Suit Over Diamond Ring.—N. Tochie, sued in Justice Olson's court for the balance of payment on a diamond ring purchased from the Friedlander jewelry store has answered by his attorney, H. C. King, that he did not sell the ring. That it is valued at \$100, which he is credited with paying \$45, when in reality it was sold at \$125, upon which he had paid all but \$80. A separate action brought by Friedlander, Tochie also declares too indefinite to consider. Tochie says he is ready to settle according to the terms of the original contract which he possesses.

Sues for Heavy Damages.—Augustus Walker, acquitted by a jury last month on a charge of stealing 20 hogs from John Rometsch, has turned the tables on his accuser by filing suit for \$20,000 for defamation of character and false arrest. The charge grew out of a business deal, the indictment charging larceny by embezzlement. It was alleged that he had failed to account for the hogs in accordance with an agreement made when he went on a place owned by Rometsch in Clackamas county. He alleges that the prosecution was malicious and without proper foundation.

Show Is Witness in Blakesley Trial.—City Detective Frank Snow left this afternoon for St. Helena, Or., where he has been subpoenaed to witness in the famous Blakesley blackmail trial. Detective Snow's testimony will probably be in regard to the robbery of McCarthy, alias McCarthy, now serving out a five year sentence in Sing Sing penitentiary, New York, whom the prosecution charges with having been the tool of Blakesley. Snow secured the conviction of McCarthy for the robbery of a Portland store several years ago.

Night School Opens.—Attendance at the opening of the night school yesterday evening in the Lincoln High school was 106. From this good early beginning Principal Henderson in charge of the school expects a very successful year in point of attendance in its history. Sues Mail Wagon Driver.—Suit for \$1,250 damages or injuries resulting from his being knocked down by a mail wagon has been begun in the circuit court by Jacob Kilbath against the driver, Schulerman. The accident took place at Third and Washington streets on April 2. He says the defendant drove recklessly and struck him while he was waiting to board a streetcar. His hip bone was broken, he alleges, and his chest and shoulder injured, permanently disabling him.

COURT HOLDS IT WAS FRAUD

A. W. Parshley to Refund Money to Mrs. Rose Cady.

Holding that A. W. Parshley committed a fraud on Mrs. Rose Cady in giving her a sublease on the Griffin rooming house when he had no right to do so, Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday afternoon rendered judgment for \$400 against Parshley. Besides ordering the repayment of the sum paid by Mrs. Cady, the court directed that \$400 in notes outstanding be cancelled. "I don't think Mr. Parshley intended to commit a fraud on Mrs. Cady," said the court, "but he had become deeply involved and he took the money from Mrs. Cady, hoping that all would come out straight. But under his lease from Mr. Griffin he could only put another person in possession who was a responsible party, and Mr. Griffin was to give his consent in writing when the responsible party was found. The time to have taken the lease to Griffin and to learn from him whether or not Mrs. Cady was satisfactory was when the agreement with Mrs. Cady was made. The fact that Mrs. Cady did not afterward fully carry out her agreement with Parshley does not relieve him. In law this amounts to a fraud. The defendant was an attorney and he was bound to know that he could only transfer his lease by the written consent of Griffin, which he did not try to obtain. The judgment will be for plaintiff for the full amount."

What may the change from "wire" to "wireless" mean to the wireless companies? Competition? Possibly.—Yet it is improbable. It must be remembered that all the money in the world cannot grow a babe to manhood without the passage of years of time. The present existing wireless system is not a matter of mere money; time entered largely into the building; there are patents and other considerations, like established rights, etc., that one must not lose sight of, and a Wireless "system" is not embodied in one instrument, but in a number.

What does it mean in dollars and cents? The Western Union Telegraph Co. estimates the cost of the construction of a single wire at \$45 per mile. They also estimate that in repairs, etc., they are already expending the system every seven years. Yet, according to a court record, an inventor who put only \$1000 in the purchase of Western Union stock in the early fifties, has received \$101,000 in cash dividends, and \$50,000 in stock dividends. They are paying interest and dividends on \$150,000,000, while United Wireless is capitalized for only 15% per cent of this sum—\$250,000,000. There must be something, therefore, to be made from wireless operation.
