. Fletcher was struck by the car and died three hours later of his injuries.
